### Cooks Get Inspiration from Food In Markets; Appetites Help too

Writing about foods and cooking takes on new interest with each season. Not only are the readers more interested, come a change in the weather, but there are more things in market to talk about.

The spring season hits us quickly—all at once there are fresh young vegetables in the market, if not locally grown yet, at least with encouraging green and red color.

Spring salads take their place on the menu, lettuce chunks with Thousand Island dressing, tossed salads of slightly anemic tomatoes, bright radishes and healthy looking green onions.

Perhaps you've a few plants of parsley left over in the garden, waiting to be dug under. If so, here's a recipe to use the roots. We've heard of celery root, of course, and parsley tops, but this calls for parsley root. We won't vouch for the recipe, but it comes from the chef of a famous mid-West hotel and he thinks it's good.

**BEUF CONSOMME**

1/2 pound lean beef shanks ground coarse  
1 teaspoon chopped onion  
1 small section garlic  
1 stalk celery (with outside trimmings)  
1/2 firm tomato

1 leek, parsley root and parsley greens  
1 egg white and crushed shell  
1/2 teaspoon of whole kernel black pepper  
1/2 teaspoon mixed spices  
1 quart of beef stock

Cut vegetables into small lumps. Combine all the above ingredients in a kettle, and boil very slowly for about 2 1/2 hours. Do not stir. Drain.

The same cook offers a nice little suggestion to use up any turtle meat you happen to have around the home, this does not include the poor little fellow that arrived at your home during fair week, and which if he survives you would by this time, love to see somewhere else than where he is.

**CONSOMME FLORIDA A LA CAMELLIA HOUSE**

1 No. 2 can diced turtle meat  
1 oz. arrowroot  
1 quart beef consommé  
1/4 cup water

Combine turtle meat and beef consommé. Bring to a boil, and simmer for 10 minutes.

Mix arrowroot and water together. Mix into consommé mixture thoroughly, and boil for 3 minutes. Serve piping hot. Excellent served with cheese sticks.
