Steel Strike Crisis Sends Stocks Down

NEW YORK (AP)—The steel strike crisis Thursday jolted the stock market down for the second straight session, but a sizable recovery movement appeared near the close. Rails, steels, oils, motors, rubbers, and non-ferrous metals were down substantially. Other sections of the market showed moderate losses. Steels didn't do so badly. U. S. Steel, ninth most active issue, was down 1/2 at 37 1/2, after touching a low of 37 1/4.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 90 cents at 9:59-30 with the industrial average off 80 cents, rails off \$1.60, and utilities off 20 cents. The industrials at \$131.20 hit a new low for the year. Railroads are still well above their low.
