Gelatine Handy Food to Serve at Any Meal. Recipe for Every Course

Life would be dull without gelatine, and we are collecting no fees from the manufacturers when we make that statement.

Just think what we would miss. No bridge salad luncheons with healthy looking matrons dining on rich fruit and whipped cream bundled up in shimmering gelatine; no wiggly plain gelatine to tempt the appetites of dallying children at noontime; no chiffon pies, Bavarian creams, chilled salad molds or chicken salad molds.

The world would be without tomato aspic, apple snow pudding, its regular supply of icebox cakes and even the marshmallows that go into many of them.

But life is not without gelatine, though the modern molded pudding is a far cry from that elaborate layered creation that used to be molded by the demonstrator years and years ago. The one who made a complete watermelon of gelatine of various flavors and colors, even adding raisins to simulate the seeds.

There could be gelatine in every course.

First there's a jellied bouillon to begin a meal.

TOMATO BOUILLON

1 cup tomatoes
3 cups bouillon
1 1/2 teaspoons chopped onion
1/4 cup cold water

Let gelatine soak in water. Mix other ingredients and boil 20 minutes. Add gelatine mixture and dissolve. Strain and chill. When set, break up with fork or cut in cubes and serve piled in bouillon cups. Garnish with a slice of lemon and some parsley or a spoonful of salted whipped cream.

Then the salad course will have any of a hundred, but here's a luncheon salad that might make an entree:

JELLIED CRAB SALAD

1 cup crab meat
1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup chili sauce
1 cup cottage cheese
2 tablespoons gelatine
1/2 cup cold water

Soak plain gelatine in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Add to other ingredients and mold in refrigerator. This makes 8 large or 15 small servings.

With a basic aspic, one can concoct many combinations to make a main dish. The aspic jelly goes like this: Use brown stock in molding dark meat, white of light meat or vegetables. Simmer meat juices for 20 minutes with parsley, thyme, cloves, bay leaves and other herbs, strain and measure. Or if preferred, use canned bouillon or bouillon cubes.

ASPIC JELLY

1 tablespoon gelatine
1 1/2 cups stock
Lemon juice
Salt and cayenne pepper

Soak gelatine 5 minutes in 1/2 cup stock and dissolve in remaining stock heated to boiling point. Season to taste and measure. Add water to make 2 cups and allow to congeal. This makes 8 pint.

To make ham, chicken or tongue in aspic, pour enough of the mixture into 1/2 inch deep and let harden. Arrange cooked ham, chicken or tongue on the aspic and fill mold with remaining aspic. You may slice the tongue or ham and cut the chicken in cubes. Chopped green pepper, pimiento, mint or a fruit can be used with the meat.

For the dessert let's try:

LEMON SNOW PUDDING

1/4 cup cold water
1 cup hot water
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 envelope gelatine

Soften gelatine in cold water and add sugar, salt and hot water, stir until dissolved. Add lemon and stir occasionally and when beginning to congeal, beat with a wire whisk or rotary beater until frothy. Add whites and continue beating until mixture holds its shape. Turn into mold that has been rinsed in cold water. Chill and when firm, unmold and serve with soft custard made of egg yolks.
