

Requests for State College Buildings to Total \$8,180,000

PORTLAND (AP)—The next Oregon Legislature will be asked for \$8,180,000 in school building funds under a 1953-55 program approved Monday by the Building Committee of the State Board of Higher Education.

Biggest single sum is 1 1/2 million dollars for a School of Dentistry Building. It was placed eighth on the priority list.

Top priority rating went to a journalism unit at the University of Oregon. Next was a chemical engineering building at Oregon State College, and third a physical education building at Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland.

Listed fourth was a \$1,200,000 wing for biological and agricultural science at Oregon State College. The buildings on six campuses would be part of a \$20,209,000 building program proposed to extend through 1959, the committee said.

Teaching hospital also approved final plans for the six million dollar University of Oregon Teaching Hospital at Portland. Funds for this already are available. Bids for this are to be opened June 17. Plans for remodeling the old Lincoln High School building for use by the Portland State Extension Center also were approved.

An annual operating budget of \$13,247,240 for instruction at the eight schools under the system was approved by the finance committee.

These include: Oregon State College, \$4,714,799; University of Oregon, \$3,346,808; Dental School, \$659,116; Medical School, \$1,171,947; Oregon College of Education, \$183,245; Southern Oregon College of Education, \$397,326; Eastern Oregon College of Education, \$346,642; Portland State Extension Center, \$305,393; General Extension Division, \$601,185.

Budget Approved
The finance committee also approved a budget of \$4,759,730 for statewide public services by hospitals, clinics, agricultural research and federal cooperative extension programs.

These included: University of Oregon Medical School Teaching Hospital, clinics and extension services, \$652,414; federal cooperative extension service in agriculture, including home economics and 4-H clubs, \$1,855,611; agricultural research and experiment stations, \$2,051,705.

A plan to cooperate with the State Department of Education in a program for handicapped children also was approved for the three colleges of education.

The State Department of Education will provide \$5100 annually and the State Board of Higher Education \$10,200 the first year and \$6600 annually thereafter.

Services of J. P. Johnson Due in Fargo

The body of John Peter Johnson was shipped Monday to Hernes Cemetery in Fargo, N. D., for interment. Johnson died in Salem Sunday.

He was born in Richland County, N. D., in 1872, and lived on the same farm until last March when he came to Oregon. His parents had homesteaded the land in North Dakota and he had maintained the farm after their deaths.

Johnson's wife preceded him in death in 1930. He had been a member of the Lutheran Church in North Dakota.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Brunes, Salem; two sons, Thomas and Joseph Johnson, both of Salem; six grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Service and shipment was under the direction of the Virgil T. Golden Company.

Rose Festival Princess Chosen

USAF Officers Pay Bribes to Escape From Active Duty

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP)—Discovery of a scheme through which four reserve Air Force officers paid bribes to escape active duty, apparently through alteration of military medical records, was reported Monday by U. S. Attorney William Hart.

At least seven others were solicited for bribes but denied making payments, Hart said. He added the bribes were solicited by "at least one service man" at nearby Scott Air Force Base, headquarters of the Air Training Command.

The reserve officers had been called up for active duty from the 10th Air Force area of 13 states and took their physical examinations at Scott AFB, he said. Their names were not disclosed.

Mrs. Heltzel Dies Following Short Illness

Mrs. Clara A. Heltzel, 70, died at her residence, 710 S. Liberty St., after a short illness.

Mrs. Heltzel was the mother of Charles H. Heltzel, state public utilities commissioner, and John A. Heltzel, Salem lawyer. Her husband was James G. Heltzel, a lawyer in Salem, who preceded her in death in 1932.

She was born in Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 25, 1882, coming to Oregon as a child and to Salem in 1900. She married Salem attorney, James G. Heltzel, in 1906.

She had been a member of the Episcopal Church and was also a member and past regent of the Chemeketa chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution; a member of the Salem Zonta Club and of the Rapherians and Delphian organizations.

Besides her two boys in Salem, she is survived by another son, James T. Heltzel, Taxco, Mexico; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Hemby, Denver, Colo.; sister, Mrs. Laura Sheltou, Boise, Ida.; Mrs. Helene Fountain, Merced, Calif., and Mrs. Anna Smith, Clackamas, Ore. She is also survived by nine grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements are under the direction of the W. T. Rigdon Company and services will be announced later.

Final Rites for Harry Boles Set Thursday

Services for Harry H. Boles, 63, will be held Thursday at 3 p.m. in the Clough-Barrick Chapel with interment at City View Cemetery.

Boles died Sunday of a heart ailment at Gold Beach, Ore. He was born in Petersburg, Ill., in 1889, coming to Salem in 1917. He was a farmer when first coming to Oregon and had a farm east of Salem.

He later turned to building and contracting which remained his vocation the rest of his life. During the last World War Boles was employed in contracting and building in and around Skagway, Alaska. He was a member of the Methodist Church and the AF and AM.

Boles was married in 1949 at Cannon Beach, Ore. His first wife died in 1940.

He is survived by the widow, Grace Boles, Salem; daughters, Norma June Boles, San Francisco, Calif., and Evelyn L. Smith, Port Gamble, Wash.; one sister and one brother in Texas; brother-in-law, Roy Stevens, West Salem; sister-in-law, Grace Baer, San Francisco, Calif.; father-in-law, J. B. Stevens, Salem, and four grandchildren.

Fire Damages Storage Bin at Albany Plant

ALBANY—A fire Monday evening partially destroyed a storage bin at the Edwards Brothers Construction Plant in Albany. The fire was said to have started by sparks from an adjacent burner.

The bin, a converted burner, was located about 100 feet from the active burner and was not being used for anything but the storage of wood chips. Officials of the Albany fire department reported that at least half of these chips were burned in the blaze.

Difficulty arose in putting the fire out due to the nature of burning chips which smoulder a great length of time. The fire, starting at about 6:30 p.m., burned for three hours.

The greatest damage listed by the owners was a cyclone funnel which was housed at the top of the burned bin and, during the fire, fell into the blaze.

The bin was located about 300 feet from the main plant.

High School Sign Found

The Springfield Chamber of Commerce Monday received word that a sign, stolen from them last Jan. 25 in front of the Salem Senior High School, has been found.

The sign was a 4' x 20' siding on a chartered schoolbus which proclaimed "We are the Springfield Boosters" and was taken from the bus while the "boosters" were boosting their team at a basketball game.

Woman Incurs Possible Fracture

Salem First Aid Monday answered a call at 175 S. 19th St. where Mrs. Hulda Jewett, 71, had fallen in her own back yard.

Mrs. Jewett suffered a possible fracture of her left hip and was taken by first aid men to Salem General Hospital.

She was reported by hospital officials Monday night as resting easily.

Air Force to Release Two Balty Fliers

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Charges against two reserve fliers for refusing to fly were dismissed Monday after a visit here by Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff.

However, the general said afterwards that the Air Force had no idea of softening its attitude toward balty pilots.

Maj. Gen. J. K. Lacey, who ordered the charges dropped, said the two officers would be separated from the service.

Lacey said charges were dropped against 1st Lt. James G. Bristol, 35, and 1st Lt. Edwin L. Cox, 35, following pre-trial investigations. These officers were in such physical condition and mental state of nervous apprehension that they were incapable of performing their flying assignments. These findings were borne out through medical psychiatric examinations, the general said.

Later Vandenberg said that each of the other court martial cases pending—four at Randolph and six at Mather Air Force Base, Calif.—will be considered on its own individual merits.

He said the cases will have to go to Secretary of Air Finletter for final action.

Taft Promises Tax Reductions
