Mrs. McAfee, 86, Succumbs: Rites Today

Mrs. Sara Rovilla McAfee died Sunday at the age of 86 years at her residence in Salem Route 7. She had been in poor health for some time.

Services are to be held today at the W. T. Rigdon Chapel, 1:30 p. m. with the Rev. Robert Sanders officiating and interment at City View cemetery.

She was born Sarah Rovilla Nation in Chebanse, Ill., May 4, 1866, and remained there until she married George McAfee at Chebanse in April, 1888.

Shortly after marrying they moved to Belville, Wis., and later to Dodgeville, Wis., coming to Salem in Feb. 1913. Her husband who had been a railroad station agent, died in 1928.

Mrs. McAfee was the first president of the Hayesville Woman's Club and took part in its formation 24 years ago. She also was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include the daughters, Mrs. E. H. Glasser, Freeport, Ill.; Mrs. Albert Stattler and Mrs. Robin Bay, both of Salem; a brother, W. O. Nation, Chebanse, Ill.; sisters, Mrs. J. B. Park, Westlaco, Tex., and Mrs. G. W. McCuen, Columbus, Ohio; a niece, Mrs. C. R. Lindstrom, Salem; a nephew, Harold Nation, Salem; five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.
