

Appeal Issued For State Job Applications

Appeal for applicants for jobs in several state agencies was issued here Wednesday by James Clinton, director of the State Civil Service Commission.

Foresters and forest wardens are needed badly by the State Forestry Department. The forester positions carry starting pay of \$272 a month and applicants should have college graduation in forestry or logging engineering. Forest warden positions are seasonal and the starting wage is \$229 a month.

Nurses are needed at the new tuberculosis unit of the Oregon State Hospital which opened here recently. Nurses who work in tuberculosis wards in state operated hospitals are receiving a \$10 differential and the beginning salary in the new unit is \$250 a month.

There also is an opening for a social worker at Hueston School for Girls. This position has a start-

Rural School Districts to Vote on Taxes

Marion County's 63 rural school districts will vote Monday night on a tax levy \$879,110 over the 6 per cent limitation. This amount and the total levy are the lowest in three years, according to the superintendent's office.

Voting will be from 8 to 9 p. m. (standard time), generally in the schoolhouse in each district. This budget is the combination of those in all grade and union high districts which are not first class and the non-high district.

The first such combined levy, three years ago, was approved. In 1950, the proposal tied and then lost, and last year it failed again.

When it is not approved by a majority of the voters over the county, each district is allotted its share of the small portion of the budget within the 6 per cent limit and, to gain additional operating funds, can conduct its own balloting.

The total proposed levy for the coming year is \$1,089,299, compared with \$1,124,401 for the current year and \$1,197,233 for the previous year. In 1950-51 the amount asked outside the limitation was \$1,004,797 and for 1951-52 it was \$920,418.

The approximate levy under the proposal would be 22.4 mills for elementary purposes and 14.6 mills for high school. If the levy is rejected, the county-wide levy would total 7.2 mills.

The superintendent's office said about one-third of the districts have higher millages than the proposed combination, while the others are equal or lower.

Eligible to cast ballots on the levy are registered voters who have resided within the school district for at least six months.

House Credit Rules to Ease

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government credit controls may be relaxed soon on new houses costing more than \$12,000, Housing Administrator Raymond Foley said Wednesday.

He told the annual meeting of the National Savings and Loan League that it is "quite possible" that Regulation X, governing real estate credit, will be modified within the next few weeks.

Among other things Regulation X requires a down payment of at least 50 per cent on houses costing \$25,000 or more.

Congress last fall eased controls on homes costing less than \$12,000.

Pheasant Eggs Offered Free to 4-H Club Youths

Pheasant eggs are being made available to 4-H club members through the cooperation of the Oregon State Game Commission and the 4-H Club department.

Club members may order as many as 200 eggs free of charge. The pheasants will be purchased from the club members by the Game Commission for \$1.00 each when they are ten weeks old.

The fresh pheasant eggs will be shipped prepaid parcel post or express to the members submitting orders.

After reaching ten weeks of age, the pheasant chicks will be released by a Game Commission agent, who will collect the birds for release and issue a receipt for each bird raised. Birds may be released on the cooperating club member's property, if it is a suitable habitat.

There is a bulletin on raising of pheasants, which is published by the Oregon Game Commission that will be made available to club members raising pheasants.

Hubbard Crash Puts Albany Man in Hospital

An accident Wednesday night at Hubbard involving the 1948 Plymouth driven by Grant Elgin, Albany, and two trucks, one northbound and one southbound, put Elgin in Salem Memorial Hospital.

Elgin, about 75, was reported by the hospital to be suffering from possible shock and was resting easily under observation.

State police reported that Elgin, who was traveling south, struck the rear of an Army truck, driven by Bobby Walter Berg, Salem, also traveling south. The Elgin car was then reported to have crumpled off the Army truck and into the pathway of a northbound West Coast Freightways truck driven by Lawrence Custibol Trujillo, Azusa, Calif.

The Elgin car was damaged quite badly by the accident.

Fishing License Proves Expensive

Fishing proved more expensive than he had figured when Luverne Milo Clute was fined \$100 Wednesday in Marion County District Court for making a false application for a resident license.

Clute was arrested Saturday by state policemen, after being stopped for a minor traffic violation and found in possession of some fish. He told officers his address was 2414 Brown Rd., but admitted having just come here from Washington. A resident angling license, less costly than for non-residents, requires six months residence in Oregon.

Idaho Glad to Be Rid of Salem Jail Escapee

LEWISTON, Ida. (AP)—The five-day stay of Edmund P. Werner, 21, in the county jail ended here Wednesday, the Oregon jail escapee had one last practical joke for harried officers.

Werner, wanted for escape from the Marion County jail at Salem and arrested here Friday, was being returned to the Oregon capital.

The officers found pepper in the pocket of his jacket.

That, they theorized, was to throw into the eyes of anyone who might try to stop Werner in a future escape attempt.

"You might as well have these," the prisoner then said.

He handed over two hacksaw blades from the other jacket pocket.

Officers said Werner told them he had hidden the blades on the inside of his stocking.

Between Friday and his departure Wednesday Werner also did these things:

Dyed his brown hair with black shoe polish in an attempt at disguise.

"Confessed" to shooting baseball player Eddie Waitkus at Chicago in June, 1949, an admission which officers discounted as false.

Carved a mock pistol out of laundry soap to frighten Deputy Sheriff Hazel Kyle.

"We won't miss him a bit," Sheriff W. W. Hays said as the Salem authorities led Werner away.

Reds Add to U.N. 'Crimes'

MUNSAN (AP)—Communist truce negotiators unleashed a virulent new attack on the Allies Thursday. The chief Allied delegate said they charged the United Nations command with "every crime in the book," including using prisoners of war for experiments "with poison gas, germ warfare and atomic bombs."

The Allied top negotiator, Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, told the Reds "it has been thought that in a very short time your propaganda would become so transparently ridiculous as to condemn itself. Your statement of today confirms that judgment."

Crude Rubber Price Cut 20%

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government cut its price for crude natural rubber more than 20 per cent Wednesday while industry officials were urging Congress to turn the synthetic program over quickly to private enterprise.

Jess Larson, General Services administrator and selling agent for the government as the only importer of natural rubber, announced the price cut. Effective June 1 the rate to manufacturers will be 38 cents a pound, down 10 1/2 cents from the 48 1/2 cents charged in April and May.

AGREEMENT ELUSIVE

PORTLAND (AP)—CIO Woodworkers and employers failed to reach agreement Wednesday on a new contract that would send some 40,000 men back into Pacific Northwest woods and mills. But Federal Mediators said another negotiating session has been scheduled for Thursday.

SEEK UNPAID WAGES

State Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey, who collects unpaid wages for workers, said Wednesday he has received claims from 208 workers during the first four months of this year. The claims total \$49,808.
