Locals Seek Second Dual Meet Victory

Vern Gilmore's Salem High School cinder squad takes to the road today for a 3 o'clock dual meet with Milwaukee in the Clackamas County city. Today's journey will be final action for the Vikings before participation in the Hayward Relays at Eugene on April 19th.

The Gilmore crew captured its only previous dual go this season, topping Albany's Bulldogs by a 76 to 45 1/2 margin.

Gilmore expects a nip-and-tuck battle with Milwaukee. The V-mentor figures his best bets are Larry Paulus in the shotput, Stan Viela in the shotput and quarter-mile, Howard Saling in the mile, Dick Glasrow in the half-mile, Chuck Johnston and Eddie Castillo in the 440, Don Davis in the hurdles, Troy Archer and Ray Taylor in the javelin event and George Meyers in the shotput.

A number of the above named are lettermen outside of Sophomores Ray Taylor and Eddie Castillo and Saling, who won a monogram in cross-country.

Gilmore plans to take a 37-man squad on today's trip.

The Salem infield will be comprised of Phil Jantze at first base, Captain Jim Rice at second, Jimmy Brown at short and Chuck Puhlman at third. In the outfield will be Bill Nelson, Rod Hales, and either Bob Brunkal or Don Burke.

Leslie Track Squad Victor

Four meet records were broken by the Leslie Junior High School cinder squad as it gained decisions over West Salem's Giants in varsity, eight and seventh grade divisions of a relays meet held at Leslie Thursday. The Leslie varsity won 30-5, the eighth graders came out on top 20-15 and the seventh graders won 25-0.

The varsity mark topped came in the high jump as Blaco and Stewart combined for 14 feet, seven inches as against the old mark of 14 feet, six inches. In the eighth grade action the Leslie team of Thurston, Krater and France hit 47 feet, 8 3/4 inches to better the old standard of 46' 11 3/4".

In the seventh grade division the broadjump record went by the boards, Blaco and Coblenz leaping 46 feet 4 1/2 inches as compared with the old mark of 44' 9". Another mark falling in the seventh grade action was the high jump figure of 12' 9". Foxley, Russell and Blaco set a new one with a combined total of 13 feet, four inches.

ATLANTA (AP)—Nelson Fox scampered home on an infield error in the 10th inning Thursday to give the Chicago White Sox a 10-9 decision over the Atlanta Crackers of the Southern Association.

CHATTANOOGA (AP)—Three Chattanooga pitchers combined for a masterful eight-inning, spoiled only by Cliff Mapes' home run, as the Lookouts trimmed the Detroit Tigers Thursday 6-3.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The Philadelphia Phillies edged the St. Louis Cardinals Thursday, 8-7, to take the spring series from the Redbirds, seven games to five.

A 3:45 p. m. curfew had been set to permit the teams to catch a train. At exactly that time, Plate Umpire Tom Gorman stopped the game.

That was in the seventh inning. St. Louis had scored two runs to go ahead, 9-8. The game was called with the Phils at bat in the bottom of the seventh with two out and two aboard. The score reverted back to the end of the sixth.

Hill Gail Takes Turf Feature

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Hill Gail, the Calumet Farm speedster who figures heavily in the Kentucky Derby picture, headed for home with an all-out drive Thursday to win the \$10,000 added Phoenix Handicap, opening day feature at Keeneland.

Hill Gail raced close up to lightly regarded Dark Peter, most of the route and came in by three-fourths of a length as the veteran Eddie Arcaro nudged him a couple of times with the whip.

The time was 1:10 and two-fifths for the six furlong route, equalling the track record established by Allegro in 1938.

Top Blend, Hill Gail's stable-mate and the only other three-year-old in the race, was third as

he trailed Dark Peter by 4 1/2 lengths.

The race was Hill Gail's first since he captured the Santa Anita Derby. He is due for at least one other race at Keeneland, the \$25,000 added Blue Grass Stakes in two weeks.

The Calumet entry closed at 2-5 in the betting and returned \$2.80 for each \$2 to win, place and show. Dark Peter, closing at 17-1, paid \$7.60 and \$4.60.

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
