

Solons Delay Vote on Asking Ike to Testify

WASHINGTON (AP)—The senate foreign relations committee Monday put off a decision on the politically touchy questions of asking Gen. Eisenhower to come home from Europe to testify on the 7 billion nine hundred dollar foreign aid program.

Eisenhower, meanwhile, was disclosed to have written a group of his political backers that he does not plan to leave his assignment in Europe any time soon in the "absence of a compelling call or relief by higher authority."

The letter, written to 19 House members, was dated March 10, one day before the New Hampshire Republican primary in which he defeated Sen. Taft of Ohio.

In the Senate committee action, Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-N.H.) told newsmen he voted against the proposal to recall Eisenhower because it would put the General on "a political spot" and might "embarrass" him.

Rites Wednesday For Ole Sunde

SILVERTON — Funeral services for Ole Peder Sunde, 87, who died here Sunday, will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the Memorial Chapel of the Ekman Funeral Home with the Rev. J. A. Luthro officiating.

Rat Shooter Shot in Leg

A night-time rat-shooting party landed Keith Rabe, 7770 Claude St., in Salem General Hospital with a bullet wound in his left leg, from which he was reported recovering satisfactorily Monday.

City police said Rabe and Warren Johnson of Monmouth were shooting rats at the city dump with the aid of flashlights late Sunday. Rabe accidentally tripped the trigger on his pistol as he was shooting it into a hip holster and the .22 calibre bullet entered his leg.

176 Pints of Blood Donated At Elks Club

The Salem Elks Club stop Monday evening of the Red Cross bloodmobile netted 176 pints, members reported.

The Elks Lodge was the second Marion County stop of the bloodmobile for the month of March. Widespread illness in Salem and vicinity limited the number of contributions accepted, it was reported.

SEATTLE (AP)—The Coast Guard Cutter Winona made a rendezvous in the North Pacific at 10:30 p.m. Monday night with the disabled British freighter Darton, bobbing helplessly in the storm-tossed sea. The Darton appeared to be in no danger.

Fire Destroys Hopper Home, West Stayton

WEST STAYTON — A fire on Monday afternoon destroyed the home of Cyrus Hopper and family in West Stayton.

The home, located next to McClellan's store in downtown West Stayton, was a total loss, according to reports.

The two pre-school age children of the Hoppers were visiting a neighbor and Mrs. Hopper was out in the back hanging up clothes when the fire broke out. It was believed to have started when a wood stove, located centrally in the home, overheated.

A strong west wind fanned the blaze, but kept it from burning the store. No one was reported injured.

Stock Market Path Wavers

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market followed a wavering path Monday and wound up just about where it started.

It was the slowest full session in a couple of weeks. The Associated Press averages dropped a dime. There were just four more advances than there were declines.

A demand for a selected list of oil stocks was the only sign of real strength in the market.

But while some of the strongest issues were among the oil stocks, so were some of the deepest dips. For instance, Amerasia, an occasional wide mover, dropped four points at 22 1/4, and Shell Oil fell 2 1/4 at 82 1/4.

Volume was 1,500,000 shares.

Man Keeps 2-Day Vigil With Luggage

NEW YORK (AP)—For two days and two nights Emilio Crescenzo refused to leave his battered luggage in a Grand Central Terminal baggage room.

During the day he sat beside the battered valise and scuffed hand trunk. By night he slept with the luggage.

Baggage room attendants had difficulty understanding Crescenzo's broken English, so Monday they called in police and the Travelers Aid Society for help.

With the aid of an interpreter, Crescenzo told them he wouldn't leave his luggage because it contained \$22,000, money he had saved while working 35 years as a railroad section hand at Spokane, Wash., for the Northern Pacific railroad.

He came to the United States from his home near Naples in 1913, leaving his wife and three-year-old daughter in Italy. He came here enroute to Italy to rejoin his wife and daughter.

Italian consular officials were called in. They arranged for Crescenzo to go to a hotel and to care for his funds.

Harry Cohen Services Held In Portland

Funeral services for Harry Cohen, late resident of 970 Shipping St., were held at the Congregation Shaare Torah, in Portland Sunday.

Cohen died at a Salem hospital Friday morning. Shipment was made Friday by Virgil T. Golden Company to the Holman and Sons Funeral Home which had charge of arrangements. Interment was at the Shaare Torah Cemetery at Mt. Scott in Portland.

He was born in St. Paul, Minn., in 1887 and moved to The Dalles, Ore., when a small boy. He spent his boyhood and school days in The Dalles until coming to Salem 32 years ago.

Cohen was married to Molly Tushin, who was also raised in St. Paul, Minn., in Portland, Aug. 1, 1919.

He had been owner of the Style Art Shoe Company, which is the present site of The Shoe Box.

Cohen had been ill for some time and complained of a bad heart, relatives stated. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion.

