Boston It Is

Beans, Bread, Cake, All Take Name From City of the Bean; Eat Together

What other city in the world can match Boston as a food name. Baked beans and brown bread we know well, for that's the City of the Bean, and brown bread naturally tags along, but the familiar are Boston Cream Pie and even head lettuce, which was once designated by the prefix Boston.

Who could be better qualified to produce a perfect recipe for Boston Baked Beans than Fanny Farmer, she of the Boston Cooking School Cook Book? This should be enough to serve all the city, it would seem.

BOSTON BAKED BEANS

1 quart pea beans 1 tablespoon to 1 cup molasses (according to taste)
3/4 pound fat salt pork 1/2 teaspoon mustard
3 tablespoons sugar Boiling water
Wash and pick over beans, soak overnight. Drain, cover with fresh water and heat slowly, keeping water below boiling point, until skins will burst. (Take a few on a spoon and blow on them, skins will burst when done). Drain, scald pork and put 1/4 inch slice in bottom of bean pot. Cut through rind of remaining piece of pork. Put beans in pot and bury pork in them, leaving rind exposed. Mix salt, molasses, sugar and 1 cup boiling water, pour over beans. Add enough boiling water to cover beans. Cover pot and bake from 6 to 8 hours in a slow oven (250 degrees) uncovering them the last hour so rind becomes brown and crisp. Add water as needed during cooking.

Boston Brown Bread is one of the very best accompaniments for the beans. An old molasses booklet provides this recipe:

BOSTON BROWN BREAD

1 cup yellow cornmeal 1/2 cup sugar
1 cup whole wheat flour 1 teaspoon soda
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour 3/4 cup molasses
1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1 1/2 cups sour or buttermilk
Mix all flour with salt and sugar. Stir soda into molasses, add to flour mixture with milk. Mix well. Add shortening and fill two quart greased pudding mold not more than 3/4 full. Put into kettle with water coming about half way up on mold, cover and steam for 3 1/2 hours. If smaller molds are used, steam less time. Washington or Boston Cream pie isn't a pie at all, but to conform to custom we'll call it so anyway:

BOSTON CREAM PIE

3/4 cup sugar 1 1/2 cups cake flour
1 cup butter 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder (combination type)
2 eggs 1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla Custard filling or jam
1/2 teaspoon salt Whipped cream
Sift sugar, cream in butter and add eggs one at a time. Then add vanilla and flour and baking powder sifted together, alternating with milk. Beat after each addition and when smooth, put into two 8-inch cake pans in a 375 degree oven for 25 minutes. Spread with a custard filling (or jam or jelly) and top with uncooked white icing and whipped cream.
