

Business Men To Meet With Federal Men

Two meetings with government officials are lined up for Chamber of Commerce for Salem area manufacturers interested in federal government business.

An all-day session one week from today will concern controlled materials and defense contracts and will be the biggest such informational meeting yet for manufacturers, shopmen and contractors.

This was reported by President Robert W. Fenix to the Salem Chamber of Commerce board of directors at a meeting Wednesday night in the Senator Hotel.

The second meeting of interest to Salem area shop proprietors is at 11 a.m. today when a group of affected businessmen will meet at the chamber office in Senator Hotel to plan for representation at a Saturday meeting in Portland with Gen. Telford Taylor, head of the small defense plant corporation.

In the March 6 meeting at Senator Hotel, local businessmen will be joined by other shopmen from Marion, Polk, Benton, Clackamas, Yamhill and Linn Counties in interviews and discussions with five officials from the Portland office of the Department of Commerce as well as Maj. L. C. Austin, small business specialist from the Armed Forces Regional Council in Seattle, and Tom Norton, ordnance procurement officer from Portland office of the San Francisco Ordnance District.

In other business before the chamber board last night, a resolution was adopted to call on the State Highway Commission and the federal government to take emergency action to help improve South River Road near Salem city limits and near Independence Bridge.

McCarthy Claims Acheson Reversed Decision on Chubb

WASHINGTON (AP)—A suggestion that Secretary of State Acheson threw out a loyalty board's finding and cleared O. Edmund Chubb of disloyalty charges was injected Wednesday into a Senate investigation of possible Red influence on U. S. Far Eastern policies.

Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.) brought up the matter during the second day of acrimonious exchanges between Owen Lattimore, Far Eastern affairs specialist, and the Senate's Internal Security Subcommittee.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who attended the hearing, told reporters Acheson reversed the board and cleared Chubb with the understanding Chubb would then resign. McCarthy said, however, that Chubb had been dismissed, McCarthy said, he would have lost a \$4,800-a-year pension.

Lattimore, a Johns Hopkins University professor and one-time government consultant on Asia, was before the group to deny testimony by several previous witnesses that sought to link him with the Communist movement.

Snow Buries Cape Cod Area

Bally Sunshine boosted temperatures to near 60 in the South Wednesday but in New England a fierce northeast blizzard buried Massachusetts' Cape Cod under snow drifts as high as 12 feet.

Hundreds of motorists were stranded on impassable Cape highways and snow fighters unable to cope with the fall called for help from the state.

Highway traffic was bogged generally along the Southern New England coast.

A 20-inch fall of snow isolated the Cape Cod town of South Yarmouth, with a population of 1,185.

Aerial Spray Regulations Ruled Illegal

Regulatory provisions for aerial spraying under a 1951 Oregon law were ruled Wednesday as unconstitutional by Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell of Marion County.

He held, however, that most of the licensing features of the law are valid, as well as those pertaining to agricultural chemical control by other than aerial means.

Kimmell notified attorneys in the case of Leo J. Demers, operator of Ace Flying Service in Salem, against Ervin L. Peterson, director of the State Department of Agriculture, of his decision. A declaratory judgment will be issued.

The court's findings of unconstitutionality of the regulation is on the basis that the Legislature "has attempted to delegate the power to legislate," which the state constitution prohibits.

No Guide Given
This is based on the fact that "there is no guide expressed in this statute to which regulations must conform.... It is left to the sole discretion of the department to determine the law to which a licensee must conform or suffer criminal penalties."

Kimmell writes that "careful reading of the statute leaves real doubt as to the purpose of the law...nor has a criterion or guide been provided which reaches or relates to the subject."

Provisions of the statute that all aerial spraying and dusting operators must be licensed by the department were held to be valid, since the plaintiff has not been denied a license, "neither does it appear that there is or will be any controversy" arising out of the licensing portion.

Said Discriminatory
Only licensing feature held unconstitutional was that which held that persons who had passed a course at Oregon State College would be granted licenses without examination, which was deemed to be discriminatory.

Demers alleged that otherwise licensed aircraft operators would not qualify under the 1951 statute and that he would lack pilots for operation. But Kimmell held that "the remedy for that situation lies with the legislature and not with the court."

The suit was filed in early January.

Demers to Use Near 40 Planes in Dusting Work

From 35 to 40 planes will fly for the Ace Flying Service in dusting work this year, Ace Demers said Wednesday after hearing of a court decision in effect voiding a 1951 law.

Demers said he already had a contract for 30,000 acres of dusting in Polk County, and that he would operate in Oregon, Wyoming and Mexico.

The decision was rendered by Circuit Court Judge Rex Kimmell. Demers said crux of the controversy was that part of the proposed law which required pilots to take a course and examination in insecticide—which operators of land machines do not have to do.

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Reuther Blasts Taft, Neutral on Other Presidential Candidates

Considerable criticism of Sen. Robert Taft, but "complete independence" on other political views, was expressed in Salem Wednesday by Walter Reuther, president of the CIO United Auto Workers.

