

Woman's Body Discovered In Mill Creek

The body of an elderly woman found early Saturday morning floating in the Mill Stream in back of 869 N. Liberty St., was identified by police and the Marion County coroner office as Mrs. Ada Kelley of 340 Division St.

Identification was made Saturday evening by two friends, with whom Mrs. Kelley had visited Friday afternoon. They were Mrs. Olive Reddway of 1421 N. Church St., and Mrs. Mary E. Mann of 1465 N. Church St. They told Les-ton W. Howell, county coroner, and police that Mrs. Kelley had seemed "agitated."

She lived alone in a basement apartment. She has one cousin in Salem, Lloyd A. Roe of 1895 N. Summer St., and a daughter, Enid V. Decker in California.

Mrs. Kelley's body was found about 7:20 a.m. Saturday morning by Arlie Bean, bakery truck driver who said he feeds the ducks daily from the bridge behind Larmer's warehouse. He contacted the manager of the warehouse who informed police.

The woman, who was 77, was fully clothed when discovered. Howell said death came by drowning and no autopsy was planned.

Pending funeral arrangements, the body is at the Howell-Edwards Funeral Home.

USAF Shows Picture of New All-Jet Bomber

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force Saturday released a picture of its second type of all-jet heavy bomber, the needle-nosed, swept-wing Convair.

The picture appears to suggest the Air Force may no longer use visual bombing for the huge strategic war planes, depending entirely on radar aiming to attack while flying miles above the target. The "chin" of the B-60's forward section contains no windows such as are presently used by bombardiers in visually sighting for an A-bomb drop.

Following a precedent set when the first model of the B-52 heavy bomber appeared in the open, the Air Force took the only available picture of the B-60 after its roll-out from the Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp.'s plant at Fort Worth, Tex.—and asked that the public and the press take no others.

The picture was carefully angled to give the least information on configuration, including the degree of sweep-back of the wings. The photograph had been retouched to conceal details of the landing gear. The eight J-57 Pratt and Whitney jet engines are hung on outriggers, in pairs.

The carefully phrased Air Force announcement of the roll out of the B-60 gave no details.

DALLAS — With legal hurdles cleared, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Eakin Sr. of Dallas are now looking forward to October, when the adopted granddaughter they saw in Germany will come to this country.

The baby, Tony Lee, was adopted by Lt. and Mrs. John B. Eakin Jr. in Stuttgart, Germany, but it took an act of Congress to make her an American citizen. That act was just signed by President Truman.

Tony Lee will be two in July, and her parents plan to come back to Dallas in October at the completion of Eakin's tour of European duty. He is making a career of the Army.

