

Republicans In Polk County Approve Ike

DALLAS—Polk county Republicans gave Eisenhower 65 per cent of their popular vote and favored a slate of pro-Ike delegates for the national convention, complete returns from all precincts revealed Saturday.

Kefauver captured 78 per cent of the Democratic vote for president.

Cal Oarsmen Sweep Races With Huskies

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Califor-
nia crews won all three races from
Washington Saturday on the Oak-
land Estuary, the first clean sweep
for the Bears in the history of the
regatta. While thousands of spec-
tators lining the banks of the salt
water arm cheered them on, the
California varsity oarsmen beat
their northern rivals by approxi-
mately four lengths in the big fi-
nal.

The blue-and-gold shell skim-
med over the three-mile course in
14:43.3. Washington was timed in
15:05.6. The California junior var-
sity crew previously had taken the
Washington jayvees by two lengths
negotiating the three-mile stretch
in 15:17.2. The Huskies were
clocked in 15:23.3.

California's Freshman eight op-
posed the 42nd annual regatta by
taking their two-mile test from the
Huski yearlings by about one
length. The Bear Cubs were timed
in 10:12.7 to 10:14.5 for Washing-
ton.

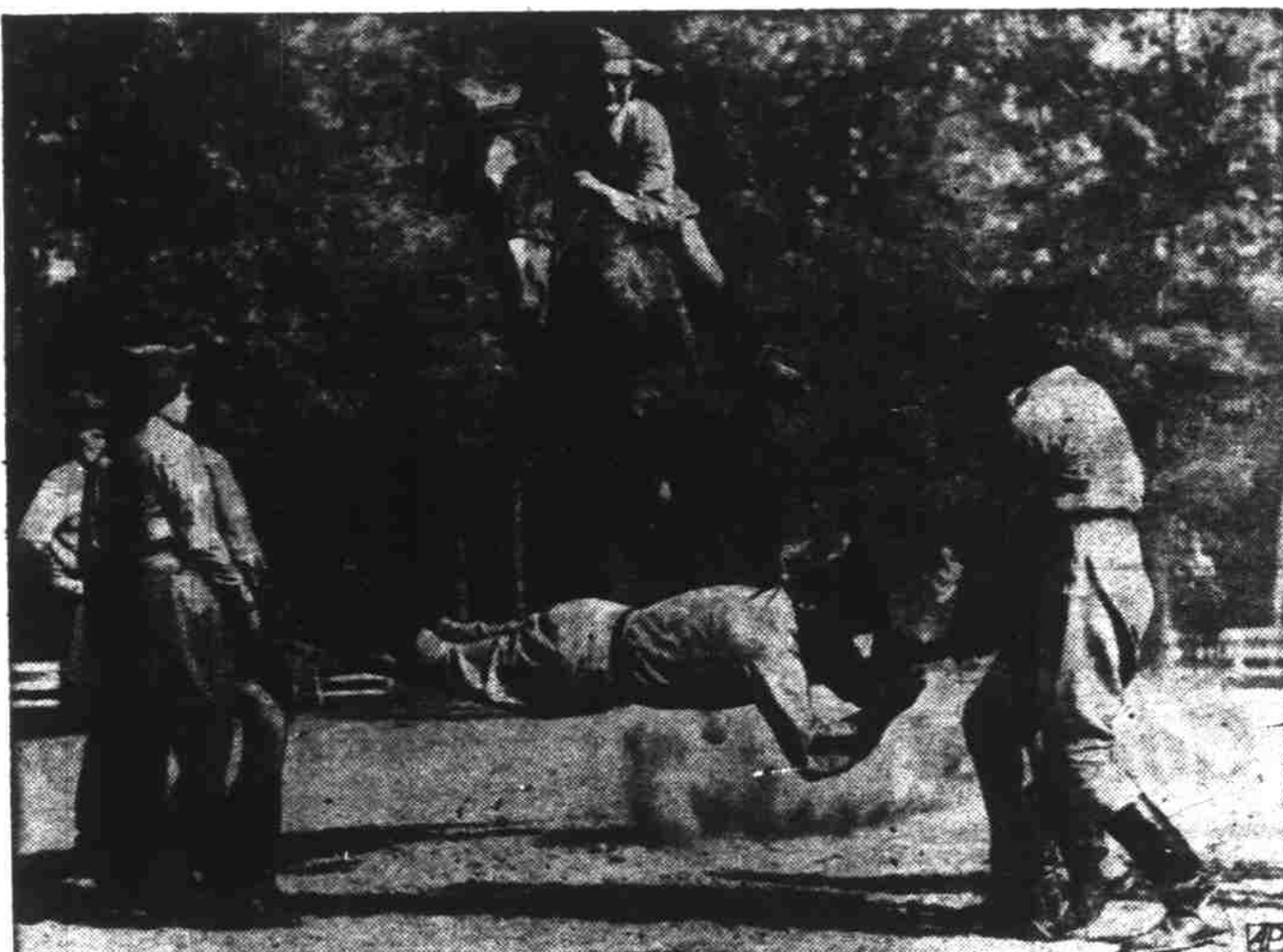

won their contests in Friday's
primary.

Rep. Walter Norblad, Astoria,
will be opposed by Robert B.
Jones, young Clackamas county
commissioner who was nominated
without opposition.

In the third district, Rep. Homer
D. Angell will have a tough op-
ponent in Alfred H. Corbett, Port-
land lawyer, and the Democratic
son of a prominent Republican
family.

Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg,
will face Walter A. Swanson,
Springfield lumberman.

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Truman Asks Nomination Of 'Liberal'

WASHINGTON (AP)—President
Truman predicted Saturday night
the Democrats will nominate a
"liberal" for president and win in
November because the Republi-
cans will "scare the daylight" out
of the voters with their pro-
gram.

Asserting the Democrats must
"never, never throw away a win-
ning program," Truman said in
an address prepared for a dinner
session of the Americans for Dem-
ocratic Action (ADA), that there
must be no party retreat on for-
eign policy, civil rights, power
development and other issues.

Michele O'Brien, State Pen Escapee, Arrested in Seattle

Michele O'Brien, 27, woman
prison inmate who escaped from
the Oregon penitentiary last Feb.
27, has been arrested in Seattle,

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Tidelands Bill Veto Ready

WASHINGTON (AP)—President
Truman hung a label of "robbery
in broad daylight" Saturday night
on legislation giving the states
clear title to oil-bearing submerg-
ed coastal lands.

He thus indicated plainly that he
will veto the bill on which Con-
gress completed action Friday with
Senate approval by voice vote. The
House had passed it Thursday, 247
to 89. The President vetoed a simi-
lar bill in 1946.

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
