

Wrecks Send Three Persons To Hospitals

Saturday traffic accidents sent three people to hospitals, although no one was injured seriously.

A Portland mother and her 3½-year-old daughter were treated at Salem Memorial for cuts and bruises following a car-truck collision at North Church and Hoyt streets. Mrs. Evelyn Oberhopper, 39, sustained cuts on her forehead, nose and on her left leg, all of which required stitches. Her daughter, Dianne, suffered a puncture wound in the back of her head. Both were held for observation at the hospital.

Their car, driven by Mr. Oberhopper, collided with a soft drink truck driven by Edmund J. Bauer of 3420 Willow Ln. Another child was in the car.

Judy Morrell, 10, of 2040 N. 16th St., was taken to Salem Memorial for treatment after she was struck by a car at Liberty and State streets sustaining bruises on her right leg. Police said she was crossing State Street when a car driven by Darrell F. Stratton, 18, of 1615 Lancaster Dr., making a right turn from Liberty Street, was unable to avoid hitting her. He was cited by police and charged with failure to yield the right of way.

SURRENDER MARKER GUARDED

LUENEBURG HEATH, Germany (P) — Four East German refugees guard a heavy granite stone that marks the spot where German Admiral Friedeburg surrendered to British Field Marshal Montgomery May 4, 1945, at the close of World War II. The guards, all over 80, stand watch in six-hour shifts, at the site, located on top of a lonely hill. Originally, wooden markers were erected, but these were stolen from time to time, possibly by Germans who resented a reminder to their de-

feat. Some 10,000 persons a year visit "Victory Hill." Many of them take pictures of the stone.

Troops Due At Atom Bomb Experiments

LAS VEGAS, Nev., (AP)—Troops selected to participate in atomic bomb experiments later this month begin arriving Sunday, the Army announced.

The troops will be based at Camp Desert Rock, near the Atomic Energy Commission's Nevada proving grounds.

The Army's 82nd Airborne Division and the 31st Transportation company of the Sixth Army are scheduled to arrive Sunday. Troops of the 31st Infantry Division will arrive Monday.

These units have just completed the two-month Long Horn maneuver at Fort Hood, Tex. Other units are expected to arrive later. Approximately 7,000 troops, both Army and Marines, are scheduled to participate in the atomic exercises.

Col. Stratta New Chief of Staff to Korea Division
