

Stassen May Visit Oregon During March

(Special to The Statesman)
PORTLAND — Harold Stassen, candidate for the Republican nomination to the presidency, probably will be in Oregon around the middle of March, it was declared here Thursday.

Walter Rosenberry of Wapiti, Wyo., traveling for Stassen, said his candidacy would be filed with the Secretary of State's office at Salem next Monday morning.

The "probability" that Stassen himself will come to Oregon grew out of Monday's decision of the Minnesota State Supreme Court that the filing in the state for Gen. Dwight Eisenhower did not meet legal requirements. (Story on page 1).

As a result, Stassen will be unopposed in the April 1 Minnesota primaries except by a slate of delegates nominally regarded in favor of Gen. Douglas MacArthur but which the general already has repudiated.

Rosenberry said Stassen would utilize in Oregon the time he will thus save by not having to campaign so intensively in Minnesota.

In Nebraska's April 1 primaries, Stassen is opposed by a state woman Republican leader who is not regarded as "fronting" for any particular major candidate.

In another April 1 primary, Stassen in Wisconsin will be opposed by Sen. Robert Taft (R-Ohio) and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

Erich Laetsch Leaves To Attend Meetings

Maurice Anthony Hamersky, Woodburn, who had been granted three years probation Nov. 26, 1951, on a bad check charge had his probation revoked Thursday and was sentenced to the Marion County jail for six months.

Thomas Grantville Roberts, Seattle, Wash., who was arrested Feb. 13 in Salem on a charge of conspiracy to commit a felony, was sentenced to the Marion County jail for six months. Thursday, pleaded guilty to the charge and was continued for sentencing March 3.

Gov. Stevenson Draws Praise From Truman

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman gave a laudatory pat on the back to Gov. Adlai Stevenson Thursday while putting off for at least a month any announcement of his own political intentions.

In response to a question at a news conference, the President said Stevenson is one of the best governors in Illinois history and that's one of the best recommendations for the Presidency.

Some Democrats would like to see Stevenson get the party's nomination if the President decides to retire.

The news conference exchange occurred several hours before Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia threw his hat into the ring as the second avowed candidate for top place on the 1952 Democratic national ticket.

Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee was the first to announce and he has been campaigning for weeks.

Questions about Truman's political intentions and his opinion of Gov. Stevenson came at separate points in Thursday's Presidential interview, which also covered such subjects as telecasting of Congressional committee hearings, Alaskan statehood, and new appointments.

Truman said he would not disclose his political plans until after he returns from a trip to Key West, Fla., next month. That would be the end of March.

There has been some speculation that the President might make his decision known at the Jefferson-Jackson dinner here March 29, but he gave reporters no help on this either.

Truman said he could not make a trip to Korea and commented at another point that the recent Lisbon North Atlantic Treaty conference was a very successful one. He said Secretary of State Acheson would explain it fully Friday night over radio and television.

He said the fight is still on for statehood for Alaska and Hawaii despite the Senate's vote Wednesday to shelve the Alaskan bill by a one-vote margin. He favors statehood for both and he said when he starts anything he never gives up "till the last dog dies."

He announced the appointment of Robert T. Bartley of Bonham, Tex., a nephew of Speaker Rayburn, to the Federal Communication Commission, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Chairman Wayne Coy.

One Democrat and three Republicans filed Thursday for precinct committee posts with the Marion County clerk.

W. A. Bevier, Democrat from Mehama, filed for Mehama Precinct 182. The Republicans were George O. Rangust, 373 Ellier Ave., Salem, for precinct 35; Charles D. Wheeler, 737 Center St. for precinct 10, and Maude E. Williams, 441 N. 24th St., for precinct 20.

Nunan Covered More Claims, Inquiry Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Williams (R-Del.) fired another round Thursday at Joseph D. Nunan Jr., saying that a move to prosecute a \$792,094 tax claim against a Florida man was dropped after the former internal revenue commissioner entered the case.

