It was a pretty discouraging performance from the standpoint of the bulls, although they drew some cheer from the fact that wheat held above the lows touched earlier in the week.

Low Volume Modifies Day's Stock Gains

NEW YORK (AP)—A modest advance—the best the week has afforded—was made Friday by the stock market under leadership of rails and steels.

Brokers felt that the vigor of the advance was modified considerably by the relatively low volume—1,240,000 shares as compared with the 1,620,000 shares traded Thursday when the market was declining.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 40 cents at \$100.10 with the industrial component up 30 cents, rails up 60 cents, and utilities up 10 cents.

The list was composed of 1,103 individual issues of which 509 advanced and 292 declined with 20 new highs and 66 new lows for the session.
