

City Officials Hear Support Of Home Rule

Home rule for cities in Oregon is important if local government is to survive, William A. Bowes, Portland, president of the League of Oregon Cities, told league members at a regional meeting here Thursday night in the Senator Hotel.

home rule and then asking the home rule and then asking the state and federal government to supply the know-how and the where-with-all to accomplish the things we want, when it can very well be done by the people themselves, is a program that will destroy the initiative of the people on the home front," Bowes said.

Nearly 100 city officials from 14 towns in Marion and Polk counties were in attendance to discuss mutual problems.

Bowes touched on the "city fringe area problem," noting that in each city visited in a league survey it was estimated that within the next five years about 25 to 40 per cent of the future industrial development and about 50 per cent of the residential development would be outside city limits.

The percentage of the state's populations within city boundaries, he noted, has been decreasing since 1920. This brings up, he said, the matter of forming county planning commissions to plan development outside cities.

He urged city officials to co-operate with county and state groups in the matters of traffic safety, budget committees, tax assessment and reassignment programs.

Resolutions Proposed for WU GOP Meet

Willamette University students Thursday began full consideration of resolutions which will be presented to the university-sponsored mock Republican convention here in May.

Out of 13 resolutions brought up for consideration, before a small group of students, one was defeated, three were tabled, and no action was taken on one concerning civil rights.

The delegates turned down a resolution favoring military aid to democratic nations because they said the wording was too general. They tabled resolutions of the Taft-Hartley Act, on U.S. participation in the United Nations; and Federal-state relationships.

Approved resolutions favored continuing reciprocal trade agreements, statehood for Alaska and Hawaii, continued federal farm subsidies, adoption by Congress of the Hoover Commission recommendations on government reorganization, the point four program, retention of special powers on a contemporary basis to control wages, prices, and allocation of materials.

Additional resolutions will be taken up at a meeting next week.

Steel Seizure Basis Surprise To Judge Pine

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. District Judge David A. Pine indicated surprise Thursday at a government attorney's contention that the courts have no authority in time of emergency to interfere with such actions as President Truman's seizure of the nation's steel mills.

The judge put off until Friday completion of legal arguments on the steel industry's plea for an injunction which would void Truman's seizure. But he said that when arguments have ended, probably Friday, he will rule as promptly as possible.

Industry attorneys urged immediate action, contending that the government is about to take action "almost incalculable" damage to the steel companies. They referred to wage increases the government has said it will give steel workers.

Holmes Baldridge, an assistant attorney general replying for the government, argued that the President has unlimited power in time of declared emergency and that the courts have no authority to review his executive orders. The steel seizure was such an order.

Judge Pine expressed surprise, noting that the President himself declared the emergency.
