

Arrest Unveils Opium Cache In Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—Federal narcotics agents arrested a San Francisco man today and seized four pounds of opium which they said had a "retail" value of \$100,000.

They identified the man as John David O'Keefe, 53, of San Francisco. He was charged with violation of the federal narcotics law. Agents said they had been tipped O'Keefe would arrive in Portland today. They were on hand at the Portland airport when O'Keefe climbed off a San Francisco passenger plane carrying the opium in a suitcase, they said.

They kept O'Keefe under surveillance until later in the day when he turned over a quantity of the opium, wrapped as a gift, to another man at a downtown intersection, the agents reported.

They then arrested O'Keefe and the other man who police so far have declined to identify.

The investigation is continuing, the narcotics agents said.

Red Cross Sends Word of Dixie Storm Victims

Three Salem families learned Tuesday through Red Cross headquarters that their loved ones are safe in the wake of the Arkansas tornado. One other family has not yet heard.

The three are Mrs. W. G. Gillespie, 1975 S. Cottage St., who was concerned about her sister in Indianapolis, Miss. Ed Denison who lives on the Boone Road in Salem sought information about relatives in Newbern, Tenn., and Mrs. Joseph H. Brown, 1640 N. Capitol St., who learned that her daughter in Truman, Ark., was safe.

Mr. R. B. Cross, 1294 Park Ave., had not yet learned Tuesday how his relatives are in Searcy, Ark., after this, one of the worst tornadoes to hit the South since 1881. A telegram from John S. Sinclair, National fund drive chairman for the Red Cross to Marion County fund drive chairman Harold F. Boss, Salem, indicates that "the tornado will cost at least \$5 million" in the seven-state disaster area.

Man Arrested On 3 Charges

Rotary Club's Career Advice Clinic Answers Youth's Queries

"Public relation people are born." "Do what you want to do." "Television is just around the corner."

This was the sort of advice given 212 Salem senior and junior high school students Tuesday night by a group of amateur adult career "specialists."

The occasion was the first Salem Youth Career night, held at Salem High School. More than 50 Salem business and professional men, all members of Salem Rotary Club, directed discussion sessions concerning their professions with 17 individual groups of students. The students were ninth graders and high school members.

"The program was a big success," said Claude Miller, Rotary chairman of the night. "I think this will be a permanent annual affair."

All of the advisers said their "classes" showed lots of interest and asked many questions.

A group of students interested in law asked their instructors, Edward O. Stadler, Jr., and Roy Harland, if the prestige of a law school meant much to a beginning attorney. Both lawyers said that the name of a well-known law school did not matter as much to the beginning attorney as did a sound knowledge of law.

Wait for Specialization
In a medical discussion group, conducted by Dr. Willard Stone, the question was often asked: "Should I begin thinking now of specialization in my medical career?" Dr. Stone advised the students to wait until they are in medical school before they start worrying about special practice.

Dave Hoss invited his practice in the radio-television class to visit him at the radio station where he worked so that he could give each more time.

William H. Baillie instructed a group of 24 students, who were not sure what vocation they wanted to follow. Baillie outlined the fields of endeavor which needed workers. These include nursing, social services and many others, including the field of public relations, which Baillie said was "wide open."

"Do what you want to do in life, and you'll be happiest," the Rev. Brooks Moore advised his group in religion and youth service. "But start in doing it early," he added.

College Advised
Gordon Gilmore, in the same panel, advised those interested in youth work to get through college. He said that by helping out in youth groups while still in high school and college young persons can readily determine the field for which they are best suited.

The medicine and nursing class, including physical therapy and dental hygiene, drew the highest number of students, 35. Other magnetic classes were choosing a Vocation with 24 students: Engineering and Architecture, 22; Business Administration, 19; and Radio and Television and Air Transport, 16 each.

No student showed up, however, for the important panels of Banking, Real Estate and Insurance, General Contracting and Food Processing.

