3 State Prison Cons Charged With Larceny

A Marion County District Court Warrant was issued Wednesday charging larceny against three Oregon State Penitentiary inmates.

The warrant charges James Harry Funk, 20, Charles S. Douglas, 21, and Franklin Clay Clingeneel, 17, all inmates of the penitentiary with stealing an auto owned by V. A. Johnson, 1320 N. Commercial St. The three allegedly used the auto when they escaped from a work gang April 25 at the Oregon State Blind School. They were subsequently captured that same afternoon at a gravel pit near the South River Road.

The car, a 1936 Pontiac Coupe, was found near the Salem Golf Club. Police reports indicated the car would not start when found.

Supreme Court Adds \$2,500 to Damage Claim

Oregon Supreme Court added \$2,500 Wednesday to the damages won in court by a Eugene auto accident victim.

Court attaches said it was the first instance in many years in which the court increased the amount of damages awarded, although it has often reduced damages.

In writing the formal opinion, Justice Earl Latourette noted that the high court had all the records at its disposal and authority to raise the amount of damages under Oregon's constitution. This direct action would save time and money of a second trial, he wrote.

Benefited by the decision was Mrs. Mildred Snyder, struck by an automobile while crossing a street in Eugene, sued for \$8,500 damages against Dale E. Ammerman Jr., driver of the car. She was awarded only \$532 to cover her medical expenses, and she appealed.

The Supreme Court awarded her \$2,500 besides the \$532. The opinion, by Justice Earl C. Latourette, modified the order of Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth of Lane County.