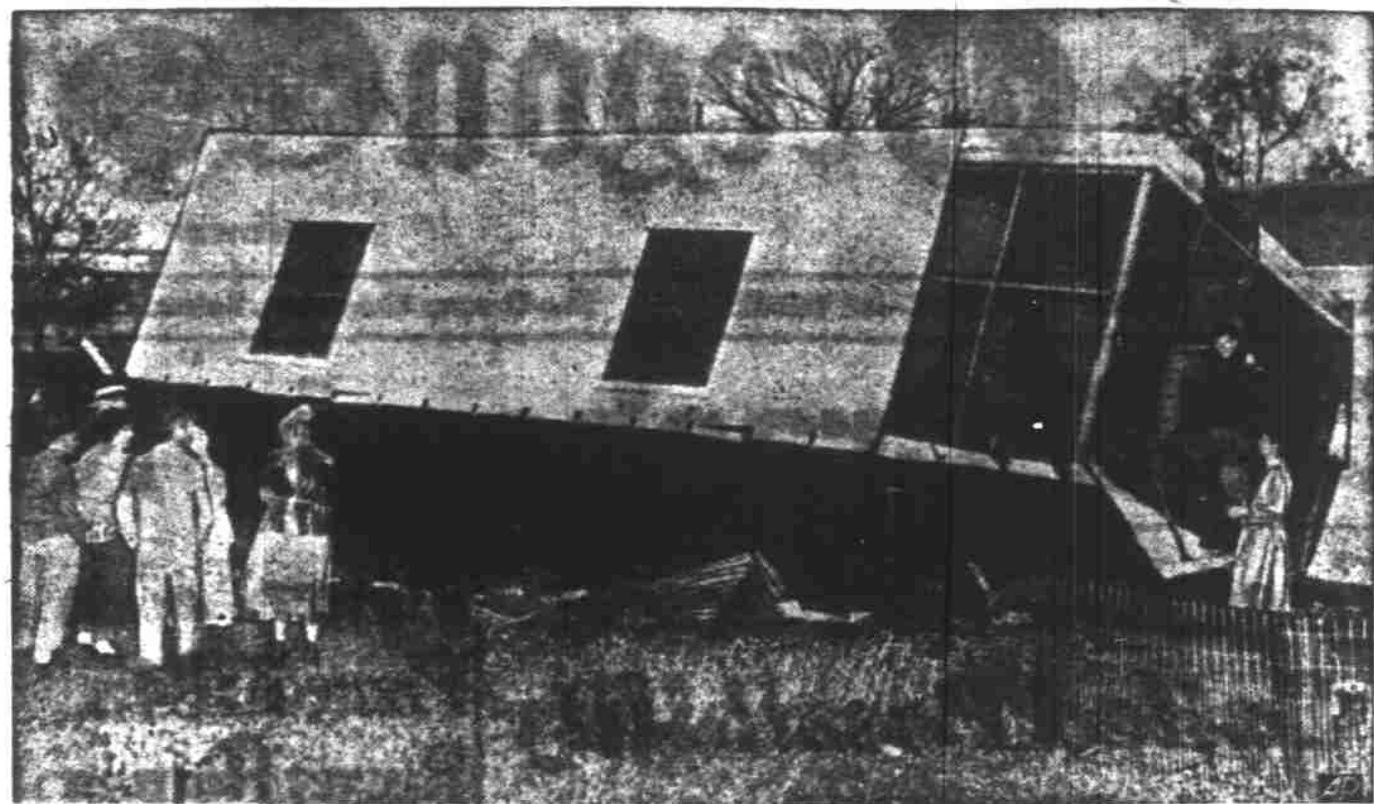

McCarran Plans 'Full FBI Check' On McGranery

WASHINGTON (AP) — A "full FBI check" on James P. McGranery, President Truman's choice to be new attorney general, has been ordered by Sen. McCarran (D-Nev.).

McCarran, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, told a reporter he had ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation to make a complete report "as a routine matter" before the committee considers the nomination.

The committee is due to meet Monday, but McCarran said it probably will be 10 days or longer before it acts on the McGranery nomination. The committee will vote to recommend or reject the appointment before McGranery's name goes before the full Senate for confirmation.

Rep. Hillings (R-Calif.) said, meanwhile, that "the full responsibility for a sincere cleanup rests on McGranery's shoulders and he must not be permitted to sidestep it by placing the blame on the FBI for a possible failure of his mission."

Final Services Set Tuesday For Mrs. Scott

Funeral services will be held in the Virgil T. Golden Chapel at 2 p.m. Tuesday for Mrs. Alma Evelyn Scott, Canadian-born resident of Salem since 1927, who died Saturday after a long illness.

She formerly lived at 1060 Mill St. Her husband, to whom she was married in 1905 in Summerville, Mass., preceded her in death in 1946. Mrs. Scott was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia and spent her girlhood in Boston, Mass.

After her marriage she lived in Calgary, Alberta, Canada until coming to Salem.

Very active in church affairs, she was a member of the Jesus Name Pentecostal Church.

Survivors are daughters, Mrs. William Davies and Mrs. Francis Mast, both of Salem; sons, Lawrence and Colin, also of Salem; Allen of El Centro, Calif., and Fred of Marshfield, Wis.; a brother, Charles Abbott of Vancouver, B. C., and 10 grandchildren. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial Park.

C. of C. to Hear Neuberger

State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Portland will be the speaker at Salem Chamber of Commerce luncheon Monday noon in the Senator Hotel. His topic will be "Let's Have Good Government in Oregon."

B-29 Explodes In California

SACRAMENTO (AP) — A B-29 weather plane exploded in flight and plunged into a field with a shattering crash Saturday night. A crew of 12 was believed aboard the big four engine plane.

The big plane hit in flat farm country three miles south of Roseville, 18 miles northeast of Sacramento.

Sheriff's Deputy Edward Synniski said a squad car had called for more ambulances after the first alert.

"I guess there are some dead or injured out there," he said.

The B-29 had radioed it was coming in for a landing at McClellan Air Force Base when it blew up.

Germ Warfare Study to Get More Money

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army appeared certain Saturday to receive more funds from Congress next year to study bacteriological warfare and to improve defenses against it.

After hearing secret testimony in this military field, Chairman Sikes (D-Fla.) of the House appropriations subcommittee said: "The United States is at least on a par" with Russia and other countries in germ warfare, "but I don't think this field is being stressed enough."

He emphasized that the program presented by military officials was concerned primarily with studying means of protecting American lives, crops and livestock from any germ attack. But he told a reporter it is designed also to permit the United States, "if necessary, to carry the war to the other fellow."

