At a general session at 9 a.m. in the State Capitol, delegates will hear talks by Dr. Henry C. Schumacher, San Francisco, mental health consultant, State Prison Warden Virgil J. O'Malley, Dr. S. B. Osgood, and Robert H. McCauley, both of Portland.

Following section meetings at noon the general session will convene at 2 p.m. at the Capitol for a round table discussion on chronic disease as a public health problem, with Dr. Levin presiding. The convention will end late this afternoon.

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Late Returns Add to Defeat, Rural Budget

Returns tallied Thursday further swamped the proposed unified 1952-53 rural school budget for Marion County.

Fifty-three of the 63 districts reported a total vote of 255 for and 1,534 against the county-wide tax levy, according to the county school superintendent's office. None of the larger districts was unreported.

Only 10 districts tallied so far have favored the program, which also has been defeated in the past two years.
