

New Forgery Charge Added

A second charge of forgery loomed Wednesday for Edmund P. Werner, 21, of Dallas, when he appeared in Marion County District Court for preliminary examination on the first count.

The complaints indicate that both checks involved were signed with the name of James H. Hunt, 340 Leslie St., and each was for \$42.50. They were allegedly passed at Berg's Market and Rialto Coffee Shop in mid-March.

Werner was bound over to the grand jury on the first charge and continued to today to consult counsel on the other. He was held in the county jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail on each.
