

Jersey Cons Hold Guards As Hostages

TRENTON, N. J. (AP)—Convicts, screaming they were the "scum of society," seized four State Prison officers as hostages Tuesday, grabbed control of the prison print shop and demanded the warden be removed.

Authorities identified kidnaper August Doak—said to be a member of Detroit's notorious purple gang—as one of the ringleaders of the 58 convicts.

They refused to talk to prison officials until two newspapermen were brought to witness their demands but allowed medicine into the shop for two prison guards suffering from heart disease.

Doak, 36-year-old desperado, was sentenced to life imprisonment in 1946 after kidnapping a state trooper who chased him for speeding.

He had escaped from State Prison in Jackson, Mich., and was wanted for kidnapping in Tennessee.

"We're not giving up. We're outlaws from the word go—we're the scum of society. We know we're going to get the worst of it," yelled convict William Dismore, spokesman for the embattled prisoners.

Dickens said the disgruntled convicts, some of whom took part in two previous riots within the past month, demanded the removal of Warden William Carty and an investigation of the sprawling, crowded State Prison.

3 Charged With Driving While Intoxicated

Three men were charged Tuesday by Salem police with driving while intoxicated and one of the three was fined \$250 as well as having his driver's license suspended.

The three were Edwin Kenneth Chilcott, Albany, who pleaded innocent and posted \$250 bail and trial is set for May 1; Eston M. Williamson, 140 N. 21st St., posted \$250 bail, and Malcolm Thurston Lynsey, 360 N. Commercial St., who received the fine and suspension of his license.

Also at city police Tuesday was the report of a theft of \$97 from a cash register at the M. A. Artz Photo Studio, 325 Court St. Artz reported that the money was taken from the register while the front of the shop was vacated.

Superintendent Marvin Clatterbuck said he expects about three or four more parents today. Tuesday's schedule included viewing the school's extra-curricular activities such as Boy and Cub Scouting, 4-H, Christian Endeavor and other groups. A movie on the ear and hearing also was shown.

Today will be devoted to demonstrations of primary school work plus discussion groups by the school's staff on the education of the deaf. Zone Change Advocated for Beauty Shop

Special business zoning to allow operation of a beauty shop by Mrs. Alma Dunn at 1180 N. 17th St. in an otherwise residential zone was recommended Tuesday night by Salem Planning and Zoning Commission.

Mrs. Dunn, whose shop in a converted garage is already prepared for business, petitioned for a change of zone from Class I to Class III-X. This now goes before the City Council with a favorable endorsement from the zoners.

In two other proposed business changes, the commission set May 20 public hearings after hearing the petitioners.

V. J. Osko is seeking permission to add a second story, for rental purposes, to his insurance building at 1465 N. Capitol St. Commissioners gave their tentative approval pending the hearing and contingent upon Osko's eliminating from the plan a possibility of future conversion of a large garage on the property to offices.

The other hearing will be for Giles Smith, seeking a change from capitol to special business zoning for a lot on Center Street just east of the service station at Capitol and Center Streets. Prospective tenants are in the radio-television store, retail clothing, hardware, appliance, medical and confectionery businesses.

The zoners returned to Frances Smith a proposed plat for some 80 residential lots north of Edgewater Street and east of Cascade Drive in West Salem. The plat committee said provision for streets and arrangement of lots should be improved. The plat area would extend about 1,000 feet uphill along Cascade Drive.

Preparation of a completely revised city zoning code, which has been in progress more than a year, received a boost Tuesday when the commission authorized City Attorney Chris J. Kowit to hire extra help to get a preliminary draft in shape for consideration by the commission and the City Council.

Salem Couple's Families in Flood Area

The tragedy of the Missouri River flood strikes close to the hearts of a Salem couple, whose relatives are among the misery-stricken farmers in the flood area.

Mrs. Silas M. Olson, 1038 Cascade Dr., said she learned by telephone from Iowa Tuesday night her "old home farm" near Sloan, Iowa, which she left nine years ago is under five feet of raging river water.

Mrs. Olson said her brother and his family, who were on the farm, located 20 miles south of Sloan City, have evacuated to Spencer, Iowa, about 70 miles northeast. Mrs. Olson said she was born and raised on the farm and never in the memory of man has it ever been flooded before.

She also learned Tuesday that some of her husband's relatives were evacuated from their flooded homes by helicopter and that one cousin is poised on his house top with a boat and outboard motor hoping to outlast the rising waters.

Victim of Rifle Bullet Released From Hospital

Dale Bull, 1515 Bonney Way Dr., shot in the neck while riding in an airplane in the Albany area Monday, was released from Albany General Hospital Tuesday.

Bull had been a passenger in the seaplane piloted by Leonard Cain, 1380 N. 18th St., and was shot while the pair, employees of the Lamb Scaling Bureau, were landing in the Willamette. The two boys held in connection with the shooting, have been charged with assault with a dangerous weapon.

Accused is 18-year-old Ronald Jackson and a 15-year-old companion who were shooting on a gravel bar with their 22 rifle when Jackson, "on a whim" shot at the landing plane. Questioned later, Jackson admitted firing the shot.

Both are being held in the Linn County jail pending trial.

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Streamliner Kills Elderly Man in Salem

An elderly Salem man was killed instantly Tuesday morning when he was run over by the Southern Pacific's crack streamliner, The Shasta Daylight, near North 12th and Union Streets.

He was John Huston, 83, of 1395 Marion St. Marion County Coroner Lester Howell quoted a trainman as saying that Huston deliberately lay down on the track when the 20-mile-an-hour train was about 20 feet away.

The trainman is V. A. Thompson, Portland, an engineer's instructor who was in the cab of the south-bound locomotive. Howell said Huston reportedly had been despondent in recent days.

The accident occurred just at the end of Union Street in the north end of the 500 block of North 12th Street.

Huston is survived by his widow, Mrs. Carol Alberta Huston of Salem; daughters, Mrs. Mary Orley of Castle Rock, Wash., and Mrs. Isabel Townsend of Salem; sons, Edward of Omaha, Neb., Leo of Eugene, Ernest of Los Angeles, Calif., Glen of Salem and Robert of McMinnville; a brother, William in Florida, and by eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be announced later by the Howell-Edwards Chapel.

B-36 Crashes Near Spokane, 15 Men Killed

SPOKANE (AP)—A 10-engined B-36 bomber, struggling to stay in the air, crashed second after take-off in the early morning darkness Tuesday and then burst into flames. Fifteen of the 17 men aboard were killed.

Two enlisted men, apparently thrown out, somehow survived. They were unable to talk to investigators who sought the cause of the crash, the eighth B-36 to be wrecked since production began.

The B-36, world's largest bomber, was ripped into a thousand pieces by the impact. The giant motors were grotesque junk.

The plane was taking off on a routine training mission.