A dozen students participated in the Publishing discussion group. Charles A. Sprague and Robert Sprague, publisher and advertising manager of The Statesman, covered the fields of newspaper advertising and editorial work.

The career night was sponsored by the Salem Rotary Club, and the Hi-Y and Tri-Y Clubs of the local YMCA and YWCA. In a preliminary ceremony William Baillie explained the purpose of the program. Gary Gortmaker, chairman of the student committee, thanked the Rotarians for their efforts.

He was treated for a two-inch cut on the left arm, several cuts and scratches on both legs, hands and arms and a cut on his head. He was advised to get tetanus shots.

Ronald Brown, eight-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo G. Brown, 1396 N. Commercial St., suffered a three-quarter inch cut on his forehead and a two-inch cut requiring sutures on the top of his head. The lad stumbled and fell while playing near his home.

Bill Blackburn, 2365 Rex St., a 13-year-old, was playing near his home when he was struck with a heavy object thrown by a playmate. He suffered a one and one-half inch scalp cut which required sutures.

Bitter Battle in Steel Formula Dispute Eases

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bitter row between high government officials over wage policy for steel calmed down somewhat Tuesday night—and they called for teamwork in an effort to avert a strike of 650,000 steelworkers threatened for April 8.

The big issue of just what concessions should be granted to the CIO steelworkers union remained unsettled, however, and the whole situation contained explosive elements. It could play hob with the administration's drive for an extension of the price-wage control act.

The day saw union and industry leaders swap bitter statements, and the House Rules Committee voted 7 to 4 for an investigation of the Wage Stabilization Board (WSB), center of the controversy. The fight started when the board, with industry members dissenting vigorously, proposed 17 1/2 cents an hour pay boosts, plus other major benefits, for the steelworkers.

Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson last night blasted the recommendation as inflationary, but today he issued a statement seeking to pour oil on the troubled waters.

He said he realizes the recommendations were reached "after much study by a duly constituted government agency." Therefore, he said, they can "be used as a basis" for trying to head off a strike. He called for a united effort to that end.

Wage Board Chairman Nathan Feinsinger, who interrupted a mid-west speaking tour to fly back to Washington, expressed optimism on his arrival here.

Although dissenting industry members of the wage board were calling for its dissolution as a breeder of inflation, Feinsinger said he believed the board would remain in business.

"I think things are back on the track," he told reporters. "From all I can gather the steelworkers union and the steel companies have a big job ahead in bargaining new contracts and they ought to be left alone so they can get their job done and not be heckled."

Professor Named As Morse Aide

WASHINGTON (AP)—William Berg Jr., professor of law at the University of Colorado, was named Monday as administration assistant to Sen. Morse (R-Ore.).

Berg will resign his teaching post and assume his new duties April 18. He succeeds Ivar Peterson, named recently to the National Labor Relations Board.

Berg graduated from the University of Oregon law school in 1931. He became a member of the Portland, Ore., law firm of Berg, Jones and Russell in 1936.

Mrs. Matten Succumbs to 2-Year Illness

The death of Mrs. Ann Matten Tuesday in a local hospital was reported by her relatives. She had been ill for more than two years.

With the exception of eight years spent in Nebraska, Mrs. Matten has lived in Salem since she was married here in 1891. She and her husband were married at her parents' farm east of Salem in 1891 and they lived there and celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on the same farm. Her husband, a farmer and fruit grower, died in 1945.

She studied at Willamette University prior to her marriage. She was a charter member of the RNA (Royal Neighbors Association) of Salem and a member of the First Christian Church.

Survivors are daughters, Mrs. Lena Lauderback, Salem and Mrs. Alta Rycraft, Watsonville, Calif.; a son, George C., Covina, Calif.; sisters, Mrs. Sarah Yoder and Mrs. Elma Overholzer, both of Covina, Calif.; Mrs. Wilhelmina Lund, Big Bear, Calif., and Mrs. Elizabeth Blanchard, Bass Lake, Calif.; seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.
