

Senators Lose Home Opener in 12th Inning, 11 to 8

Lewiston Spoils Salem Debut With Late Rally; 3,500 See Starter, Fight; More Tonight

Lewiston's Broncos slammed across the runs in the 12th inning last night at Waters Field to snatch an 11-8 victory over the resident Senators, thus spoiling the 1952 home debut of Manager Hugh Luby's flock. Approximately 3,500 fans attended the inaugural despite drizzling skies and additionally uncomfortable 47-degree weather.

The first-nights were treated to a little of most everything but a Salem win, however, including a brief flurry of fistfights at second base in the Salem half of the third inning, a sortie which cost both Andy Anderson of the Senators and Second-sacker Nick DeLuca of the Broncos their existence in the game.

Andy won that particular hassle, for he decked the keystoner after the latter had punched him when his back was turned. Anderson went into second to break up a double play on Jim Deyos ground-er, and bumped Anderson on the center fielder, hitting him in the back. Anderson then flattened DeLuca before onrushing members of both teams interceded.

Off to 5-0 Start
All the game's fireworks weren't by any means contained in the baseline brawl and the three-run Lewiston 12th. Manager Bill Brenner's visitors got off to a 5-0 start in the first inning at the expense of Sal DeGeorge, and it was this unwelcome outburst that actually won the game.

DeGeorge couldn't find the plate with his service, walking four. He had to let up to get the ball over and when he did the Bronco swingers belted it but good. The four walks and three hits, plus another bling off reliever Ted Edmunds, amounted to the five tallies.

Since being turned back by San Diego two weeks ago DeGeorge has had no opportunity to work. Consequently his wildness wasn't exactly unexpected.

Senators Fight Back
Even with the 5-0 count against them the Senators gamely fought back, scoring once in the first and again in the second innings. Off Right-hander Del Owens, Edmunds meanwhile checked the visitors masterfully until the fifth when they punched in two more runs on four hits for a 7-2 lead.

The Solons got another in the fifth, Curt Schmidt driving it in, and then in the sixth bombed Owens out with a three-run assault, top wallon of which was Ed "Ernie Sites" bases-loaded single for the two of the markers.

The pesky Bronks had scored again in the sixth, and so the count at the end of six frames was 8-6 for Lewiston.

Right-hander Ted Shandor took over for Edmunds in the seventh as the latter was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the Salem sixth. Gene Tansell, flu bug and all, batted for Edmunds and drew a walk. He later scored with one of Sites' RHs.

Thomson Takes Over
Tall Dale Thomson assumed the Lewiston mound chores in the big Salem inning and got by until the eighth when Shandor and Glenn Tuckett singled and Sites drove in a run with a long fly.

The big opportunity for the home side came in the ninth, but the best our men could do was one run after loading the sacks with nobody out. Lefty Larry Powell, a cagey veteran of many seasons, relayed Thomson in the ninth and got out of the mess with a tie score at 8-8. After Shandor had whiffed, Tuckett drove home the run with a fly to right. Boss Luby then walked to again load the bases, but Second-baseman Milt Smith made a fine play on

Police Officers Halt Trucks on Summer Street

Arrests by city police mounted to a total of 13 Tuesday for violation of city ordinance 4,000, which prohibits trucks from using Summer Street.

Five truck drivers were arrested Sunday in a beginning effort by city authorities to enforce the ordinance. The Salem city council Monday night emphasized the enforcement which has prescribed, since the beginning of the one-way street system, that trucks must use the Pine Street cut off. Only trucks with business in Salem are permitted to use Summer Street in this system.

Bail for drivers arrested under this ordinance is \$10.

Also arrested Tuesday were two men charged with driving while intoxicated. They were Wilfred Jesse Grant, 269 Patterson Ave., and John Charles Barnes, 567 N. High St. Grant was fined \$250 and released and Barnes was held in lieu of \$250 bail with his case continued until April 30. This marked the total five this week for arrests on charges of driving while intoxicated.

Phone Firm to Add Offices

Spring alterations seemed the trend Tuesday at city engineer's office with three prominent buildings scheduled to be added on or improved.

A building permit was issued for a \$1,700 addition to the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph office at 775 Court St. Two additional offices are planned for this addition which will be an extension of the office space on the business floor of the building.

A permit for altering the Woodruff Furniture Store at 474 S. Commercial St. was issued for \$1,000 improvements to this store. Also issued Tuesday was a \$1,200 building permit for the construction of a windbreak between the old portion and the new at Richmond School. Construction is being done by Viesko and Post.

Plastering for Ernest Porter, a plasterer, will be minimized somewhat because a plastering machine of his was stolen Tuesday while parked on the corner of D and Summer Streets.

