## Posse Starts Pistol Team At Jefferson

JEFFERSON — Sheriff Denver Young was present for Thursday's meeting of the Jefferson company of sheriff's reserves, helping members form a pistol team. Doug Bradley and Leonard Meyers were elected range officers to help train the team. The meeting night of the company was changed from Thursday to Friday, meeting every two weeks, instead of every week. The next regular meeting will be on April 4.

There are 20 members in the Jefferson company. Officers are Leonard Meyers, captain; Ned Stephenson, top sergeant; Leland Wells, and Deimer Davidson, lieutenants; and George Armstrong, company clerk.

Much building is going on in the Oakdale addition on the Jefferson-Talbot road, opened in the past year by Frank Weddle. Besides a sawmill operated by Weddle and Rolland Dimmick, several houses are going up. Two houses from Camp Adair were brought in Tuesday, shipped down the river from Albany on a barge and unloaded at the Buena Vista ferry slip. Lloyd McCoy has started building a duplex on School Street between Second and Third Streets.

It is hoped that at this meeting a representative group of farmers will be present so that definite plans can be made. Leaders pointed out that farmers should have their say in its organization.

## Park Lights For Woodburn Up to Voters

WOODBURN — Woodburn voters will decide whether the town is to have night ball games when they cast ballots at the May 16 election to determine the advisability of setting aside \$10,000 of the money appropriated for the recreation and park board fund to provide payment for installing lights at Legion Park.
