

The score was 60-50. After a tight first half that ended in a 33-33 tie the Bruins surged back in the third period to go ahead by a dozen points. They hung on to it until the end with a

The victory was an outstanding, if not the top, upset of Pacific Coast basketball this year. Washington came here with a 25-5 season record and was heavily favored to turn back the UCLA challenge, as it did last year in

The Bruins had an unimpressive 19-10 season record but they duraped Washington in the first game of the series 65 to 53, made a belated rally that fell short as they dropped the second game 53 to 50, and Monday night put on a second half spurt that disorganized the veteran U.W. defense. Ron Livingston, sophomore, was

the sparkplug of the Bruin attack. He scored 18 points and contributed a great exhibition of dribbling and driving in through the closely knit Husky defense.
