

Senators Refuse To Give Subpoena Power to Morris

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday refused to give Newbold Morris power to subpoena witnesses and documents in his hunt for corruption in government. Instead, they approved a plan to set up an independent investigation.

Swiftly following on these developments:

1. House investigators voted to ask President Truman to give them the income tax returns of Atty.-Gen. McGrath and 19 senior officials of the Justice Department.

2. McGrath was invited to appear in person March 28 at an open hearing of the House Judiciary Subcommittee investigating his administration of the Justice Department.

3. Morris announced that he had requested McGrath and 19 top officials of the Justice Department for detailed information about the financial affairs of themselves and their immediate families.

4. Joseph D. Nunan Jr., former commissioner of internal revenue, was closeted with House tax scandal investigators in a closely-guarded secret session. Nunan, who headed the bureau from 1944 to 1947, has come under the fire of Sen. Williams (R-De) for his subsequent legal efforts in behalf of clients in tax trouble with the federal government.

Morris, President Truman's No. 1 cleanup man, made it plain to reporters a month ago that the subpoena power was the basic tool in his investigation and said he would have to have it "to accomplish the mission."

When a reporter asked him late Tuesday whether he could function effectively without it, Morris said it would be of great value. Then he added: "It's like trying to ski with one hand behind your back. You have better balance with both hands."

Services for William Harvey Wilcox, late resident of 555 Ford St., will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Virgil T. Golden Chapel.

Wilcox was born at Lowellville, N. Y., Aug. 3, 1874, the son of Thomas and Harriet Wilcox. He graduated from Lowellville Academy after which he attended Clarkson College where he was the first civil engineer to graduate.

He married Sarah L. Lumbard of Webster, N. Y., June 4, 1918. He spent most of his life in New York State, coming to Oregon in 1936 where he worked for the Bonneville Power Administration laying out lines in the state of Washington. He later worked for the Oregon State Highway Commission.

Wilcox had been in poor health since 1944 at which time he had a stroke. He died Tuesday at his residence.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Sarah Wilcox, Salem; two daughters, Mrs. Harriet Leno, Grand Ronde, and Mrs. Jane Shreve, Bremerton, Wash., and seven grandchildren.

The body is to be cremated with interment at Webster, N. Y. The family asks that flowers be omitted.

Board Favors Beauty Parlor Zone Change

Salem Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday night gave tentative approval to a zone change petition which city officials said is being watched with interest by several doctors, beauticians and others wishing to carry on their vocations in homes.

The change from class I residential to a class III-X business zone restricted to beauty parlor use is sought by Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Dunn at 1180 N. 17th St. It will be subject of a public hearing before the zoners April 15, it was decided at the City Hall meeting of the commission last night.

In other action the zoning body recommended against curb sidewalks as requested of the City Council by Robert P. Mobley at 1285 S. 20th St. The Council is to be notified that the rejection is based on the needs of underground utility lines, the safety of children and the absence of any topographical reasons for an exception to established policy of requiring sidewalks to be laid one foot from the property line.

The State Capitol Planning Commission informed the zoners that it would not enter into the hearing of a requested business zone on Center Street adjacent to the capitol zone. Earlier the state group had asked a delay of the proceedings pending study.

Minnie Nickols Services Set At Lebanon

Mrs. Nickols is survived by two sons, Rex and John Nickols, both of Lebanon; a daughter, Mrs. Beuma Webber, Albany; a sister, Mrs. Alice Barton, of Lebanon; seven grandchildren; 15 great-grandchildren; one step-granddaughter; four step-great-grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral arrangements will be made by the Virgil T. Golden Company.

