New Rule Set For Primrose Show, Exhibit

MT. ANGEL—A new rule for exhibits in the 1952 Primrose Show at Mt. Angel has been made by the Garden Club which sponsors the show. To qualify for entry in the show, which is slated for Sunday, April 27, all primrose plants in containers, except the regular earthenware flower pots, must be covered with green paper.
The new ruling resulted from the unfavorable view presented last year by the array of coffee and other lettered cans on the exhibition table which made the scene unsuitable for photographing. Any kind of plain green paper is acceptable.
This year's show will be held in the basement dining hall of St. Mary's School and entries will be received there Saturday afternoon, April 26, and on Sunday from 8 to 11 a.m. Judging will begin at 11 a.m. and no entries received thereafter will be eligible for prizes.

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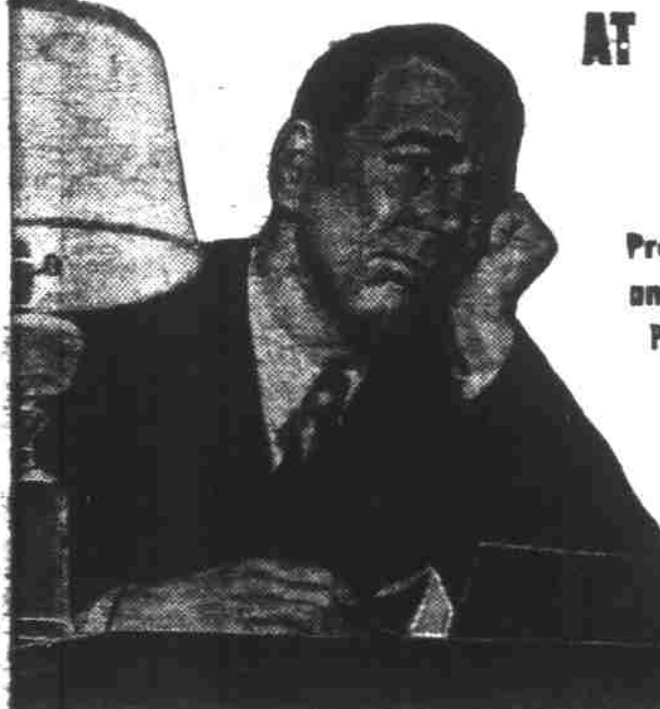
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
