Sweet and Lovely

Angel Pie, Peach Custard, Among Pies That Make Party Refreshment

How about some recipes for luscious pies, the kind we healthy ladies love so much but shouldn't eat? Now take pineapple pie, for instance:

PINEAPPLE WHIPPED CREAM PIE
1 No. 2½ can crushed pineapple
1 cup sugar
Pinch of salt
Cook pineapple with sugar, salt and lemon juice. Thicken with cornstarch. Pour into unbaked shell and bake for 30 minutes. Let cool and serve topped with whipped cream.
Peach Custard pie is one we find in Mother's recipe file and which goes this way:

PEACH CUSTARD PIE
½ cup flour
½ cup sugar
Pinch of salt
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 cups hot liquid
2 tablespoons flour
2 egg yolks
½ teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon almond
Peaches

Meringue
Measure peach juice and add enough hot water to make the two cups liquid. Combine flour, sugar and salt and add to liquid. Cook in double boiler until thick. Add flour and slightly beaten yolks. Cook two minutes longer, let cool. Add vanilla, almond and lemon juice. Arrange sliced peaches in baked crust, add custard then more peaches and top with meringue made from 3 whites, 6 teaspoons sugar and ½ teaspoon lemon juice. Bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

Angel pie is one of those elegant recipes we are served occasionally at parties and which make such nice refreshments.

ANGEL PIE
½ cup cornstarch
¼ cup hot water
¼ cup pineapple juice
Blend sugar, salt, cornstarch and gradually add water and juice. Cook in double boiler and stir constantly until thick. Fold in beaten whites slowly and add vanilla. Put in baked shell and top with whipped cream.
You may use crushed pineapple instead of juice.
And do you remember the Black Bottom and how the pie of the same name was also popular? Here's one version:

BLACK BOTTOM PIE
2 teaspoons plain gelatine
¼ cup cold water
3 egg yolks
1 cup milk
½ cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon salt
3 egg whites
Sprinkle gelatine over cold water and allow to soak. Make custard of yolks, milk, sugar and salt. Put in gelatine. Add vanilla and divide the filling in half. To one part add ½ squares chocolate melted, and to the other ½ teaspoon rum flavoring. Add half the beaten whites to each part and cool mixtures. When cool and beginning to thicken, pour chocolate part into a baked pie shell and cover with the rum flavored portion. Top with a thin layer of sweetened whipped cream and shave unsweetened chocolate over it.
