

Police School Airs Public Relations Topic

The police officer and public relations were discussed at the opening here Tuesday of a three-week advanced police training school in Salem city hall.

About 90 officers from city and county law enforcement agencies from Salem and surrounding towns participated in the identical afternoon and night sessions. The afternoon sessions will be repeated at night to enable day and night shifts of police to attend.

Addressing the regional advanced training course Tuesday were Clay Cochran, manager of the Salem Chamber of Commerce; Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Oregon Statesman; City Manager J. L. Franzen and Steven Stone, managing editor of the Capital Journal. A film on telephone answering was shown.

Salem Police Chief Clyde A. Warren, speaking on the typical problems besetting a policeman, discussed such topics as the conduct of an officer off duty, courtesy while on duty, personal habits and assisting the public. The classes are to be conducted each Tuesday and Friday beginning at 12:30 p.m. and again at 6:30 p.m. until April 4.

Bids Due on Work At TB Hospital

The Oregon State Board of Control said Tuesday it will call for bids soon on a \$719,000 addition to the State Tuberculosis Hospital at Salem.

The project includes a \$264,000 employees dormitory and a \$45,000 hospital addition. The board Tuesday also awarded a \$44,492 contract for building a steam distributing system at the hospital to Bohren, Inc., Portland.

A sum of \$325 was authorized by the board to remodel the furnace in a state-owned house, which recently caught fire. The blaze occurred when a faulty furnace backfired. The house located on Marion Street, is rented by the state to a private individual. The state already has spent \$300 in renovating the house.

Her husband said Mrs. Leichy suffered severe but non-critical head injuries. She was reported resting comfortably Tuesday. The couple lived at 618 S. Third St., here and Leichy is a retired farmer.

Mrs. Leichy and the other passengers were injured when two Continental Trailways buses collided early Monday on the Pacific highway at Willamette Park, about four miles south of Eugene.

Democrat Senator Asks Ike Called Home to Testify

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McMahon (D-Conn.), a close supporter of the Truman administration, took Capitol Hill by surprise Tuesday with a formal request that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower be called home from Europe this month to testify on the \$7,900,000 Foreign Aid Bill.

Sen. Smith (R-N.J.), promptly protested that such a move would put Eisenhower "on the spot" and would be "politically embarrassing to Ike."

McMahon denied politics had anything to do with his motion. The Connecticut senator said no action was taken because only seven of the 13 Foreign Relations Committee members were present and he thought all should be on hand for a vote.

Across the Capitol, Rep. Mansfield (D-Mont.) told newsmen later in the day that he would also request the recall of Gen. Eisenhower to testify before the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Pinay Cabinet Wins Approval

PARIS (AP)—The National Assembly Tuesday voted its approval, 290-101, of conservative Premier Antoine Pinay's new French Cabinet, pledged to stand against Communist aggression in both Europe and Asia. But two powerful groups abstained.

The Cabinet's support came from middle and rightist deputies. The Communists and a lone De-Gaulleist made up the opposition. The other followers of Gen. Charles de Gaulle joined the Socialists in abstaining.

Their idea is, without committing themselves, to let Pinay stay on a while to show what he can do.

Financing a four billion dollar defense budget, halting inflation and revamping Pinay's ramshackle tax system are among Pinay's big problems.

Repine Low Bidder on Grand Coulee Work

COULEE DAM (AP)—The F. O. Repine Co. of Salem, Ore., was the apparent low bidder Tuesday for a large painting to be done on the interior of Coulee Dam's right powerhouse.

The firm's bid of \$108,660 was more than \$24,000 under the engineer's estimate for the job, V. M. Phillips and Son, Inc., of Portland was second low with a bid of \$118,464.