He said labor would try to influence both party platforms. In a brief capital city visit between two Oregon speeches, Reuther, one of the top leaders of organized labor, said that the entry of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower into the race hasn't changed the picture much. He noted, however, that he has found many persons concerned at having a military man in such high position.

Reuther added that he feels Taft can win the Republican nomination easier than the election, while Eisenhower could win the election easier than the party selection.

Reuther denounced "McCarthyism," the attacks of Sen. McCarthy and others on high public figures, as a "shocking experience." He said it has raised questions over the world as to where America is going and has "done more damage than any other thing to the American reputation in other countries." He expressed doubt that McCarthyism would be possible in England, because of a "high sense of political responsibility."

Need Full Employment
The United States' "basic unresolved problem" is full employment, production and distribution of "the good things of life" in peacetime, said Reuther. Inability to achieve this so far by a free economy is the central core of communist propaganda, he added.

He noted that the country in 1939 had nine million unemployed and in 1950 had 4 1/2 million jobless, problems which were "solved by Hitler and by Stalin."

In regard to this, he noted a few danger signs on the business horizon, with some soft spots hidden by huge military expenditures.

Program "Makes Sense"
As to the current labor-management situation, Reuther said his own auto workers union has one million persons under major contracts lasting until 1955, with escalator and other "improvement" clauses. This type of program makes sense for both labor and industry, he declared.

Reuther asserted also that his goal of "making progress for consumers and not at the expense of consumers" would be furthered by getting all workers on escalator clauses, with raises for increases in cost of living.

Reuther was in Salem with Monroe Sweetland, Oregon National Democratic Committee chairman; Howard Morgan of Independence, State Democratic Central Committee chairman, and Jack Conway, his assistant. He spoke Tuesday night at Eugene in connection with the University of Oregon 75th anniversary, and at Portland Wednesday night to an Americans for Democratic Action meeting.

Salem High P-TA Plans Square Dance

Salem High Parent-Teacher Association will sponsor a square dance March 11 at the school gymnasium in order to raise funds for the P-TA convention requirements.

This was decided Wednesday night when the association met at the school. Mrs. Jack Wikoff was named nomination committee chairman.

The association recommended fluorination of Salem city water supply. Educational theme for the meeting last night was the industrial arts instruction program, presented by Theodore K. Pierson.

Supreme Court Hears Murder Case Appeal

The Oregon Supreme Court heard arguments today in the appeal of Frank Oliver Payne, who is sentenced to die for a holdup murder.

The murder occurred Jan. 18, 1951, when Hercules N. Butler was shot and killed in the holdup of his grocery store at Southwest 14th Avenue and Jefferson Street in Portland.

Parents of Cpl. Hall were not available for comment, but Cpl. Sauvain's father informed The Statesman that his son went to Japan last June and has been in Korea for the past four or five months. According to his father, Cpl. Sauvain has been in the service for about a year and a half.

The corporal is with the Military Police and "gets transferred quite a bit," Sauvain said.

Ellsworth Says Truman to Run

PORTLAND (AP)—Republican Rep. Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg said Wednesday he believed that President Truman will be a candidate for re-election.

"The party leaders know Truman is their best bet against the Republican nominee and they want him to run, regardless of his own personal desires," Ellsworth, who arrived from Washington, D. C., by plane, said.

He said the election year is slowing congressional legislation. Ellsworth, a candidate for re-election from the Fourth Oregon District, will speak here Saturday night.

He also plans to visit his mother in Eugene before returning to Washington.

Mulino Vet to Compete for Farm

PORTLAND (AP)—Robert O. Berger, 33, Mulino, has been named Oregon's entrant in a Veterans of Foreign Wars competition for a \$50,000 farm in the Columbia Basin Project near Moses Lake, Wash.

He was named by an Oregon VFW committee to compete with entrants from the other states. The 80-acre farm will be awarded May 29 at a celebration of the initial delivery of water to the million-acre Eastern Washington project.

MIG SHOT DOWN
SEOUL, Korea (AP)—American Sabre jets shot down one Communist MIG and damaged another Wednesday as the Red planes made an appearance in force over North Korea for the first time in four days.

Extensive sniping activities have been resumed in the port of Leghorn, Italy.

85,000 U.S. GI's Due Back From Germany

HEIDELBERG, Germany (AP)—Army authorities said Wednesday night about 85,000 of the United States' quarter million ground troops in Germany will be replaced and sent home for discharge in the next 10 months. The huge turnover begins in March.

The exodus will range from 3,000 to 14,000 men a month. A corresponding number of new men, trained in the United States, will be brought in and absorbed into the six combat divisions and supporting units the United States keeps on this cold war front.

The shuffle will place more and more "civilian" troops in Lt. Gen. Manton Eddy's Seventh Army, which represents the United States in the tactical defense of Europe.

Early last year, when the seventh had only two divisions here, 90 per cent of its troops were professionals. Now nearly 50 per cent are draftees. By next January, at least 75 per cent will be draftees.
