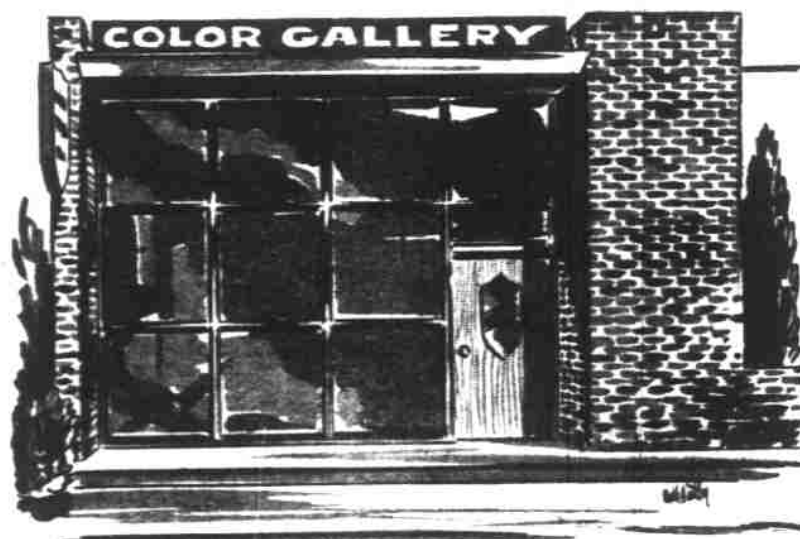

Annual Spring Crop of Wool Buyers 'Slim'

Wool growers are shrugging their shoulders and reporting that "likely we'll have to store our wool for a year. It'll give us more time to indulge in politics."

Wool buyers, says Peter Oblague, one of the executive committeemen of the Oregon Wool Growers, are "quite conspicuous by their absence this spring in contrast with last year this time. This must be the hangover following the orgy of 1951."

Roy Ward, manager of the Oregon Wool Growers Cooperative, visiting in the valley during recent days, reported he wished he could take a "vacation of about a year." Everyone, he said, wants to know what "we are going to pay for wool this year and when we will buy."

Ward expects word from Washington, D. C., early this week on the wool loan support program for 1952. This support program, he added, is to be charged on shorn wool this year. Prices are to be supported through a loan program. In the past, a purchase program has been used. Pulled wool on the other hand will continue to be supported by a purchase program. Shorn wool eligible for loans must meet certain requirements. The title must be in the producer's name. The wool must be in an approved warehouse and must be in a merchantable condition.

Predicts Prices

Ward added there were buyers who would like to buy valley wool now at around 35 cents, but he believed it would start out at around 45 to 50 cents. The loan, he said, was expected to be 58 to 60 cents a pound.

Approximately 25 per cent of last year's cooperative clip sold at prices "sky high," Ward reported, but around 75 per cent is not yet sold. Some form of amortization will be worked out whereby those receiving the high prices last spring will be leveled with those receiving the lower price. This, Ward believed, would have to take place over a period of five or six years, but "it will work out well," he believed, adding that this was "the purpose of a real cooperative—everybody share somewhat alike."

Prices Were High

He recalled that last spring at this time, offers were mounting toward \$1.50 a pound, with some actually sold at \$1.35 and \$1.36. This was, Ward said, by far away the highest prices he had ever seen for wool in the 32 years he had been associated with the Wool Growers cooperative. The cooperative started around 1920 at a time when buyers were offering eight cents a pound and were not eager to buy. In 1932, too, the price dropped to the eight cent low, he said.

Wool prices in the opinion of most growers who attended the Oregon Agricultural conference at

Corvallis this past week, would go up early next year. Many stated they would refuse to sell at current prices because "we can't come out even." The huge inventory of wool, brought about by the frenzied buying last year when frenzied became rampant, said the Munitions Board would stockpile as much as 500 million pounds of wool, are working off. Woolmen are optimistic for the long pull. If this country, they say, is to have 165 million people by 1960 they propose to increase the nation's flocks by 10 million sheep. A lot of wool is going to be worn.

Powers Creek Canyon Road Poses Problem

A new approach to a better road across Powers Creek Canyon was authorized Monday after Marion County Surveyor A. D. Graham reported he had been run off properties twice in his survey.

Graham's department is surveying to find an easier grade for the road, in country northeast of Siletz to ad ear Porter School. The present winding road has some grades of more than 20 per cent. Residents of the area requested the change, in order to facilitate hauling of strawberries. Because of that, the county will not buy right-of-way, but it must be furnished by the property owners.
