

Public Health Association to Start State Meet Here Today

Annual two-day state convention of the Oregon Public Health Association will open today in Salem—thus keeping "convention week" in full swing here.

Registration for the approximately 200 health delegates will start at 9 a. m. today in room 309, State Capitol. Mayor Alfred Loucks and Dr. Willard Stone, Marion county health officer, will welcome delegates.

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But with the Democrats, the story is different.

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State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, a delegate-at-large, indicated there was a question about whether he would attend.

Nicholas Granet, a Third District delegate, said Morgan had "no authority to call a meeting."

Ridgway Points To 'Significant' Soviet Buildup

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway said Wednesday Soviet Russia is carrying on a big and "significant" military buildup in the Far East, while the Communists in Korea command a bigger offensive punch than ever before.

But the four-star general, soon to take command of the North Atlantic Pact army, said if the Reds should strike now with an all-out attack in Korea, they would be thrown back with "tremendous losses" on their side.

Discussing the critical Far East situation with senators on Capitol Hill and with newsmen at the Pentagon, Ridgway made these other points:

1. The outlook for an immediate cease-fire agreement in Korea is not bright, but efforts to reach a settlement should continue.
2. He would not advocate any ultimatum to the Reds in connection with the truce negotiations.

'Tough' Policy On Kojie Halts New Rioting

KOJIE ISLAND, Korea (AP)—The tough policy of Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner prevented a new riot that threatened this stormy prison camp after a U. S. soldier killed a menacing Red prisoner.

The new commander disclosed Wednesday it happened last Saturday.

It was the fourth Red uprising in five days. Three were on Kojie and the fourth broke out Tuesday at nearby Pusan, when another prisoner was killed.

Boatner's firm policy was paying off. He put down the first two revolts last week without bloodshed.

Some prisoners have hauled down defiant posters which Boatner said were insulting. Communist flags still fly over the compounds, however.

Witnesses to the Saturday shooting said the prisoner had been the leader of a work detail which was returning from the outside to compound 602.

They reported he halted the line of prisoners at the gate, ordered them to sit down, and began to shout at the American guard.

He refused to be searched, a requirement of all prisoners who leave or enter the barred wire stickades. The argument grew hot. The guard fired a warning shot. Boatner said the guard apparently thought the angry prisoner was about to attack and fired twice, killing him.

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John Garfield Succumbs To Heart Attack

NEW YORK (AP)—John Garfield, 39-year-old stage and movie tough guy, died of a heart attack in the bedroom of a beautiful blonde Wednesday.

Authorities said they found nothing suspicious.

Garfield's pugnacious features and manner made him a natural for hard-boiled roles. He became a star after he played a minor role in the Broadway stage play, "Golden Boy" in 1937.

The blonde, Iris Whitney, 36, blue-eyed and striking, told police Garfield became ill while visiting her Gramercy Park apartment Tuesday night and decided to rest there overnight. He'd had a heart attack about a year ago and been under a doctor's care since.

Garfield's brunette wife, Roberta, was reported prostrate at their New York home at news of his death. She had expected him home the night before. They have two children.

After his success in "Golden Boy," Garfield finally made Hollywood in 1938 in the movie "Four Daughters." He later played in such screen hits as "The Sea Wolf," "They Made Me a Criminal," "Juarez," "Tortilla Flat," "A Force," "Gentleman's Agreement," and "Body and Soul."

Opponents of Kefauver Get Truman Smile

President Truman wished "good luck" Wednesday to a California favorite-son opponent of Sen. Estes Kefauver, but the White House indicated this was not a stop-Kefauver move.

The incident developed when California State Attorney General Edmund G. Brown, who will oppose Kefauver in California's June 8 presidential primary election, emerged from a White House talk with Truman.

Brown quoted the President as saying he hoped Brown's forces would win over Kefauver in next Tuesday's West Coast election. Brown said Truman authorized him to make the statement.

Without specifically denying Brown said, the White House later told newsmen:

"The President wished the Brown delegation good luck, but intended no implications about Kefauver."

Brown himself disowned any attempt to "stop Kefauver." He said his bid for California's 68 delegates to the Democratic national convention was an attempt to keep the delegation uncommitted when it goes to Chicago to help nominate the party candidate on July 21.

Sailing Sloop Still Missing

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (AP)—A day long search of the choppy and cold waters of Northern Puget Sound revealed no trace Wednesday of the sailing sloop Prelude or the three persons still missing with the boat.

The bodies of four others who died when the Prelude disappeared Sunday evening on a short trip from Orcas Island to Bellingham were located in the waters Tuesday.

Still unaccounted for and given up as dead are Paul Fordyce, the owner of the yacht, Donald Card and Mrs. Ed Jukes. The bodies of Jukes, Mrs. Card, Mrs. Fordyce and Kenneth Fordyce, 12, have been recovered.

The reason for the strange tragedy has not been discovered.

Crowds Watch Pageantry of IOOF Parade

Salem "loved a parade" Wednesday evening when the Odd Fellows displayed their Centennial pageantry along with marching groups, school bands, and visiting lodge dignitaries.

Crowds surged and lined the route all the way from the parade's starting point at Marion Square to the finish near the county courthouse. The drums were pounded and the horns blazed by upward of 10 prominent bands, among them representatives from Stayton, Silverton, Parrish and Leslie Junior High Schools in Salem, Willamette University and Salem High School.

Funmakers, such as the Muscovites, sprayed a warm crowd with the Capital fire engine. Two antiquities from the century past, a 1915 Model-T Ford and a 1908 Overland, sputtered along the parade route. Marion Junior Lodge 13 boys depicted street-sweepers yesterday as they followed what might have been the horse-drawn Capital fire engine.

Chemeketa Lodge 1 in Salem

produced an outstanding float in a horse-drawn flatbed with a picture of the old State Capitol building on the front and the present building on the back. The float itself asked that "We Visit The Sick" and showed several good-doers doing just that with the "patient" lying in his sickbed. The Salem Lodge, being hosts for the affair, was not included in the competition.

Taking a lead in special cars in the parade was the Grand Master of the Odd Fellows Lodge, George Lyons, Portland; Mary Allen, Hood River, state president of the Rebekah Assembly, and Cleona Applegate, Medford, state president of the FL girls.

To End Today

The colorful five-day convention, which saw 2,000 IOOF men and women delegates pack Salem, will end this afternoon with joint installation ceremonies of Rebekahs and Grand Lodge officers.

Present on the parade judging platform last night in front of the courthouse was Frederick Schaefer, Noble Grand of the Chemeketa Lodge 1. Judges for the parade were Secretary of State Earl T. Newby, secretary to the governor Edwin Armstrong, Marion County District Judge Cal D. Sloper, Marion County Sheriff, Denver I. Young, Marion County Circuit Judge Joseph B. Felton, and Salem chief of police William P. Roble.
