

Kentucky Asks Investigation

Hoop Power Counters Latest Scandal Charge

LEXINGTON, Ky., (AP) — The University of Kentucky Monday invited the NCAA and two other organizations to investigate athletics at the school, recent target of a judge's blast.

Invitations for the inquiry went to the Southeastern Conference and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as well as the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

At the same time, U. K. said it hoped to have a report ready late Tuesday in reply to charges made by New York Saul Streit.

The judge blasted the school's athletic policies and basketball coach Adolph Rupp last week as he suspended sentencing of three former Kentucky hoop stars who admitted taking bribes to fix the scores of basketball games.

The university said it "urged that these investigations be made as promptly as is consistent with the machinery of the various organizations."

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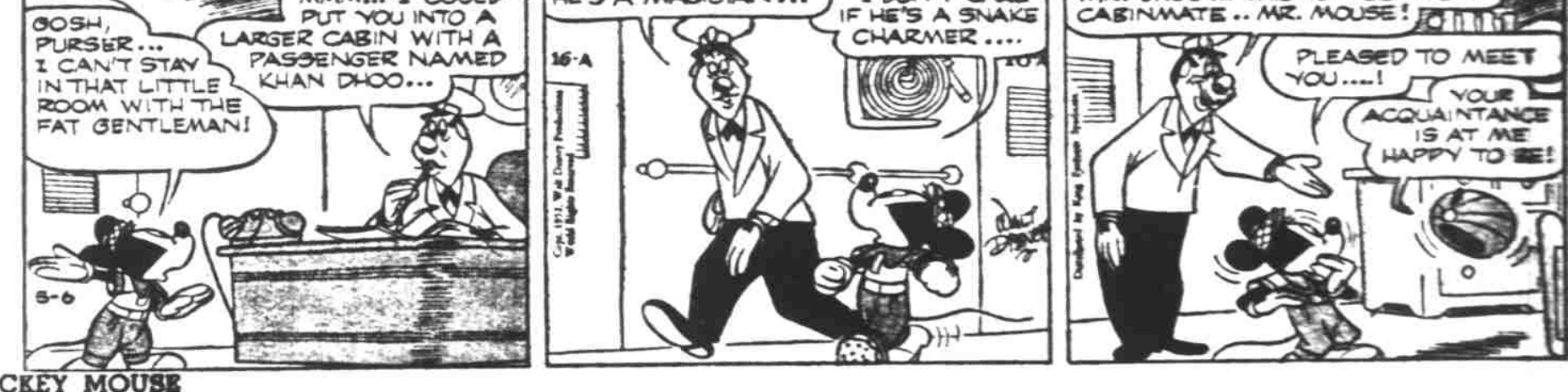
