Basic juvenile furniture that grows with the child so he can use it as long as he lives in his parent's home

room All of his furniture is in a natural finish maple and designed for long use and hard wear. For the child who has outgrown his crib, there is a youth bed which can be ordered finished as a studio couch with foam rubber mattress. The wooden frame has two finished arms along the back and one side of the bed. These are placed at right angles and opposite the wall so the child has protection if he rolls against them in his sleep. When he becomes too old for a youth bed, you turn the bed around with the long wooden arm against the wall, and by placing a removable bolster against this arm you have an adult sofa bed. Storage drawers under the bed serve to hold the bedding and you can