Porter, who resides at 1025 Dietz St., valued the machine at \$400. The machine was mounted on wheels and Porter said it could be towed by a car.

The new owners are George R. Walker, who has been president of the furniture company since 1949, Herbert C. Hope and William H. Kinsey. They bought out Ed P. Casey and his sister, Margaret G. Casey. The price was not disclosed.

U.S. Judge Rules Law Doesn't Allow Seizure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Here are the salient quotes from Judge David Andrew Pine's opinion in the steel seizure case:

The fundamental issue is whether the seizure is or is not authorized by law.

There is no express grant of power in the Constitution authorizing the President to direct this seizure. There is no enactment of Congress authorizing it.

The government of the United States was created by the ratification of the Constitution. It derives its authority wholly from the powers granted to it by the Constitution, which is the only source of power authorizing action by any branch of government.

He (the defendant government) next refers to seizures by former Presidents... without the authority of statute, but it is difficult to follow his argument that several prior acts apparently unauthorized by law, but never questioned in the courts, by repetition clothe a later unauthorized act with the cloak of legality. Apparently, according to his theory, several repetitive, unchallenged, illegal acts sanctify those committed after. I disagree.

Enough has been said to show the utter and complete lack of authoritative support for the defendant's position.

Mrs. Hawkins, Former Dallas Woman Dies

Mrs. Rachel Hawkins, former Dallas resident and widow of a prominent Polk County official, died at a Salem hospital Tuesday night after a five-week illness.

Mrs. Hawkins was the mother of Mrs. Catherine Gerling, of Salem, with whom she had lived for the past eight years. She is also survived by a son, Herman Hawkins, and several grandchildren.

The deceased was born April 13, 1874, in Missouri. She was married at Independence in 1894 to George L. Hawkins, who died in 1942. The couple moved to Dallas in 1902, where Mrs. Hawkins lived until moving to Salem in 1943.

Hawkins was prominent in Polk County political activities. He was county treasurer at the time of his death and prior to that had been county judge. Upon her husband's death, Mrs. Hawkins was appointed to fill out his term as treasurer.

Mrs. Hawkins was a long-time member of the Dallas Methodist Church. Last year she received a 50-year membership jewel from the Order of Eastern Star, Naomi Chapter, in which she was active. She will lie in state at the Bollman Funeral Home in Dallas until Friday noon.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Dallas Methodist Church with the Rev. Fremont Paul officiating. Final rites and private committal services will follow at Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum in Salem.

Sanborn New Secretary of Democrat Party

PORTLAND (AP)—William E. Sanborn, 32, was named secretary of the Democratic party in Oregon Tuesday. Howard Morgan, Monmouth, state chairman, announced the appointment.

Sanborn recently has been executive secretary of the Institute of International Relations at the University of Washington.

His headquarters will be in Portland.

Return Showing Voted for Movie 'King of Kings'

With more than 7,000 persons having seen the film, "King of Kings," during recent showings here, Salem Council of Churches Tuesday night unanimously approved its return to the Salem area next year.

The ep. film on the life of Christ, a 25-year-old silent picture, will appear several times in Salem and in as many Marion and Polk County communities as possible during Holy Week.

The Rev. Harold W. Black, pastor of West Salem Methodist Church, who directed arrangements for the film this year, said it was shown during Holy Week five times in Salem, once at the State Penitentiary, once at Chemawa Indian School and three times at Mill City, with crowds ranging up to 1,200.

Net proceeds were some \$400, which is to be placed in interdenominational Christian projects in Salem. Details of this were not completed.

BB Shatters Bus Windshield

A BB shot was reported to have been the reason for a shattered windshield on a Salem school bus Tuesday afternoon as the driver was returning to Salem.

The shattered windshield in front of the steering wheel as Robert Schaeffer, Willamette University student from Vancouver, Wash., was turning his empty bus from the Macleay Road to Lancaster Drive.

The windshield, of the safety plate style, shattered, but chips of glass sprayed into the cab. "I'm glad I wear glasses or glass chips might easily have hit my eyes," Schaeffer stated.

Warren Due In Oregon for Campaign Soon

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Gov. Warren announced Tuesday he will leave for Portland by plane Monday to launch his campaign as a Republican candidate in Oregon's May 16 presidential primary.

He said, however, he has not yet worked out his itinerary.

Warren, one of six GOP candidates on the ballot, told newsmen he will spend as much time in Oregon as he possibly can between Monday and election day.

In the meantime, the Governor is flying to Chicago Wednesday enroute to Cincinnati where he will appear on the League of Women Voters forum Thursday.
