Traditional Food

Good Friday Feature, Hot Cross Buns Better Known of Specialties

This Lenten season is one closely bound by feasting and fasting traditions. Before the beginning of Lent certain foods are traditionally eaten in the European countries, but it is on Good Friday that our most familiar Easter food appears.

Hot cross buns, those fruity, sweet rolls with the characteristic cross of frosting, thought rightly to be served only on Good Friday, are familiar to Americans for several weeks before that day.

PRE EASTER FOOD
On Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday, Judases (small rolls cut and scored to represent the rope with which Judas hung himself) were served in some countries in Europe while spinach was served with bundas kenyer (white bread rolled in egg, salt and crumbs and fried) were the traditional fare in Hungary.

The Russians serve an odd sweet bread on Good Friday, called variously Koulitchy, Kulich and Koulitch. The bread is made of a sweet egg dough, with currants and almonds. It is baked in a round tin—usually something like a one-pound coffee or lard tin. The dough is made into a bun-like shape, put into the greased tin so it is half filled. When risen, the dough comes to the top of the tin, and when baked it swells out over the edge and forms curiously shaped loaves, which are then iced and decorated.

Scandinavian countries served fish, and some of the mid-European ate boiled wheat and dried fruit blessed and presented at the church. Hot Cross buns originated in England.

If you're a yeast bread maker, perhaps a batch of Hot Cross buns will interest you for Good Friday. Though one can use a standard roll recipe and add some few extra ingredients, here is one made especially:

HOT CROSS BUNS
2 cups scalded milk 1/2 cup shredded peel or citron
1/2 cup sugar 2 cakes yeast
10 cups flour (approx.) 2 eggs
1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup lukewarm water
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon 1/2 cup raisins
1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup currants

Stir shortening, sugar in milk over fire to dissolve. Remove and when lukewarm add yeast that has been dissolved in water. Add remaining ingredients, using enough flour to make a soft but not sticky dough. Knead until smooth, and make into long roll. Pinch off, make into buns. Let rise on an oiled tray until double in bulk. Brush each with egg yolk mixed with water and cut across with a sharp knife. Bake 25 to 30 minutes at 375 to 400 degrees.

While still warm, outline a cross on the top with uncooked icing and using the remainder of the egg yolk. Makes 3 dozen buns.
