The Capitol Leagues — Sacred Heart, Salem Academy, Stayton, Cascade and Philomath — take over Wednesday. The Willamette Valley Leagues, Woodburn, Mt. Angel, Dallas, Estacada, Sandy, Canby and Molalla — roll forth Thursday.

Joe Boyle's Staytons loom as the odds to beat for the team title Wednesday, while the Thursday

session is expected to find Molalla and Estacada making a strong bid for the top laurel.

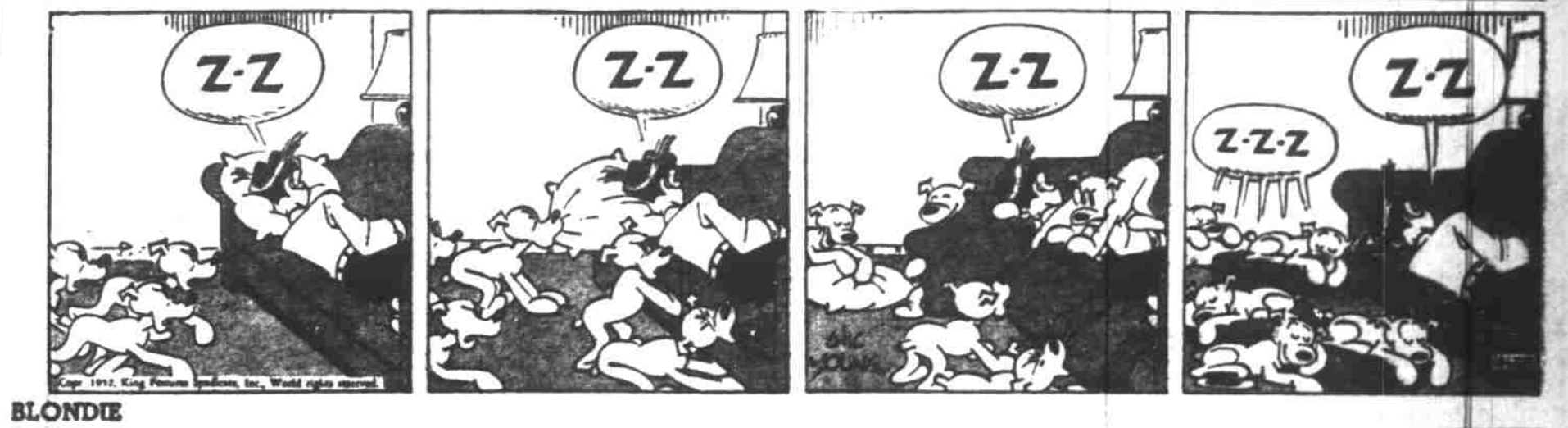
