

Skin Grafting to Begin For Badly Burned Tot

Skin grafting for a seriously burned 4½-year-old boy will begin Thursday, more than two weeks after he was burned into unconsciousness when he fell into a fireplace.

After over a week of complete inactivity, which saw two blood transfusions, little Johnny Fee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Newman H. Fee, 221 N. 25th St., is now well enough to stand the painful and painstaking work of having new skin grafted onto the backs of his legs and the lower portion of his back, both of which had first degree burns.

Neighbors, many of whom know Johnny only by sight, have rallied to help him. By Friday they had collected \$27 and plan to gather more to bring Johnny the care his serious burns demand.

He has been in Salem General Hospital since April 2, after he somehow—his parents still don't

know for certain—back up and fell into a roaring fire at his home, while his mother was busy dressing his little brother and sister.

Because he never uttered a sound after falling, Johnny was almost completely enveloped in flames before someone saw him. After his mother had managed to quench the flames, his father was called from his millworkers job at Oregon Pulp and Paper Co.

Johnny, unconscious, was rushed by his parents to the hospital, where it was learned he had first, second and third degree burns. Not until the next day did he regain consciousness. In that first week he was given two blood transfusions, and only liquids for food.

Now, however, he is well enough to be fed more substantial food, and his mother is there each night to do it.

So while he's on the road to recovery, he still has an indefinite stay in the hospital. More skin graftings may be necessary. But with the patience of his parents, the skill of medicine and the help of neighbors, Johnny may be well enough to celebrate his fifth birthday in August at his home.

First aidmen, who took him to Salem General Hospital, said he apparently pulled the cord of the coffee pot, toppling it over and spilling the hot liquid over his shoulders and chest.

He was reported in "fair" condition Thursday night.

Thursday afternoon Miss Jorkenson, 18, of 1180 Madison St., in good faith started to lead her five-year-old mare towards the barn where she and the mare knew there was a bucket of oats waiting.

But the impatient mare took the lead in the matter and literally drug her young mistress to the barn, dragging her for quite some distance over hard-packed earth.

Brought to the first aid station, she was treated for badly bruised knees, face and arms. She went home with her parents.

Mt. Angel Phone Firm Gets Oked on Fund Plan

Public Utilities Commissioner Charles Heltzel Thursday granted the Mt. Angel Telephone Company authority to borrow \$9,000 from eight individuals.

The money would be used to purchase and install a new switchboard and to reimburse its treasury for moneys expended in retiring its outstanding loan.

Registering Deadline Only Five Days Away

David O'Hara, in charge of the State Elections Bureau, warned Thursday that next Tuesday is the deadline to register for the primary election.

O'Hara estimated that the registration for this year's primary election would exceed that of two years ago by at least 10 per cent.

Most of the increase, he said, would be reflected in the industrial counties.

YWCA Drive Workers Told To Up Efforts

Giving "until it hurts a little" will be necessary to raise the last of the new building funds for Salem YWCA, a group of the volunteer solicitors were told Thursday by A. C. Haag, general chairman.

Haag counted \$70,776 raised in the past two weeks and said the result so far "is not discouraging by any means."

The YW is out for \$200,000 to complete its building fund in time for a start on construction this year. In recent years the YW built up a fund of like amount through soliciting and through receipt of bequests.

New contributions reported at a luncheon meeting in the Marion Hotel Thursday amounted to \$18,643. This was added to the earlier collection of \$52,322 which included a \$20,000 gift from an anonymous donor in Boise, Idaho.

Campaign leaders stressed that although the building is to be started this year, the collection of funds is so arranged that payments may be made over a two-year period.

Workers in the solicitation will bring their reports to a Marion Hotel lunch session again next Thursday.

Other officers are Dale Bates, vice president; Richard French, treasurer; Robert O. Smith, Dr. Herbert Nelson, Everett Wilcox and Dr. Robert Anderson, directors.

The club is making plans now for providing hosts for the YMCA Citizenship Recognition party on Monday night for 21-year-olds eligible to vote this year for the first time; and for a Baseball Night sponsorship of a Salem Senators' game at Waters Park.

New TB Unit Accepted by Control Board

Formal acceptance of the new tuberculosis building at the Oregon State Hospital was announced by the State Board of Control Thursday.

The structure, of brick construction and two stories high, cost approximately \$800,000. It has a capacity of 140 beds. Dr. Charles E. Bates, hospital superintendent, said it would be occupied within

two weeks, following observance of "Hospital Day." The 114 tuberculosis patients, now housed in the old hospital, will be transferred into the new structure.

Viesko and Post, Salem contractors, had charge of construction. Money required for construction was taken from the State Building Fund appropriated by the 1951 legislature.

Highway Death Toll Reaches 25 in March

The March count brought the total for 1952 to 74, one more than recorded during the corresponding period a year ago.

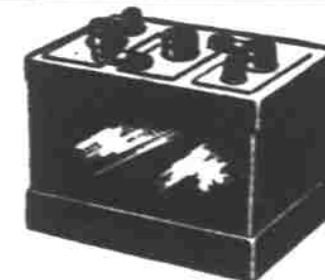
