

50 Volunteer Registrars to Seek Voters

Fifty volunteer voter registrars were sworn in en masse Wednesday night as Salem's drive to register all eligible voters gathered momentum for the kick-off next Monday.

Marion County Clerk Henry Mattson swore in the non-partisan volunteers at the Marion County Courthouse Wednesday night. The move to urge citizens to register and then vote was sparked by Mayor Alfred Loucks and is headed by Attorney Bruce Williams.

From March 24 to 29, inclusive, during regular banking hours a corps of members of the Salem League of Women Voters, directed by Mrs. Robert Gangware, will be on hand to register eligible voters at the Ladd and Bush branch of U. S. National, the Salem branch of the First National and the Willamette Valley banks.

Beginning March 31 voter registrars will be on duty at locations in each of the city's eight wards. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, except Sundays. Voters may also register at the Marion County clerk's office in the courthouse.

GERVAIS—Mrs. Charles Susee was "still shaky" Wednesday and still counting her lucky stars after a near-collision of a fast passenger train with her auto at the principal crossing here Monday evening.

Mrs. Susee's car stalled on the tracks about 6 p. m. as the northbound Cascade approached Gervais, just as the signal bells sounded.

She screamed for sons Vance 10, and Emil, 5, to get out of the car. They did. Meanwhile, their mother made a quick try to push her 1934 Chevrolet sedan and as she did so another auto approached the crossing.

The woman said she didn't know the two men in the car which made the push. She was told afterwards by persons nearby that the second car cleared the tracks when the train was only a few feet away.

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FBI Reveals Confession in Redfield Case

RENO, Nev. (AP)—Indications the rich Redfield burglary case was cracking wide open came Wednesday with the arrest of an eighth suspect and the first announced confession.

The FBI said Anthony Gazzigli, 41-year-old former Rochester, N. Y., resident, was arrested Wednesday and admitted participating in the 1½ million dollar burglary of millionaire LaVerne Redfield's Reno home.

Gazzigli's statement led to the recovery of \$27,000 more in Redfield's currency, numerous pieces of jewelry, and a package of securities. Not all of the jewelry has been identified yet as coming from the Redfield loot.

SFC Leonhart Of Woodburn Back in U.S.

SFC Joseph D. Leonhart, Woodburn, a career Army man, is on his way home today from San Francisco, having spent 11 months in Korea.

The sergeant returned to the United States aboard the U. S. Navy transport General W. F. Hase with 2,316 Army combat veterans from the Orient.

Leonhart's wife and three daughters, residents of Woodburn, reported that he called Tuesday night to tell of his arrival. She is planning a drive to Fort Lewis where she will meet him Saturday. He was in the Army four years during World War II and spent some time in India, Okinawa, China and other campaigns in the Pacific.

He is expected to be home for 30 days.

Three Cited on Liquor Charge

Howard Vincent Wurdinger, 19, from Woodburn, and two juveniles were cited Wednesday on a charge of illegal possession of intoxicating liquor by Marion County Sheriff's office.

The three, arrested in Brooks on a minor traffic violation, were released to their parents Wednesday night and ordered to appear in court today.

Condemnation Case Heard

Arguments on a motion for a new trial in the state capitol area condemnation suit were heard Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court.

Decision on the state's request to set aside the \$50,000 judgment granted Rose F. Stiff will be given within a few days, according to Judge George R. Duncan.

The state, which had offered \$36,000 for the two lots and house at Capitol and Center Streets, made the motion on the grounds that the jury granted "excessive damages, appearing to have been given under the influence of prejudice," of insufficient evidence to justify the verdict and of errors in law at the trial.

Bleakney Ruled Innocent in Assault Trial

The charge had resulted from a reported two-family battle in late February. Bleakney and his son were charged on complaints signed by members of the Ernest Hicks family. Hicks' son was charged on complaint signed by the Bleakneys.

Both boys are awaiting action in Marion County Juvenile Court.

Damage Suit Asks \$10,425

Suit for \$10,425 damages for injuries allegedly sustained in a North Capitol Street auto accident last July 10 was filed Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court.

Lena Burt filed the complaint against Mildred A. Smith and Mrs. Smith's husband, whose name was not known. Mrs. Burt was riding in a car driven by George F. Burt, her husband.

She asked \$10,000 general damages and \$425.75 for spinal injury, bruises, shock and aggravation of a cardiac condition allegedly suffered in the wreck.

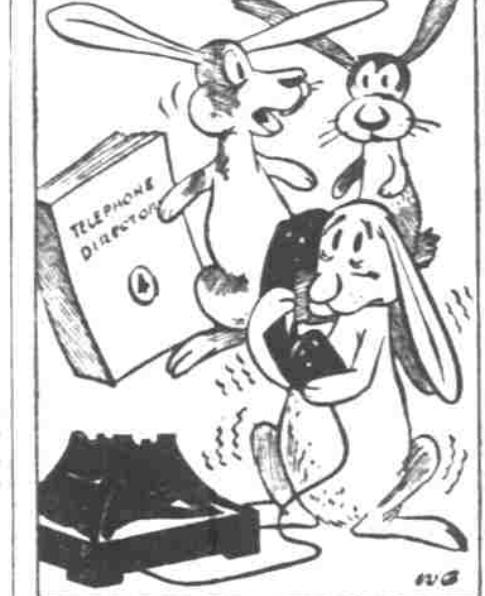
Lt. Col. Houghton Due in City Today
