## Hatfield Reports Ike Campaign Advancing on Statewide Basis

"A statewide campaign in behalf of General Eisenhower already is in progress and the voters in every county in the state will be contacted," Mark Hatfield, secretary of the Eisenhower drive, said Sunday in Salem.

"County and community Eisenhower clubs are being organized and we have been promised some outstanding speakers by the National Eisenhower headquarters," he said.

Reports that Oregon's "Eisenhower for President" campaign is "going to seed" were denied by Hatfield, who is a state representative and Willamette University faculty member.

"These reports apparently were inspired with a view of leading some voters to believe the committee does not intend to conduct more than a passing campaign," Hatfield said. "Such reports (by the opposing political camps) are false and misleading," he added.

Meeting Planned

William L. Phillips, president of the Eisenhower for President Committee, indicated recently that a meeting of the committee would be called here soon to outline additional plans for the campaign. Committee headquarters are in Salem. Hatfield said a large amount of Eisenhower literature has been sent to county groups.

Oregon is to elect 18 delegates to the Republican National Convention at the May 16 primary, including 10 from the state at large and two from each of the four congressional districts.

## Hanford Atom Plant Mecca For Teachers

WASHINGTON — The Hanford atomic energy plant at Richland, Wash., may become a mecca for science teachers throughout the Pacific Northwest, as a link in bringing the mysteries of atomic developments to every school boy and girl.

Washington State school officials met Monday in Seattle with Hanford representatives to discuss details of providing courses for high school teachers in the ABCs of atomic energy and recent experiments in the use of radioactive materials.

Rep. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), a member of the joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee, who arranged the meeting, said a similar program could be worked out with Oregon's state school officials.

"There are many useful things concerning atomic energy that are not secret," said Jackson, "and they should be passed on to teacher for use in the classroom."

Under the proposed program Hanford officials would instruct the teachers in a series of special courses, which could be taken during a two-week summer session or one-a-week for 15 weeks. The Atomic Energy Commission suggests that credit toward a high degree be granted those completing the courses.

The AEC has arranged an outline of suggested courses, many in the use of radioisotopes for classroom lectures and demonstrations. The isotopes would be provided at no cost from the Oak Ridge plant, though later they will be available at Hanford, Jackson said.

Details as to where the courses would be given, at Hanford or one of the state's universities could be worked out in meetings with state officials.

The AEC said the high schools could inaugurate new courses based on those for the teachers with only the addition of a Geiger Counter to their laboratory equipment. The Washington State program will be the first on a statewide basis. It began in New York City.

The number of civil aircraft active in Marion County has dropped from last year, records of the Civil Aeronautics Administration reveal.

Linn County continued to lead Marion and maintained its third place rank in Oregon with 87 active craft, less of one from last year. Polk County reported 7 active planes, up two over 1951. Yamhill County held even at 31 for both years; Clackamas was down to 23 from 31.

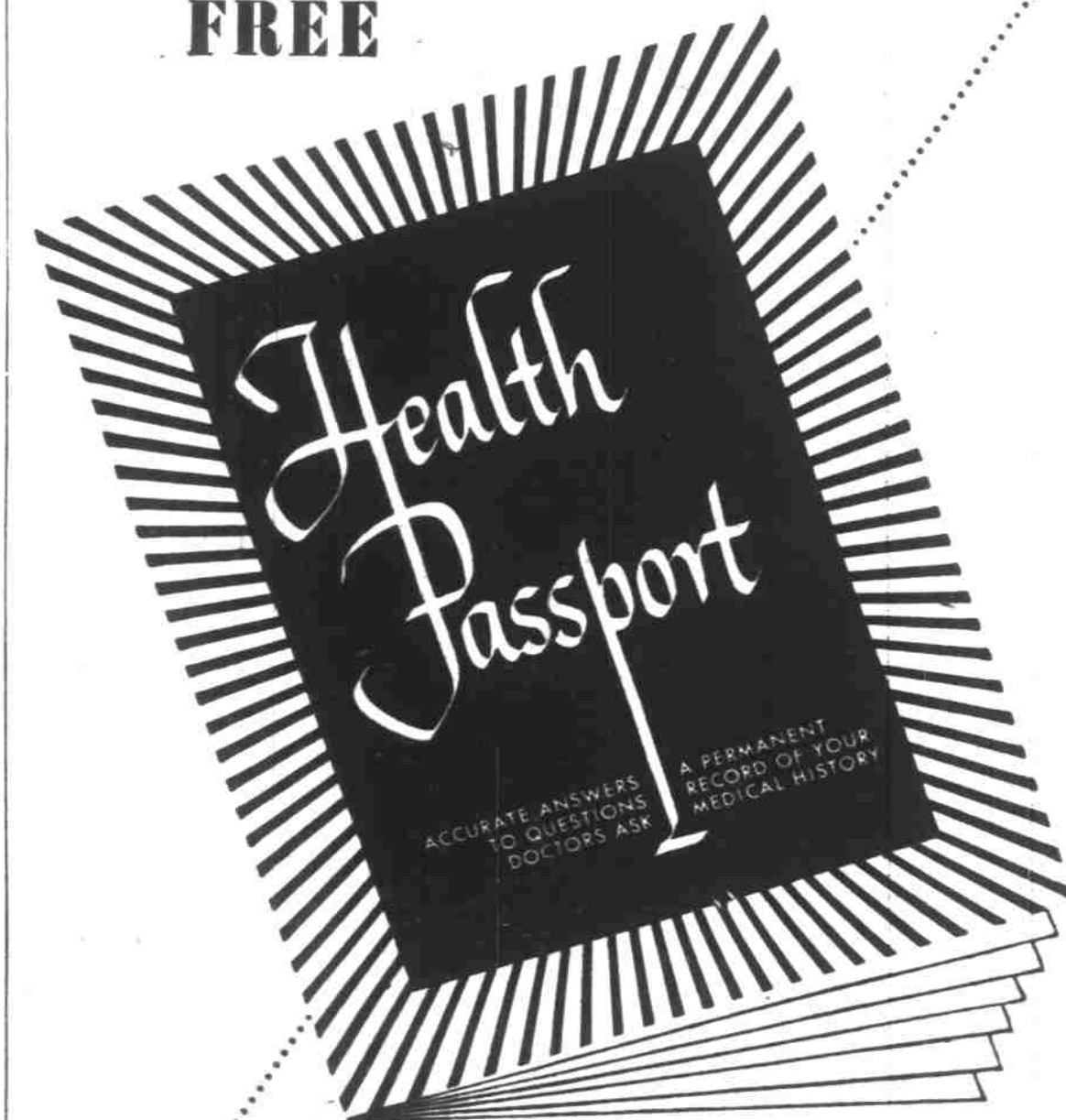
