Public relations and the public school teacher were the themes of the talk, which was followed by a discussion of practical problems concerning community relations and the role of the county of officials in the solution of individual cases.

Mrs. Booth stressed the importance of viewing the school, not only as a gathering of professional people for the benefit of the community, but also as an important community industry that, in many cases, spends more money and hires a larger personnel than any other individual business in the locality. In this light, she pointed out, the teacher must be constantly aware of her obligations to sell her product, her professional skill, to the consumers about her.
