

## Newbry Aide Figures in Suit for Libel

ROSEBURG (AP) — A Douglas County grand jury has indicted Ken E. Morgan, Drain accountant, on a charge of criminal libel.

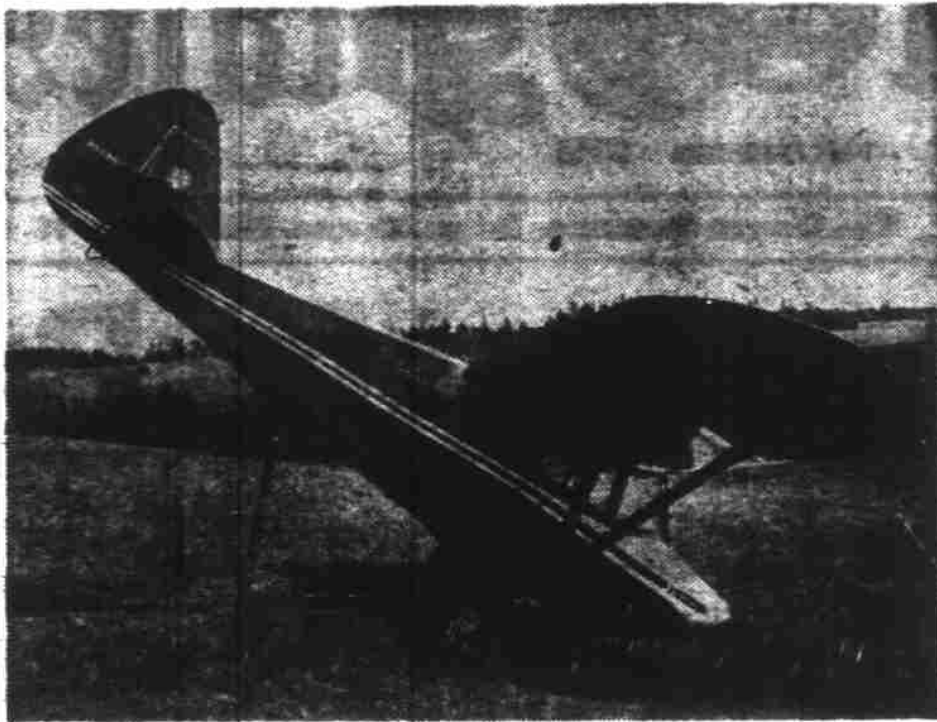
Morgan, held in lieu of \$2,500 bail, has been highly critical of county officials and others in paid advertisements in the Drain Enterprise, a weekly newspaper, and in a tabloid-sized publication which he publishes at intervals.

District Attorney Robert G. Davis said the grand jury indictment grew out of what he called a "false and scandalous" accusation of bribe-taking against Robert G. Gile, now head of the secretary of state's automobile division at Salem.

Gile, an ex-state senator, is former Douglas County appraiser. Gile was called to testify after the district attorney brought the matter before the grand jury.

Morgan is head of a committee seeking recall of Justice Clarence Leonard of Drain.

## Lumber Work Leads List in Unpaid Wages

Logging and sawmill workers topped the list of Oregon employees filing claims for unpaid wages during the first four months of 1952, Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey reports.

The State Bureau of Labor which is authorized by law to collect wages due and not paid, has accepted claims from 208 workers for a total amount of \$49,808, Kimsey said. Almost one-fourth of these claims were filed by men in the lumber industry.

The labor department has closed 64 of the claims, collecting \$5,097. The remaining claims are pending settlement by mediation or court action. Highest single amount collected was \$789 for a faller and buckor on the Oregon Coast.

Restaurant workers were second highest in filing claims with 45. A combined wage claim for \$15,240 was filed against a plywood company by six electrical workers. Their claim is based on an overtime clause in a contract between the company and a union.

## Salem Chest Extends Bid To Agencies

Salem Community Chest board of directors Thursday reiterated the chest's long-standing "open-door policy" of keeping its membership open to any accepted health or welfare agency in Salem.

Directors pointed out that this policy is in line with the present trend toward consolidating fund campaigns. No particular effort has been authorized for the Salem Chest to encourage non-chest agencies to consolidate, but applications from such agencies will receive the board's consideration, under the policy.

At the chest's monthly board meeting, reports were heard on the recent Chest Institute which attracted 200 persons and on plans for the county chest's visit to agencies in the Portland area May 20.

## Tidelands Measure Approved by House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House firmly stamped its approval Thursday on a bill for state ownership of submerged coastal lands and sent it to the Senate for action Friday.

Passed by a 247 to 89 vote, the measure would give states clear title to oil-rich lands beneath the marginal seas for a distance of three miles out from shore.

The Senate is expected to pass the bill promptly Friday and send it on to the White House.

Re-elected by the district were the Rev. W. D. McGraw, Portland, superintendent; the Rev. Bertrand Peterson, Portland, secretary; Paul E. Knapp, Salem, treasurer; the Rev. Eugene Stone and Knapp, Salem, and Gordon Olsen, Eugene, advisory board members.

Chosen as delegates for the quadrennial general assembly in Kansas City in June were the Rev. Ralph Cook, Oregon City, Fletcher Calloway, Portland, Stowe, McGraw and Peterson; laymen Olsen, Knapp, T. S. Wiley, Ashland, John Eby, Medford, and Roy Edwards, Hood River. Superintendent McGraw reported that church membership in the district gained 6 per cent, to 4,492, during the past year; Sunday School membership gained 4 per cent, to 9,260, and Sunday School average attendance gained 5½ per cent, to 6,236. The district counted \$5,000 in contributions to foreign missions.
