## Truce Hopes Deflated by Brief Meeting

MUNSON (AP)—Hopes for a speedy Korean compromise truce were deflated Saturday by an Allied negotiator after a brief 20-minute session with the Reds at Panmunjom.

Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison told newsmen that Communist statements in the conference tent offer "no solution" to the problems holding up agreement on armistice supervision.

Communist newsmen Friday hinted the Reds were ready to compromise: the Communists would drop their demand that Russia be named one of the neutral nations to supervise the truce if the Allies would allow the rebuilding of North Korean military airfields during an armistice.

Saturday Harrison poured cold water on the Red-inspired reports. He said:

"They haven't said anything about it. I can't negotiate on the basis of hints or what is said on the road by Red newsmen."

There were no new developments in the dispute about exchanging prisoners of war. The staff officers Friday recessed indefinitely to explore separately "additional avenues" of solving the complex problem.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway also hinted at compromise Friday. He indicated to correspondents a give-and-take agreement was the only possible solution.

In Saturday's session Harrison told the Reds they were violating a previous agreement with their insistence on Russia as a neutral inspector.

He also told them "if, in the interests of gaining a stable armistice, you agree to this restriction on airfields, it can in no way be considered as interference by us in your internal affairs."

Chinese Gen. Hsieh Fang, Communist sub-delegate, replied that the Reds have "fully and clearly" expressed their view and did not wish to repeat "old arguments."

Ridgway's remarks Friday came after an extraordinary convocation of his top chiefs with Allied truce negotiators.

## Committee to Plan Memorial Day Program

A committee to plan a Salem Memorial Day program was named at a meeting of the Salem Federation of Patriotic Societies Friday night at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall.

The committee was appointed by Dr. Roy Scofield, president, and included D. B. Parks, chairman, and John Apperson, Charles Kinzer, Ora Furlough and Mrs. Frances Briggs.

James Callaway was appointed chairman of a committee to compile a permanent list of deceased veterans who are buried in Salem cemeteries and who have no next of kin to care for their graves. The Federation will meet again on May 8 to complete Memorial Day plans.

## Willamette's Rifle Team Ranks 112th

Two Willamette University AF-ROTC rifle teams placed 112th and 158th out of 220 over the country in recent competition. Maj. Norman W. Campion announced.

The Willamette men had only two months' training before the competition, but placed ahead of veteran rifle teams from such universities as Idaho, California, Duke and Harvard.

## Short Handled Shovels Don't Apply



In the days of Samuel Lancaster and the other Highway Pioneers, the scenic loops and curves and grades of the Columbia Highway were built far above the river, with picks and shovels, mules and men; also black powder, star drills and a sleds. But, when the Moderns ironed out the curves, took the grades down along the water-front and blasted their way through the foot of the bluffs, they did it with huge suction dredges, dynamite, bulldozers and derrick oil. They made the barn-sized boulders into base material to fill the low spots until now you never feel a bump when you ride the road between Dodson and Bonneville where the boulders blocked the way when the above picture was taken. Construction like that costs approximately a third of a million dollars per mile.

## Both Views Expressed in DST Question

Letters are arriving at the executive department here both favoring and opposing Daylight Saving Time in Oregon this year. Gov. Douglas McKay said he had not given the proposal for fast time any consideration.

Virtually all radio station operators favor Daylight Saving Time which, they said would coordinate their programs with those in many other states. Farmers generally are opposed to fast time.

The law provides that the governor may proclaim fast time in operation when he is convinced that the economy of Oregon is endangered by the adoption of Daylight Saving Time in adjoining states. The State Grange is sponsoring an initiative measure providing for continuous operation of Standard Time in Oregon.

This measure will be on the ballot at the general election next November.

## Negro Pair Claims Race Blocked Job

PORTLAND (AP)—Nathan W. Nickerson and Theophilus Jermahy, Portland Negroes, Friday filed charges with the State Labor Commissioner contending they had been refused employment because of their race.

They said they took civil service examinations for appointment as enforcement inspectors for the State Liquor Commission. Labor Commissioner W. E. Kim said, after a meeting of the Fair Employment Practices Advisory Committee, that the cases were "in a fair way toward settlement."

He said he had taken the matter up with the Liquor Commission and that he had been assured that a solution would be reached.

## Quinn Admits Taking Hand In Tax Cases

WASHINGTON (AP)—T. Vincent Quinn, district attorney of Queens county in New York, testified Friday that he took a hand in a number of federal tax cases in the 14 months after his election to Congress.

He said he did not knowingly share in any fees from civil tax cases and said he has been told it is not a violation of the law for a member of Congress to participate in criminal cases.

"While the statute apparently prohibits, in effect it does not" bar Congressmen from taking part in cases involving criminal action of "cases with a criminal angle," Quinn told a House Ways and Means subcommittee.

## Fallander Promoted To Commander Rank

Stanley R. Fallander, executive officer for the Salem Naval Air Facility, has been advanced from the rank of lieutenant to that of commander, it was reported Friday.

Fallander was transferred to Salem in 1949 and took over command of the Air Facility when it was started April 1, 1952. He enlisted in the navy in 1942. He graduated from Oregon State College and was with a reserve outfit there when transferred to Salem.

During World War II he served in the Pacific theater from 1944 to 1945 with an anti-submarine patrol. He was stationed at Alameda Calif. and later in Texas.
