Recitation of the Rosary will be at St. Joseph's in Portland Sunday evening with Requiem high mass there Monday morning. The Reverend died Friday at a Portland hospital.

The Rev. Huesser was born in Hermetschwil, Switzerland, in June, 1883. He studied in Switzerland and finished his study at Mt. Angel, being ordained to priesthood Sept. 27, 1911. While at Mt. Angel he was associated with the orchestra and taught music as well as foreign languages at the seminary.

He was pastor at Tillamook, Ore., and was later assistant pastor at Mt. Angel.

He travelled to Switzerland last summer to visit with his many relatives and friends there. He is reported to have been suffering failing health for some time prior to his death.

Surviving are a brother, Martin Huesser of Portland, and a number of relatives in Switzerland. Interment will be at the Abbey Cemetery in Mt. Angel.
