Neuberger Forecasts Growing Democrat Party Power in State

Democrats will come to power in Oregon state government, just as the Republicans will eventually take over the national administration, it was predicted in Salem Monday by State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, a Portland Democrat.

"If only by weight of inertia, this will happen," he said of both predictions, adding that he didn't believe one party should remain in control too long. He spoke before Salem Chamber of Commerce at luncheon in the Senator Hotel.

Neuberger said two-party government is as important in state government as in national government and requires a responsible political opposition.

"So it's really too bad," he went on to say, "that you businessmen always seem to be Republicans." The senator said the Oregon Democrats could stand better leadership "so it won't be the party it has been in the legislature" by the time it comes into legislative power here.

Neuberger noted that Oregon hasn't had a Democratic legislature since 1878.

Speaking on "Better Government for Oregon," he urged legislative reapportionment, consolidation of small school districts and small counties, less influence on legislation by "special interests" and better tax legislation by elected legislators who have made their tax stand known to the voters.

Here's how Neuberger said he stood on taxes: A cigarette tax for

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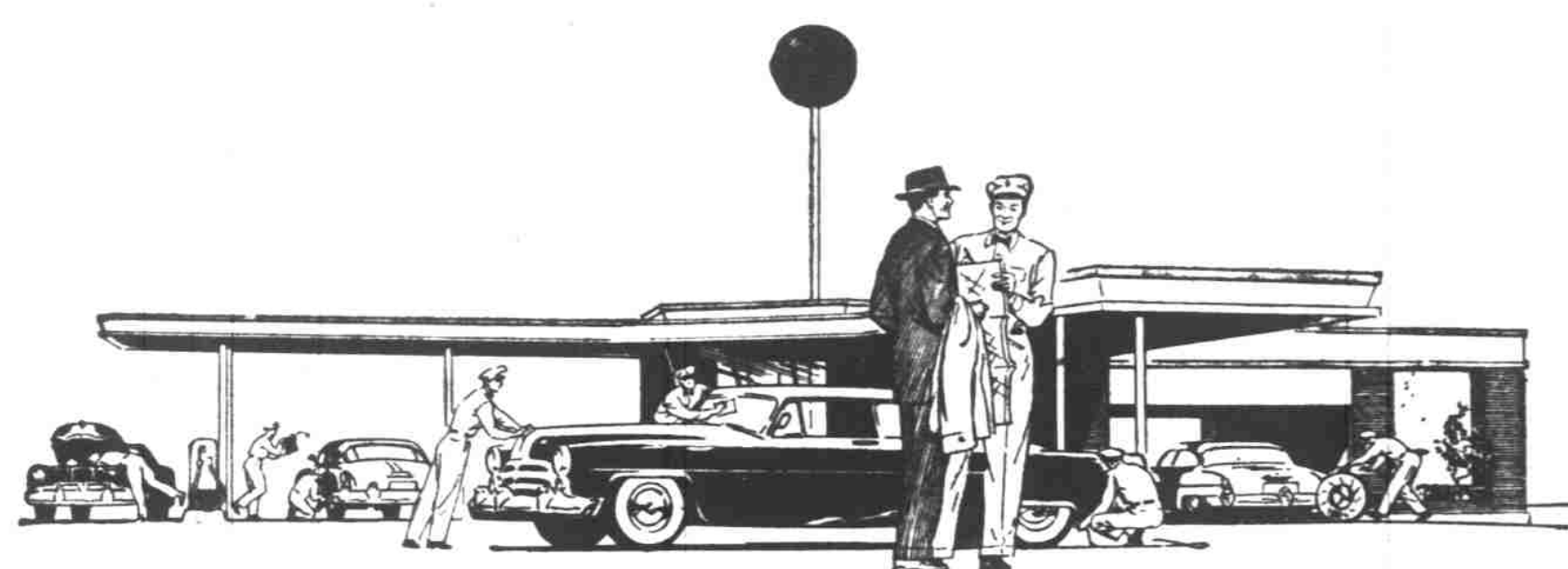
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
