Legislative Poll Aimed at Session Cut

The Oregon Legislature's interim committee on Legislative Procedure decided Friday to poll the legislators on what they think could be done to make the sessions shorter.

The 1951 session, longest in history, lasted 116 days.

The questionnaire, to be sent to members of several former sessions as well as to those now serving, will ask whether they favor these ideas:

Annual sessions instead of having sessions every two years. Meeting of the Ways and Means Committee, which makes appropriations, before the sessions meet. Barring introduction of bills after the 20th day.

A powerful Rules Committee. Insistence that state departments introduce their bills early.

Leaving afternoons free for committee meetings, thus holding legislative sessions only during the mornings.

Having a voting machine to take house roll calls.

Dispensing with roll calls on minor bills.

Getting assistance from the state bar in drafting bills.

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland Democrat, is chairman of the committee.

Myrtle Williams Claimed by Death

Greyhound's Depot Workers Idled by Strike

Six office workers in the Salem Greyhound bus depot joined about 1,000 other non-striking Greyhound workers Friday who have been laid off as a result of the bus drivers and station workers strike.

Now going into its seventh day, the strike has idled Greyhound buses in seven Western states, including Western Oregon.

J. L. Wells, manager of the Pacific Greyhound depot here, said the six would be on temporary vacations for the duration of the strike. Wells is manning the office alone, he said.

Employees here are not employed by Greyhound, Wells said, but work instead for the Salem Terminal Co., which handles Greyhound's Salem business.

Greyhound Friday informed its mechanics and office workers that they would be furloughed without pay until the strike ends. Some 300 office personnel completed work Friday afternoon, and 600 mechanics will be released as their work week ends.

Meanwhile, Associated Press reported from San Francisco, where negotiations between the AFL Motor Coach Employees Union and the Greyhound are in progress, that there is no indication of a quick settlement of the strike. Chief issues are proposals for a five-day work week and wage increases.

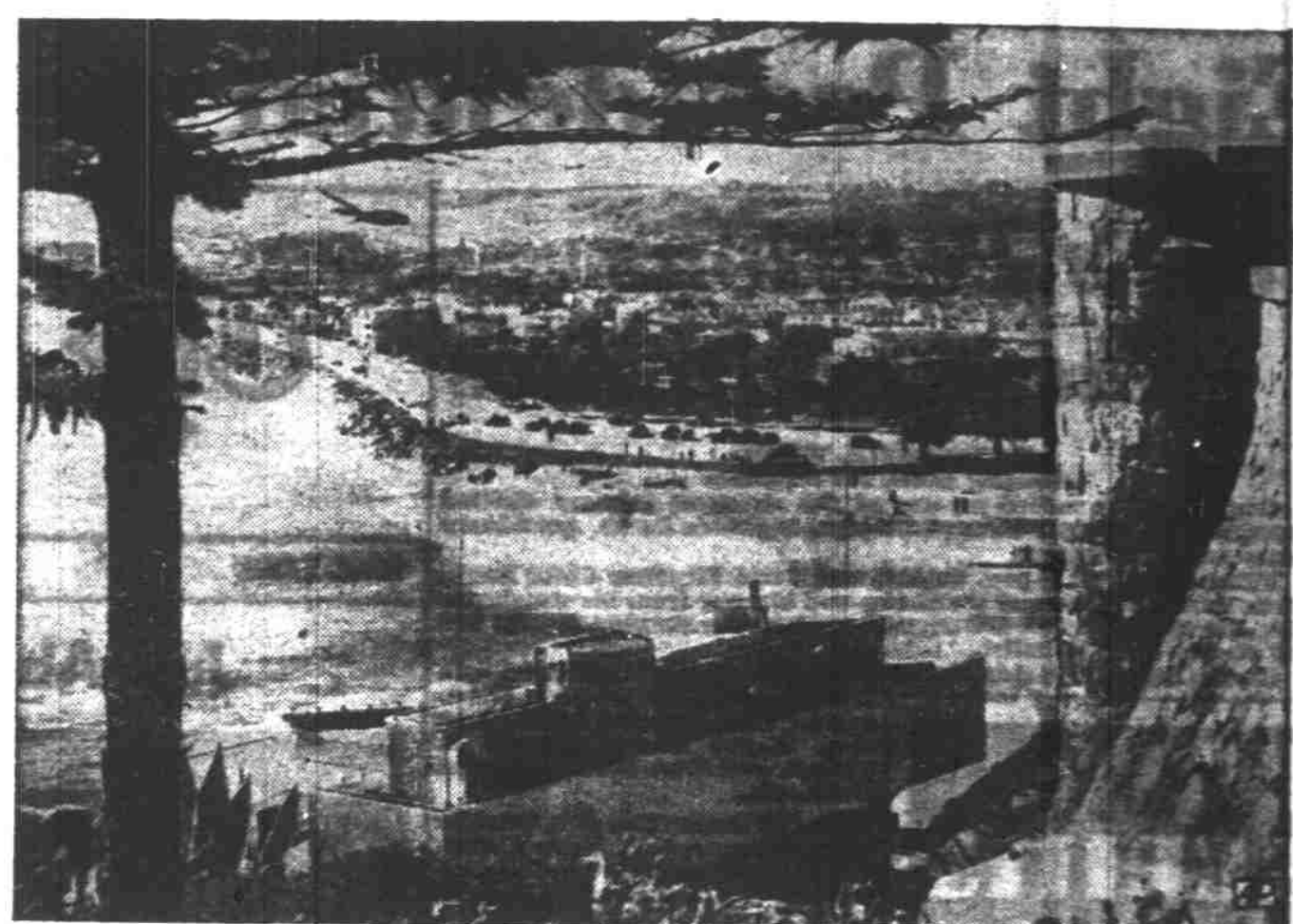
Willamette Speakers In Tourney Finals

Traffic Claims 26 in February

Traffic accidents killed 26 persons in Oregon in February, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Friday. The February toll brought the death count for 1952 to 46, slightly lower than for the same period last year.

Nine deaths in one week end were responsible for boosting the death count higher than any February since 1948, Newberry said. Six of these deaths results from two accidents.
