

56th Wedding Anniversary

MONMOUTH—Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Egelston celebrated their 56th wedding anniversary this month. The IOOF and Rebekah lodges gave a party in their honor with renewal of vows, and all members participating in a dinner. Etta Bosley and Winfield Egelston were married April 8, 1896, at Spickard, Missouri. Both are natives of that area. She was born January 25, 1876, at Spickard, and he was born December 22, 1875, at Princeton, Missouri.

They engaged in farming and cattle raising. Mrs. Egelston's poor health induced them to seek a change of climate, and in 1904 they came to Polk county. For many years Mr. Egelston operated a freight and transfer business here.

At 76, Mrs. Egelston enjoys good health, and is very active. She cooks for nine men students of Oregon College of Education. A neighbor woman assists her with dishes and table setting, but she is the cook. She makes her own soap, using lye and fat, for her household use. She raised canaries for many years, supplying a large pet shop, also selling to many individuals over the state. At present her chickens and guineas comprise her livestock.

Mr. and Mrs. Egelston have five children: Mrs. Letta Kowin, Lewiston, Idaho; Mrs. Charles Bowman, Independence; Lee at Wall-lowa; Clare and Clay, twin sons; Clare at Weston; Clay a Salem teacher. There are seven grandchildren, and ten great-grandchildren.

They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1946 by taking a trip to Missouri where they renewed acquaintance with oldtime friends.

Last Thanksgiving the Egelstons had all their descendants at home for the first time in 28 years. There were 27 family members present.