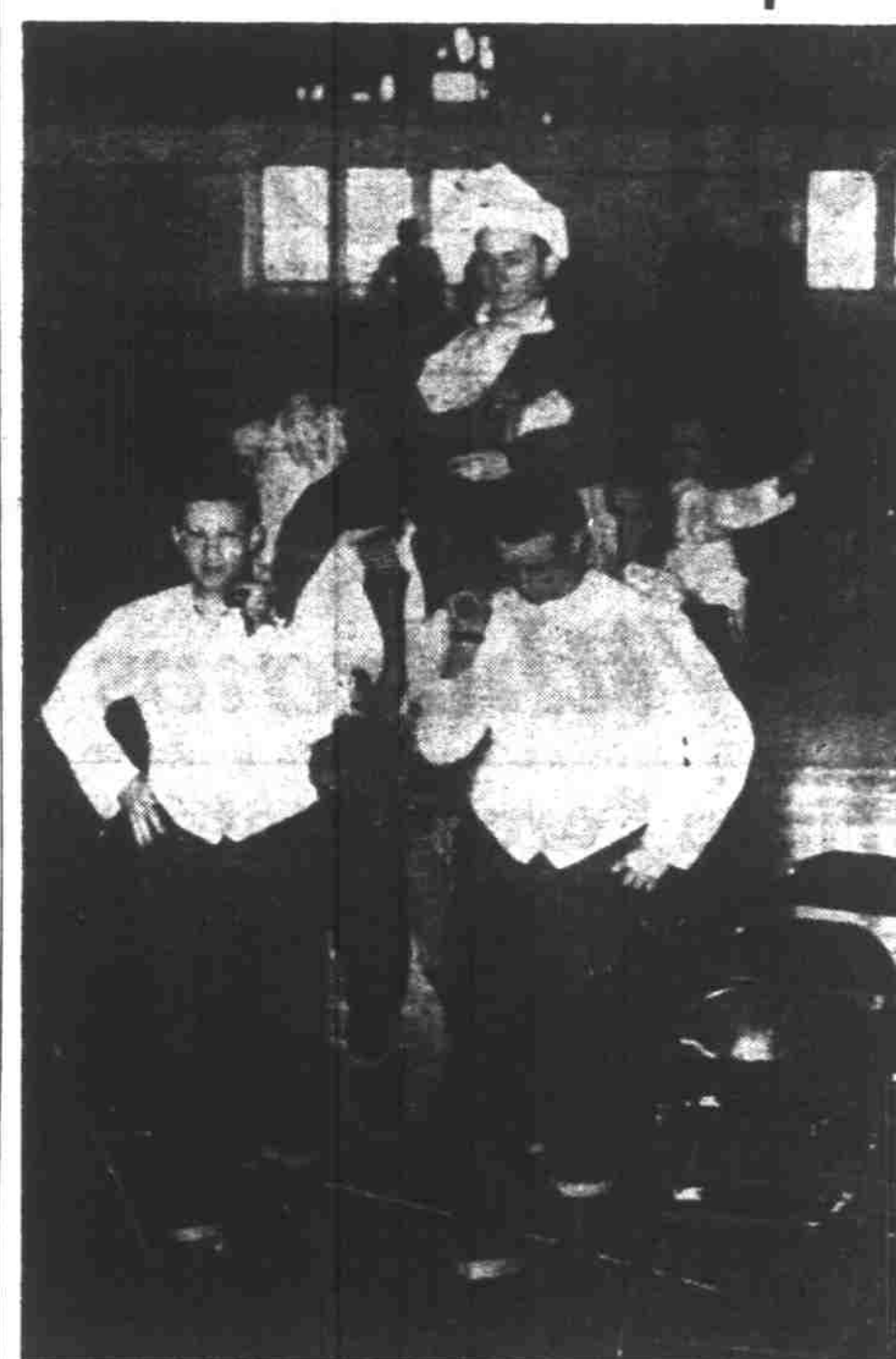
The baby died at a local hospital after having been rushed there by the parents Monday night when they reported to their doctor a noticeable labored breathing and fever.

Taft, Ike Split North Carolina Delegation

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)—The North Carolina's Republicans ended a rousing state convention here Tuesday, with backers of Sen. Taft and Gen. Eisenhower at odds over the division of the state's 26 national convention votes.

Conflicting claims came from both camps after the selection of four at-large delegates to the national convention completed organization of the Tar Heel delegation. The delegation as a body will go to Chicago in July unstructured.

An Associated Press poll of personal preference of delegates gave this lineup: Taft 13, Eisenhower six, and seven uncommitted or not expressing a preference.

2 Youths Fail in Try to Escape From Police

Two Portland youths, who made a futile attempt to escape from police custody Tuesday, were arrested for a Salem burglary and were being held in connection with "at least 10" recently in Portland.

The youths admitted in signed statements the burglary of the Home Bakery, 1380 N. Church St., Monday evening of about \$50. Police said some \$42 in coins was recovered, found in a small canvas bag the youths had at the time of their arrest.

Police said the youths slipped out of custody about 11 o'clock Tuesday morning while they were being put into a police car in front of a State Street hotel, where they had been located. The youths ran east on State Street.

A coordinated search by patrolmen, detectives and police cars finally resulted in their capture in back of the YMCA and the other on the Postoffice lawn.

During their flight, one of the youths dropped the canvas bag, and a passerby held it until claimed by police.

Jack Ray Trute, 18, admitted only the burglary of the bakery, police said. But his 17-year-old companion also confessed to about \$50 car prowls, all in the two days he has been in Salem in company with Trute. He also admitted, police said, about 10 Portland burglaries and more car prowls there.

Both youths are slated to appear today in Marion County district court. They are being held in city jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail each.