He had belonged to the Elks at The Dalles. He was also a member of the local Jewish Order of B'nai Brith and the local Jewish Congregation Temple Beth Shalom.

He is survived by his widow, Molly, and two brothers, Benjamin and Simon, all of Salem; a sister, Mrs. Fanny Lobner, two daughters, Mrs. Charlotte Blum, St. Helens, and Mrs. Shirley Mermin, Tillamook, Ore.; two grandsons, and one great-granddaughter, Mrs. David Holtzman of Salem was a sister-in-law.

Frank E. McKinney, Democratic National Committee chairman, arrived aboard his own 50-foot cabin cruiser, the Merry Mac, in which he has been vacationing along the Florida coast.

It was their first face-to-face meeting since Truman's surprising defeat in the New Hampshire presidential preferential primary last Tuesday.

McKinney helped persuade the President to leave his name on the ballot in New Hampshire, where he was roundly trounced by Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee.

Later the child became silent, she said, and she went into the bedroom and found him apparently dead. The infant was declared dead when first aid men arrived.

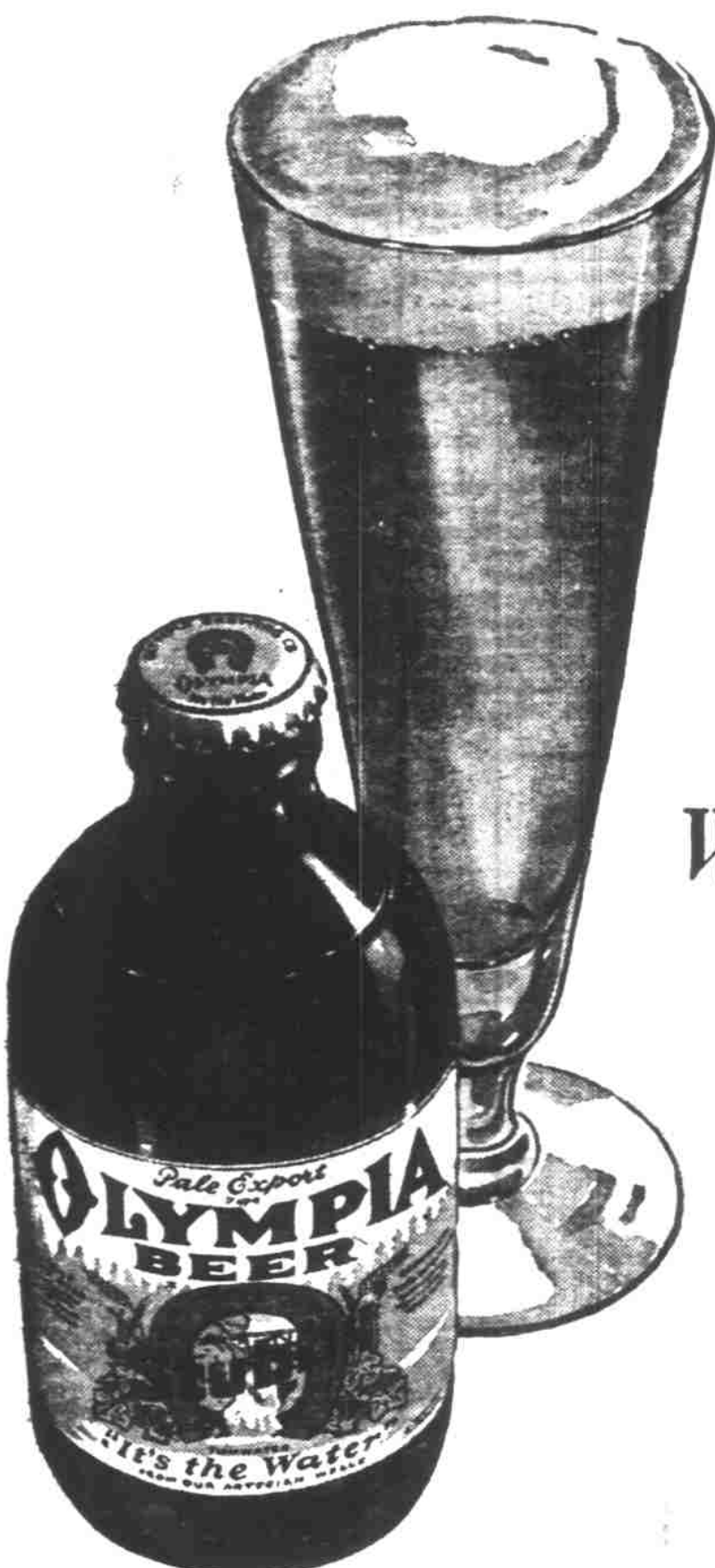
He was an only child. Funeral arrangements are being handled through Howell-Edwards Chapel.
