Corn Good Vegetable to Serve When There's Dearth of Fresh Garden Foods

Canned corn may be called a forgotten vegetable in some households, for though used occasionally as a plain buttered or creamed vegetable, there's little imagination used in its preparation.

But now that winter has taxed the list of recipes for vegetables in most households, some of the following ideas may give menu variety:

CORN FRITTERS

1 cup canned corn 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup flour Few grains paprika
1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1 egg
Chop corn, drain, add dry ingredients mixed and sifted. Add egg yolk, beaten until thick. Fold in egg white, beaten until stiff. Heat deep kettle of fat to 370 degrees or until hot enough to brown a cube of bread in 1 minute. Dip a spoon into fat, then take up spoonfuls of fritter mixture and carefully lower into fat without spattering. Cook until delicately brown and drain on crumpled, unglazed paper. Serves 6.

SOUTHERN CORN PUDDING

2 cups corn 1 1/2 tablespoons melted butter
2 eggs, slightly beaten 2 cups scalded milk
1 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper

Combine ingredients. Bake in buttered dish in slow oven 325 degrees until firm. Serves 6.

CORN SOUFFLE

2 cups canned corn 1 cup milk
1 tablespoon butter 1 1/4 teaspoons salt
2 tablespoons flour Few grains pepper

Melt butter, add flour and milk gradually. Stir and bring to boiling point; add corn, seasonings, egg yolks beaten until thick and lemon-colored, and egg whites beaten until stiff. Turn into buttered dish and bake 25 to 30 minutes in moderate oven 350 degrees. Serves 6.

SCALLOPED CORN

1 small green pepper Few grains cayenne
1/2 onion, finely chopped 1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons butter 1 cup canned corn
2 tablespoons flour 1 egg yolk
1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup dried bread
1/4 teaspoon paprika 1 tablespoon butter
1/4 teaspoon mustard 1/2 cup buttered cracker crumbs

Wipe pepper, cut in halves lengthwise, and remove seeds. Cut in thin strips, and stir in halves, crosswise. Cook pepper, onion and butter 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add flour, mixed with seasonings, and stir until well blended. Add milk gradually, while stirring constantly. Stir and bring to boiling point, add corn, egg yolk, and bread broken in small pieces and cooked with 1 tablespoon butter until well browned. Turn into buttered dish, cover with buttered crumbs, and bake in hot oven 400 degrees until crumbs are brown. Serves 6.

ROME (AP)—The Senate approved by acclamation Wednesday a law closing houses of prostitution in Italy. The measure, which has been pending since 1949, now goes to the Chamber of Deputies. Similar approval is expected.

Senate Debates Offshore Oil Revenue Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate heard sentiment Wednesday for denying the coastal states any special share of revenues from offshore oil.

Pending legislation provides for federal administration of oil leases on lands beneath the marginal seas, with 37 1/2 per cent of the royalties going to the bordering states.

Sen. Aiken (R-Vt) called this "a pretty stiff effort to buy them off."

He said he could see no reason for giving them anything if the offshore lands belong to the federal government.

Sen. Kilgore (D-WVa) proposed two alternate amendments to carry out the same idea.

One would devote all revenues from the submerged offshore lands to payments on the national debt. The other would apply 30 per cent to a program of federal aid to education and the remainder to the national debt.

Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo), a co-sponsor of the federal control bill, termed the 37 1/2 per cent contribution to the producing states "a generous compromise."

The states, he explained, had been getting all the revenue without federal interference until the Supreme Court ruled they did not own the lands off their shores.

Furthermore, he said, the federal policy on Indian mineral leases on public lands is to give the producing states 37 1/2 per cent of the revenues.

Sen. Mahoney Pleads Innocent To Assault Charge

OREGON CITY (AP)—State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney pleaded innocent here Wednesday to an assault and battery charge.

An Oregon City taxicab driver, Wayne Hull, brought the charge, accusing Mahoney of mistreating him in a quarrel over a 50-cent cab fee last week.

Mahoney himself did not turn up to enter the plea in District Court. An attorney did it for him. No trial date has been set.

Mother's Age Affects Cancer In Children

CINCINNATI (AP)—Your mother's age when you were born may affect your chances of getting cancer, new mouse studies indicate. If your mother was young, the chances for cancer look smaller. But the cancer might well come along early in life and be the fast-growing, rapidly spreading, highly lethal type.

The older the mother, the more chance apparently of getting cancer. But the cancer may likely be slow-growing, coming on late in life. People who get cancer late in life often live for years, dying of old age or other causes.

The evidence comes from mouse studies reported by Dr. Leonell C. Strong, Yale University geneticist, to the second National Cancer Conference Wednesday.

It ties in with human studies indicating that persons born of young mothers live longer than

those born to older mothers. Pairs of mice were kept mating together for up to 15 litters.
