Jim Tabor Released; Padres, Stars Split

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland Beavers won their Coast League series with the Los Angeles Angels four games to one as the scheduled Sunday twinbill between the two clubs was rained out.

The Beavers were idle on the field Sunday but there was action in the front office as the club trimmed its roster to the league player limit of 23.

General Manager Bill Mulligan announced the release of Jim Tabor, veteran ex-major league infielder who was troubled by an arm injury suffered in spring training.

Cal McIrvine, southpaw pitcher, and Lillo Marcucci, catcher, were optioned to Victoria of the Western International League, subject to 24-hour recall. Outfielder Don White, a Coast League veteran, was taken off the active list and put on a standby basis. Mulligan said a deal is pending for White.

Seattle Rained, Too

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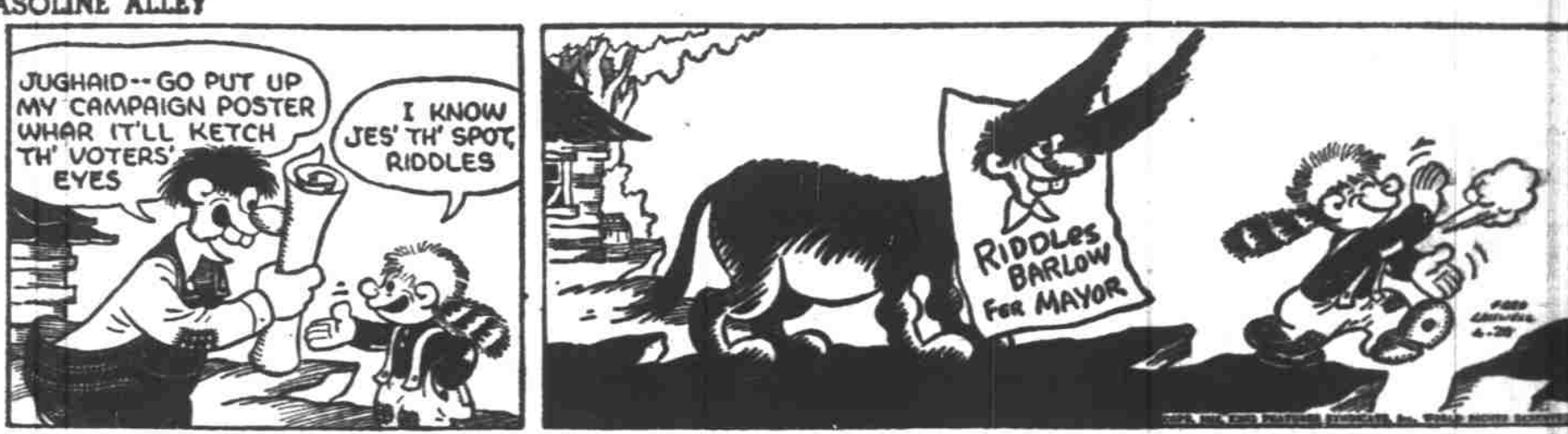
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
