Designing Woman

HOW TO FIRE-PROOF COTTON RUGS

Now that cotton rugs are so popular for every room in the house, questions arise about their flammability. Is there a way to make sure a dropped match causes little damage? Should the small rug in front of the fireplace be fire-proofed? It's true, of course, that loosely woven fluffy rug will burn more readily than a closely woven short-napped one. But many of the new cotton rugs are tight woven and many shags have tight twisted loops, and the spark that ignites them is more damaging than dangerous. Even the damage is seldom great, but if there are small rugs at your house which you'd like to protect against ignition by matches, cigarettes and sparks, here is the National Safety Council's recommendation for a fire retardant treatment: After washing the rug and drying it, immerse it in a solution of ammonium sulfate and water, one pound of the chemical to one gallon of water. Or, if the ammonium sulfate is not readily available, use a solution of 9 ounces of borax and four ounces of boric acid to one gallon of water. The treatment must be renewed every time the article is washed, and is effective on other cotton fabrics such as curtain fabrics.

Weekend Fun with Yeast Bread Dough Gives Writer Ideas for Fancy Shapes

For several weekends we've been having lots of fun with yeastbreads. One time we baked two batches of rye bread to decide which of our recipes we liked best. Once we found was a darker, heavier bread, more like the German sour rye bread sometimes found at the baker's. The other was fluffier and lighter. We prefer the heavier type.

Then this past weekend we worked on a recipe which we've published but never tried. It's from a reader who has made it many times. We loved it. Here's the recipe which we repeat now that we have tried it ourselves:

MRS. CHEEK'S OATMEAL BREAD

1 1/2 cups rolled oats
4 cups water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup molasses
1 tablespoon shortening

1 cake yeast
3 medium potatoes
2 cups potato water
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup sugar

Flour to make stiff dough

Boil oats, water, salt, molasses and shortening together until done. Boil and sieve potatoes and add to mixture. Cool to lukewarm, add yeast and let stand until dissolved. Add potato water, nuts and sugar. Then work in flour to make stiff dough and let rise until light. Make into loaves and let rise again until doubled in bulk, bake at 350 degrees for about an hour.

When we started putting in the white flour, we realized that we were going to have enough bread for an army or two, so we worked out some other versions. First we made up the dough into five loaves and part of the rest we made into brown 'n serve rolls, like you can buy at the grocer's, half done.

We made up the rolls and baked them for 45 minutes, at 350. They are only half done, a fact which my sister will attest to, as she made a visit while I was gone and tasted one. This comes under the heading of "Crime does not pay."

The rolls will be put into a hot oven for about 7 minutes when to be used, in the meantime, they are reposing in the freezer along with most of the loaves.

We also made a few butterhorn-type rolls for breakfast, but absent-minded as we are, we forgot they were on the bottom shelf in the oven and remembered them only when we smelled them toasting along with our breakfast toast the next morning.

Next time we make this or some other yeast bread we plan to roll some of the dough out very thin, spread with butter, cinnamon and sugar and put on another thin layer. We will roll this out very carefully again, being careful not to break through and expose the filling. We then place the sheet of dough on a cookie sheet and with a pastry wheel divide it into strips. When the sheet cooks, the cinnamon filling will leak out onto the pan, but the perforations made by the pastry wheel will make it break apart easily. They should be crisp wafers and pretty good to serve with soup or salads.
