The banquet will be in the Rose Bowl of the Multnomah Hotel . . . Besides Miss Phillips, the other "women of achievement" named include: Mrs. Creene A. Farris (Gertrude Houck), Portland, named in the field of women's leadership; Miss Dorothea M. Lensch, Portland, for her work in youth recreation; Mrs. Edgar F. Leming (Elsie L. Miss Phillips receives the award for public relations, government service. She has been personal and private secretary for three secretaries of state and three governors since starting her work in the state house in 1929 . . . An alumna of the University of Oregon, Miss Phillips for nine years was office manager and cashier at the Oregon City Enterprise (now the Oregon City Enterprise-Courier), and also served as Oregon City correspondent for the Oregon Journal. She came to Salem in 1929 as private secretary to the late Hal E. Hoss, when he was secretary of state. During the term of Mr. Hoss as secretary of state, she served as secretary of state, then served in the same capacity for the late Earl Snell during his terms as secretary of state from 1934 to 1942 . . .

When Mr. Snell was elected governor in 1942, Miss Phillips became his personal secretary and has served in that position since, for both Governor John H. Hall in the year he served following Governor Snell's death, and now for Governor McKay . . . Miss Phillips is a member of Theta Sigma Phi, having been initiated in her undergraduate days at the University of Oregon, a member of Alpha Phi, social sorority, and of Salem club of Zonta International, service club for women . . .

Makes Them Better

Cheese Added to Breakfast, Dinner Breads Gives Old Recipes Big Lift

The possibilities of using cheese in breads could stand much more study. Cheese will make fancy breads out of plain, and add a bit of needed flavor when bread's the accompaniment to salad or soup . . . For instance, add cheese to hot breads or biscuits and you've a very nice breakfast or luncheon treat . . . Using a regular biscuit dough, blend in half cup of dehydrated cheese (get it in a shaker-type package at the grocer's) to a recipe that uses two cups flour. Bake the biscuits as usual. Or if you prefer, make a batch of biscuit dough, roll it onto an oblong sheet and sprinkle with a cup of shredded American cheese, then roll up like a jelly roll. Bring ends around together to make a ring and pinch together, putting on a greased pan . . .

SNIP WITH SCISSORS
Now, with a pair of scissors, cut slanting gashes in the ring so the outside of cuts are about two inches apart. With the hands, turn the edges of the sections over so they are horizontal like a Swedish tea ring. Bake at 400 degrees until done and slightly browned . . .

CHEESE SPICE MUFFINS
2 cups flour 1/2 cup molasses
4 teaspoons baking powder 4 tablespoons butter, melted
1/2 teaspoon soda 1 egg
1/2 teaspoon ginger 1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup shredded cheese
Sift dry ingredients together. Blend beaten eggs, milk and molasses, then add dry ingredients, mixing only long enough to blend. Add melted butter and fold in cheese. Bake in greased muffin tins at 425 for 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 12 muffins . . .

GARLIC-CHEESE FRENCH BREAD
1/2 cup butter or margarine 1/4 teaspoon salt
1 or 2 cloves garlic 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 loaf French bread Paprika
Allow butter or margarine to stand at room temperature, adding garlic which has been cut into very thin slices. Allow to stand for half hour or more to allow garlic to flavor butter. Slash loaf of French bread into thick pieces, not cutting entirely through. Remove garlic from butter and spread butter between slashes in bread. Sprinkle loaf with salt then the grated cheese and top with paprika. Bake at 375 for about 15 minutes and serve whole on plate . . .

One of our old family favorites is this recipe for crisp cheese straws to serve with soup or salad:
CHEESE STRAWS
1 cup grated cheese 1 tablespoon butter
1 cup flour Water to mix
Mix, roll out and sprinkle with salt, cut in narrow strips about 1/2 inch wide and three or four inches long. Bake in 400 degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes. Do not brown. These are even better the second or third day than the first. Serve with cheese or soup . . .