Hugh Herndon, Round-World Flyer Dies

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Hugh Herndon, 47, partner of Clyde Pangborn on a famous round-the-world flight in 1931, died here Friday night after a heart attack.

Herndon was regional director of operations here for the Trans-World Airlines. He had lived in Cairo five years.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Herndon of New York; his wife, the former Ruth Claiborne; and a son and daughter by a former marriage.

Herndon and Pangborn created a diplomatic incident when they landed without permit in Japan on their 1931 flight.

At that time Japan had already embarked on her Manchuria conquest.

The Tokyo government accused the two flier of taking pictures and spying on military installations. However, they were permitted to pay fines for violating civil aviation regulations.

Taking off from Japan in their single-engine plane, Pangborn and Herndon flew 4,500 miles to Wenatchee, Wash., in 41 hours.

The finals July 17 in Portland Civic Auditorium will pit Payne and Springer against the winners of similar contests being held currently in 14 other cities. Winner of that will get a free trip to Hollywood, and a year's supply of clothing.

Second place winner in the senior division — for those between 12 and 18 — was Mary Jane Wait, 14, Rickreall, a baton twirler. A buck and wing act by two Salem girls, Jean Gebauer and Carol Long, took third place.

In the junior division, for those between 6 and 12, Terri Meisinger's accordion solo took first place. Allen Currier, 12, with a piano solo, was second, and a military tap dance by Barbara Markham and Colleen Patton both 7, was third.

Judges for the three-hour show were Guy Hickok, Robert Letts Jones, Fran Kimmell, Mrs. C. B. Hills and Wendell Webb.

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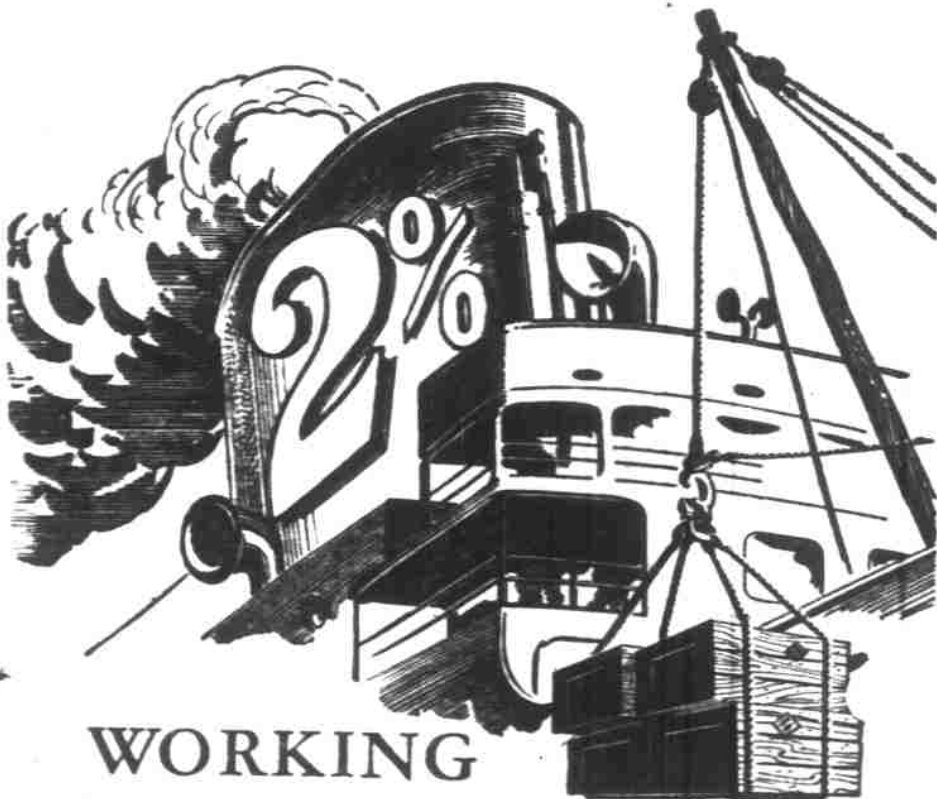
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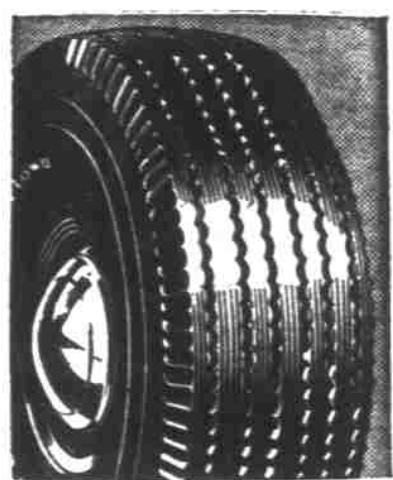
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