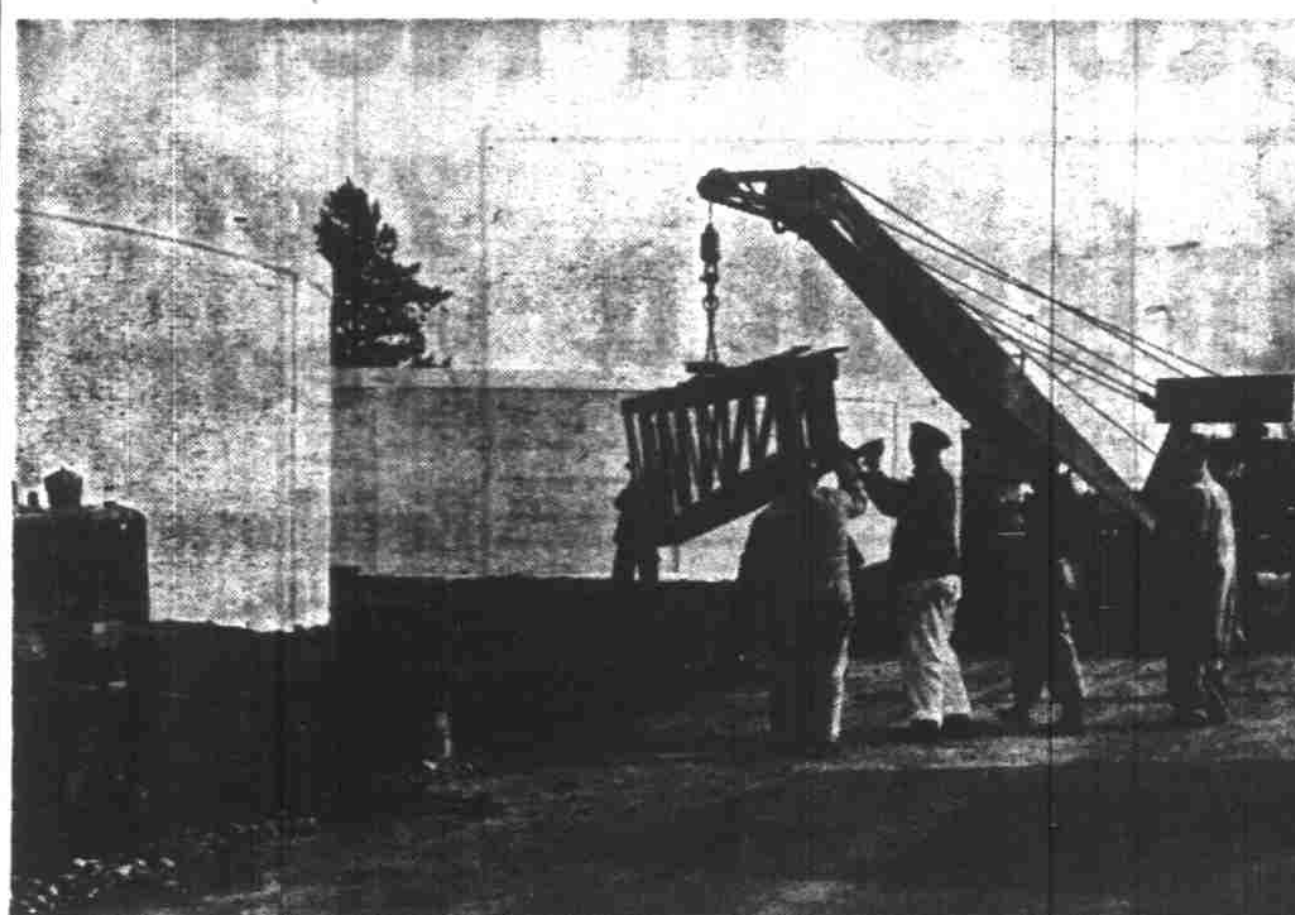

Negro Woman Dies at 115

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP)—Long dresses, long life—that, in short, was the philosophy of "Granny" Morton who is dead at the age of 115.

The Negro woman, born in slavery Dec. 22, 1836, died Sunday but newspapers didn't hear of it until Tuesday when relatives announced funeral plans.

"Granny," whose real name was Mrs. Letha Morton, outlived 10 of her 14 children. Her eldest living son, William, is 90.

She attributed her long life to the long dresses she always wore. Short dresses, she explained, permit more germs to reach the body.

Prehistoric Bones Found in Canyon Near The Dalles

THE DALLES (AP)—Bones of a prehistoric animal have been uncovered in Company Hollow Canyon 10 miles east of here.

An agate hunter made the find. Geologists Sam Sergeant and Ed Morrow identified a three-foot long bone as part of a foreleg. The bone was eight inches in diameter. They also found other bones and two teeth at the site.

Scientists from the University of Oregon are expected to complete the investigation.

Pants-Stealing Burglar Busy

PORTLAND (AP)—A pants-stealing burglar had a busy night Monday in Portland, Police, tracing back on the night's activities, reported he went into at least five houses.

Senate Approves State Ownership of Underwater Land

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Tuesday tentatively approved the principle of states' ownership of lands beneath bays, harbors and inland navigable waters.

The policy was embodied in an amendment to pending legislation to give the federal government control of all submerged lands from the tidewater mark along the coasts to the edge of the continental shelf.

The legislation is not expected to come up for a vote before the end of next week. Consideration Wednesday of the President's Internal Revenue Bureau reorganization program and then of the Japanese Peace Treaty will delay the final vote on the tidelands issue.

Speech Traces CAP History

The history of the Civil Air Patrol in Oregon was traced for members of a newly-organized Salem unit at a meeting Tuesday by Col. L. C. Austin, Portland, commander of the Oregon CAP.

Speaking at a meeting at the National Guard quarters at 25th and Lee Streets, Col. Austin said the volunteer organization's search and rescue program cooperates with the state search and rescue schedule.

C. W. Bartlett, director of the State Board of Aeronautics, said there was no conflict between the CAP and other aviation organizations in the state. The local CAP unit meets each Tuesday night.

Seattle Ousts Mayor Devin

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Seattle elected a new mayor Tuesday night in culmination of one of the city's bitterest election campaigns.

At the same time, the city turned down fluoridation of its water supply in a surprising 2-1 "No" vote.

