Youth Legislature Opens Meet Today

A large-size, but short-term, legislature will come to Salem today, with 172 Oregon high schoolers ready to show what kind of laws they favor. It's the fifth annual Youth and Government program of the YMCA.

The youngsters have taken advice from the state's regular solons, but their past sessions have shown too, in procedure and oratory. There'll be some of the usual confusion, of course, for this "legislature" is nearly double the adult version in size and has but two days to consider the 58 bills—all prepared prior to the session.

The senators and representatives, and other officers, were chosen a few weeks ago from the delegates of Hi-Y (boys) and Tri-Hi-Y (girls) Clubs all over the state. Each club has two delegates.

The first of them came to Salem Thursday night, when the only meeting was a coaching banquet for officers, at the Marion Hotel. The top leaders are Governor Victor Walch of LaGrande, Senate President Robert Lawrence of Portland and Speaker Douglas Raines of Salem.

Beginning at 10 o'clock this morning, the two houses will organize, with oaths administered by men in addition to Speaker Raines, supreme court. "Governor" Walch will be sworn in and give his message, along with Gov. Douglas McKay.

Then will begin the introduction of bills on a wide range of subjects and their consideration by joint committees this afternoon.

At 6:45 tonight in Baxter Hall on Willamette University campus will be the legislative banquet, with program including Hawaiian dancers, folk music and a talk by State Rep. Paul Geddes of Roseburg. Then the "solons" will be guests at the campus lettermen's dance.

Debate on the bills will come Saturday, from 9:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., followed by the closing joint session and "governors" message.

In addition to Speaker Raines, Salem members of the legislature are Senators Ken Rawlings, Fred Buchanan, Joe Largent, Rod Porter and Al Heston; Representatives John Rehfuess, Marshall Jelders, Wayne Roan, Larry Keppinger, Bill Jaquith, Roger Maude and Gary Gortmaker.

Others from this area include Senators Jerome Kenagy of Albany, Harvey Rose of Lebanon, Don Blensley of McMinnville, Howard Tribbet of Newberg, Ken Moore of Silverton; Representatives Wayne Bunch of Albany, Jim Jacobson of Lebanon, Ted Boone of McMinnville, Lynwood Lundquist of Newberg, David Finlay of Silverton.

Solon Blames Steel Crisis On Truman

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Bridges (R-NH) accused President Truman Wednesday of being the principal creator of the crisis that led to seizure of the steel industry.

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer, in an apparent preliminary to a government grant of a pay raise over the heads of the companies, conferred separately with President Philip Murray of the CIO workers and President Benjamin Fairless of U. S. Steel Corp. Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall ruled out anew any such steel price increase as the \$12 a ton the companies have said they would need to cover the government recommended pay raise which is the nub of the dispute.

He said they would get "nothing" as a price for peace though he has said all along they can have a \$3 a ton increase under stabilization rules. He took his stand in a National Press Club luncheon speech and defended it later in a Senate hearing.

There was a walkout at a Republic Steel plant in Cleveland in an effort to hasten action on pay. Inland Steel Company took a new tack in effort to get an anti-seizure court order, seeking a declaratory judgment that the action is illegal. Several companies are asking an injunction in Federal Court here. Inland chose its home grounds at Hammond, Ind., for the test.

JAPAN 3RD IN FILM MAKING

TOKYO (AP)—The Japanese government says Japan is the world's third largest movie producer, ranking behind the United States and India. The Ministry of International Trade and Industry has just issued a research report showing this 1949 movie production rating: United States 459; India 289; Japan 156; Italy 120; France 110; Germany 89 and the United Kingdom 87. In 1951 Japan produced 208.