Williams said the case was the sixth handled by Nunan and his associates in which "recommendations for criminal prosecution have been ignored and proposed taxes totaling over 3½ million dollars remain uncollected."

In a Senate speech, Williams said the government was moving to bring a criminal prosecution against Jacob Jack Udell, claiming he owed \$799,094 in taxes and penalties, but dropped it after Nunan came into the picture as an attorney.

Williams said the amount is still uncollected "and chances of its collection at this late date are slim." He described Udell as a resident of Miami Beach, Fla. The Senator said Udell formerly lived in New York City and operated a poultry processing plant at Frankford, Del.

O. W. Jewett, Former Salem Resident Dies

O. W. Jewett, 84, died Thursday morning at Beaverton, only a week after moving from Salem to a church home.

Jewett was born in Illinois and came to Oregon in 1925, settling near Salem. He and Mrs. Jewett resided at 407 N. 19th St. until moving last week to the North-western Christian Home. He suffered a stroke shortly after arriving there.

A farmer much of his life, Jewett was a member of Court Street Christian Church in Salem. Survivors include the widow; a sister, Mrs. E. L. McMahon of Salem, and a brother in Bakersfield, Calif.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Falling Plane Passengers Jump Safely

SYDNEY, Nova Scotia (AP)—Eighteen U. S. Air Force men, shepherded by the only one who had ever jumped before, parachuted safely from a twin-engine transport iced-up in a blizzard as the last of its gas gave out early Thursday.

The rode the silk for 3,000 feet through darkness and a 50-mile-an-hour gale. The derelict plane roared over homes in this industrial city of 30,000 and crashed in the woods.

Three of the plane's 14 passengers and four crewmen received minor injuries; the others landed unscathed.

The jump master was the flight engineer, Staff Sgt. R. A. Redinger of Chambersburg, Pa.

S. River Road Widening on County Agenda

All the width possible, without cutting into the bank, will be added to South River Road in its most hazardous section, Marion County Engineer Hedda Swart said Thursday.

Following last Monday's hearings on petitions for action to correct the road's dangerous condition, the County Court ordered the engineer to study the problem in the light of available road funds.

Swart said the shoulders would be leveled for about 2,000 feet north of Brown's Island Road, in an area near Salem city limits. This will gain about one foot of usable width on the west side and two feet on the east side, said Swart, which will be asphalted to prevent the continual washing due to poor drainage.

He added that he is investigating the cost and possible use of a metal guard rail to replace the fence separating road and railroad.

Reds Bombard Allied Lines With Leaflets

SEOUL (AP)—The Communists Thursday again bombarded Allied lines in Eastern Korean with artillery and mortar shells loaded with propaganda leaflets.

The Reds first used this technique—which was sprung on them by the Allies—on Wednesday. The leaflets accused the Allies of indiscriminate bombing and of delaying the armistice talks.

Liveliest action was on the western front, where an Allied patrol fought with grenades and small arms against Communist troops northwest of Yonchon. The Reds fell back and were hit with Allied artillery fire that caused an estimated 245 casualties in that sector.

Farther west, the Communists hit an Allied position with artillery, mortar and small arms fire south of Panmunjom, the truce talk site. Allied artillery fired back.

Night bombers and fighters Thursday night kept up the relentless pounding of Red communications. Pilots estimated they destroyed 145 out of 1,100 trucks sighted.

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Decatur-Maerz Defendants in Apprentice Suit

A complaint against Vernon Decatur and Edwin Maerz of the Decatur and Maerz Plumbing firm was filed Thursday by Arthur G. Farrell of the State Board of Health.

The charge of employing an apprentice who was not indentured was filed against the firm Thursday. A similar charge had been dismissed by the Marion County district attorney Wednesday just before a scheduled jury trial.

It is contended in the new complaint that the plumbing firm hired an apprentice who had not been approved for the apprenticeship program by the state council and that he had not been registered with the State Board of Health.