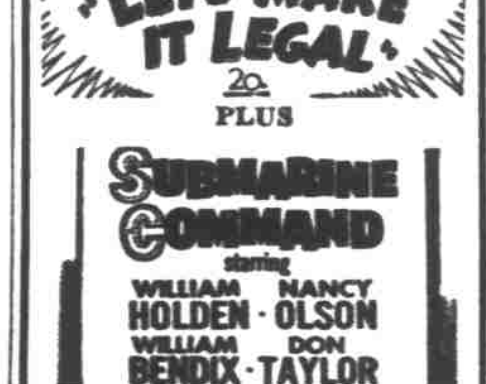
The new mayor will be Allan Pomeroy, 45-year-old lawyer who failed by 2,500 votes to unseat Mayor William F. Devin four years ago. Pomeroy's margin in Tuesday's election—one of many held in cities and towns of the state—was 3,400. This left no possible chance the 3,000 absentee ballots might change the results.

With Devin, 10 years Seattle's mayor, apparently will go Police Chief George Eastman, one of the storm centers in the election. Pomeroy has said he will fire Eastman if elected.

Dealers Fear Rise In Unemployment From Export Bans

PENANG, Malaya (AP)—Rubber dealers here fear that widespread unemployment will result from Indonesia's banning of the export of some grades of rubber to Malaya.

Many factories in Penang, as well as in other cities of the Federation and Singapore, are devoted almost entirely to the reprocessing of crude rubber brought in from Indonesia.



Rock Cleaning In River Leads To Complaint

Complaint that improved cleaning of road rock at Illilhee has resulted in sediment in a private pond came Tuesday to Marion County Court.

The court was informed, on behalf of Asel Eoff, that excess dirt from the gravel crusher is washing down Miller Creek into his pond, filling it up to the detriment of the fish in it.

The trouble is of recent origin. It was said, since the court called for cleaner gravel from the crusher and additional washing equipment was installed.

The county engineer was instructed to check into the situation. The crusher, about 10 miles south of Salem, is operated by Jack Taggart on contract with the county, which owns the rock pit.

Wild Cattle Hunter Looks In Indochina

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—A young American is heading for the wilds of Cambodia in Indochina to try to find some specimens of the almost-extinct wild cattle known as kouprey.

The hunter is Charles (Chuck) Wharton, a native of Atlanta. His expedition is financed by the Coolidge Foundation which wants a pair of kouprey to study them as a possible type for cross-breeding with cattle in Florida.

Wharton, who expects to spend six months in Indochina, plans to set up a camp in Northern Cambodia. When and if he captures the animals, they'll be flown back to the United States. Back in America, experts at Coolidge Foundation believe that the kouprey have highly developed sweat glands and quality of hide that will produce a more heat-resistant animal suitable to the semi-tropical areas of the United States.

Army Sergeant Saved by Bible

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Army Sgt. Roger E. Haag, 21, believes he owes his life to a Bible, five pints of blood plasma and a tape recording.

Haag was wounded in the chest while attacking a Communist-held ridge in Korea. A Bible he had in his breast pocket turned much of the shrapnel from his heart and kept his severe wounds from being fatal.

Hospitalized in Japan, the sergeant was kept alive by plasma. But nurses reported the youth seemed morose, wouldn't take medicine and spoke to no one.

As a last resort a tape recording of his parents' voices was flown to his bedside. As he listened through earphones, a smile spread over his face. Worried nurses told him later that they knew then the biggest part of their battle was over.

Attlee Beaten In Attempt to Censure Bevan

LONDON (AP)—Rebellious Aneurin Bevan, aspirant to the Labor Party leadership, beat down a censure motion by former Prime Minister Clement Attlee 172-62 in a crucial powwow of Laborite members of the House of Commons Tuesday.

The motion was designed to censure the unrepentant left-wing leader for bucking the party's views on Britain's 13 billion dollar rearmament program, a program which Attlee initiated while he headed the government.

Middle roaders who feared an open split in the British socialist movement opposed the motion along with Bevan and his 56 left-left followers. Attlee himself was booed and criticized in the private, two-hour meeting, but he still holds the party reins.

He managed to put through a watered-down version restoring "standing orders" of the party leadership, under which rebels can be ousted from the party. But in its final form, the resolution left the Bevanites several convenient loopholes.

The decision reached at the meeting contained a "face-saving" provision for Attlee. But political observers question whether he will be able to pick his successor when he does step down.

Hungry Horse Got Its Name Quite Logically

HUNGRY HORSE, Mont.—Ever wonder how the Reclamation Bureau's big 564-foot high Hungry Horse Dam now rising in a deep Northwestern Montana canyon got its name?

Back in March, 1901, so the story goes, two horses strayed from a pack string while crossing the Flathead River's South Fork. The horses were found a month later in "belly deep" snow. Their starved look brought the comment: "That's an awful hungry horse canyon."

Then last October two rented horses got lost in an uninhabited region above Hungry Horse Dam. The animals owner spent a week looking for them in snow two feet deep. The horses were "skin and bone" when found. They were trucked home to their first real meal in 44 days.

It's official now. That's an awful hungry horse canyon.
