Sen. Kefauver Praises Mock Conventions

MONMOUTH — Sen. Estes Kefauver told a predominantly student-teacher audience here Tuesday that he likes to see young people talking politics and holding mock conventions.

"I think the increased interest in government among young folks is the finest thing I have seen in my travels about the United States," Kefauver told nearly 700 persons who quietly waited up to two hours in Campbell Hall auditorium to hear him.

The ruddy senator swept into Monmouth an hour late, spoke for 10 minutes, and left in a flurry of folksy handshakes.

He avoided campaign issues, recalling he had been "instructed not to make a political talk" by Dr. Robert J. Maaske, OCE president, who invited him to speak on the campus.

Kefauver said he thought "we would have better government all the way through" if we had a nationwide presidential primary. He said he was encouraged by signs that people "everywhere" are taking more interest in government.

He called OCE's tree-lined campus a "beautiful setting" and said he hoped to be around after the convention to meet everyone again.

Kefauver was introduced by Charles Noxon, OCE geography professor. Also on the platform were Miss Betty Anderson, Newberg, vice president of the OCE student body; and William Josselyn, Portland, prominent Oregon Democrat.

School Board Gives Contract To Cecil Lantz

Low bid was accepted from Cecil A. Lantz Tuesday night by the Salem School District for construction of a rest room building on the Baker Street playground.

The Salem contractor's bid of \$4,545 was low among eight bids. Mills Construction Co. was second low with \$4,590. Other bids ranged to \$5,708.

Directors of the district also set the boundaries for the new Hoover elementary school east of city limits. This will serve the area on both sides of Evergreen Avenue between Sunnyview and Market, east to the new bypass highway; area between Market Street and the State Hospital; and east of North 23rd Street to Lancaster Drive but not including either side of Lancaster; area east of state land between D Street and the Geer Line rail tracks, as far east as the bypass highway.

Well Authorized
The directors authorized a well and pump for the new Rosedale School and set the opening of bids for June 3 on the school construction project. They also approved an agreement with Salem Heights Water District for water service at Liberty School. The school cost of \$3,300 for laying the water line would be recovered upon annexation to the water district, under the agreement.

Mrs. Grace Fallin was assigned to Middle Grove and Mrs. Vivian Merts to Grant School as substitute teachers for next year. Both are from Salem.

Teachers Hired
The board also hired seven new teachers: Charles W. Cray, Salem High and University of California; graduate to teach at Parrish; Frank H. Walton of Seaside, for high school English and yearbook supervision; Mrs. Mary Bradley, Willamette University graduate who has taught at Newberg and Dallas, for McKinley School; Glen Collins of Mendota, Ill., for Parrish; Mrs. Bette Lundquist, who has taught at Sheridan, for Hoover; James F. Brents, West Stayton teacher, for Salem Heights; Miss Gwen Williams, Chico, Calif., for elementary teaching here.

Following the business session, board members met with a committee of citizens to further the preparation of a question-answer summary of information about the proposed \$4,200,000 bond issue for a South Salem High School. The material is to be made available to interested parent groups, other organizations and teachers.

Richmond P-TA Votes to Continue OCE Scholarship
Continuation of a college scholarship for Rean Fletcher at the Oregon College of Education was voted during the business meeting of the Richmond School P-TA.

The scholarship allows the girl to attend OCE one more year which provides her with enough time to teach at the end of this year.

Also at the P-TA meeting, opened by the school's student council, were elections of officers for the 1952-53 term. Elected to the office of president was Robert Laws; vice president, Mrs. L. E. Marsh; Mrs. George Birrell, secretary, and Everett Wood, treasurer.

The officers were installed by Mrs. C. A. Fratzke, member of the state executive committee.

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Portland to See Political Conclaves On Television

PORTLAND (AP)—KING-TV, Seattle, will bring a showing of national political conventions to Portland in July, J. L. Middlebrooks, engineering director, said here Tuesday.

He said the showing would be on a closed circuit, perhaps in an auditorium or over 50 to 100 receiving sets. The showing will be free of charge, although it will not be available for pick up by local sets.

He said the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. and the Columbia Broadcasting System are helping make preparations.

Lawyer Says Boy Innocent in Shooting of Girl

EUGENE (AP)—Defense Attorney Herbert Lombard said Tuesday he would present evidence to show that someone other than 15-year-old Elmer Harlan Belcher shot to death Mary Ellen Campbell last April 4.

Young Belcher is on trial on a charge of first degree murder in the fatal shooting of the 18-year-old deaf mute behind her farm home four miles south of Cottage Grove.

In his opening statement to the jury, Lombard said he would show that another man told Elmer to get a gun and that when the youth did so, the man came out of the woods and asked him for it.

Lombard said Elmer would testify that the man who took the gun from him in the woods was the dead girl's grandfather. The grandfather was not identified by name.

State Employees Ask Immediate Pay Increase

A call for an immediate salary increase for certain classes of state employees came Tuesday from the Oregon State Employees Association, Salem Chapter 1.

In a letter to Forrest Stewart, executive secretary of the OSEA, the chapter said it was "somewhat concerned to find that the State Emergency Board had deferred action on salary increases of employees of the state until June 13."

"The need for the increase in salary has been urgent... and the increase should have been made effective several months past... There should be no more hesitancy," the letter concluded. The chapter made the statement after it had discussed the matter at a meeting last week.

Mediation Meeting Set

PORTLAND (AP)—The employers of most of the 40,000 CIO workers who are on strike in five Pacific Northwest States will meet with the union here tomorrow. The meeting was arranged by Federal Mediation Commissioners Bob McClelland and George Walker.

Paul Hoffman Gives Outline Of Peace Policy

Paul G. Hoffman, national Eisenhower - for-president leader, speaking in Salem Tuesday, outlined a positive policy for peace, into which he placed Eisenhower as the logical executive. Hoffman offered these points:

Convince Russian leaders they can't conquer the West by military might or by internal aggression in individual countries—the general's work in building a European military force has made that continent more united than since Charlemagne. He added that Korea has been as unhappy a test for Communism as for the U. N. Eisenhower's name stands a symbol of victory and unity.

Persuade the Russian people that American people want peace, since "they now believe we're out to destroy them," and demonstrate that government of and by the people can do more for the people than any other system. He said the U. S. can show the Russians worthwhile intentions by work with other countries—such as India.

"Will People Speak?"

Holding that the popular voting for candidates has been overwhelmingly for Eisenhower, Hoffman said the campaign question now is "will the people speak with enough force so the convention will follow."

He held out the general as the man to attract to the Republican party large numbers of young persons—since about two-thirds of like groups over the country are under 35 years of age. More important than the numbers this group can add are its potentialities in "dynamism and idealism."

Hoffman held strongly for continued foreign economic aid such as the Marshall Plan—with a new emphasis on Asia—and said "I can't understand why Americans question the difference between spending for economic aid as against direct security."

The arrangements for Hoffman here were in charge of W. L. Phillips Sr. and Mark Hatfield, chairman and executive secretary of the Oregon - for-Eisenhower Committee.

are Bordeaux, yellow cuproide or copper A compound. Dust and spray may be the same as used in the first application earlier this spring. If filbert trees are interplanted with the walnuts orchardists should use a dust containing sulphur.
Walnut growers in the foothills may spray or dust beginning Saturday, or about four days after the lower orchards, Dr. Miller said.
